Report on the Laurentian Forestry Centre's 50th Anniversary Activities

A little over a year ago, we decided to celebrate our 50th anniversary with four main events: the launch in September 2009, our anniversary in February, Quebec's Tree and Forest Month in May, and lastly, the closing in September 2010. In September 2009, I had the pleasure of telling you about the program of activities that included more than a dozen events. On that occasion, we also unveiled the collective work of art entitled *Reflet d'histoire* created by employees during the preceding weeks, which is the 50th anniversary's lasting souvenir. We also presented the 50th anniversary visual image, which was used to decorate the building.

In February 2010, we organized two major events. First, there was an insect and fire conference in collaboration with the iFor Consortium, which was a remarkable success with close to 100 participants. Then, to highlight the Laurentian Forestry Centre's (LFC) anniversary date, managers donned their finest aprons on Friday, February 12 to serve a meal to all LFC employees. They also each made a homemade dessert and gave it a forest-related name.

In May, two high points marked the LFC's 50th anniversary. We enjoyed an evening celebration at the Musée de la civilisation in the company of several partners and former directors who kindly spoke of their time at the LFC. We took this opportunity to launch the historical DVD entitled "Building the forests of tomorrow" as well as a compendium of the LFC's 50-year history, and to inaugurate the Museum's exhibition entitled "Beyond the Trees". Also in May, we had an open house with 14 interactive kiosks, a video presentation on research that was broadcast on programs such as La Semaine verte and Découverte, and the distribution of tree seedlings. I was in attendance and I had a great time welcoming visitors as well as family and friends "infected" with the passion of our employees.

Lastly, a 4-page insert on the scientific activities of the LFC was published in the May 1, 2010 issue of *Le Soleil*.

In September, we organized a debate on the future of forestry research in collaboration with Université Laval's Faculty of Forestry, Geography and Geomatics, which highlighted its 100 years of forestry education in Quebec. At this event, we had the honour of welcoming five key players in the field of forestry in Quebec and Canada to debate the role of research in forestry. Finally, we closed the 50th anniversary activities with a field day at a picturesque site in Saint-Nicolas where over 100 employees and former employees and their families were able to socialize while enjoying background music in a beautiful autumn setting.



Its construction and evolution

- Construction of the LFC began in 1957.

- researchers and the ever-increasing number of employees. In 1985, it was announced that the LFC would be expanded to bring all employees together under one roof.

Its workforce

- At its inception in 1960, the LFC had 30 scientists and professionals, as well as many technicians and students.

 Today, the LFC has more than 125 regular employees from various scientific and professional fields, plus temporary staff and many graduate students, which represents close to 200 people. All of these LFC employees have the same goal as their predecessors: the health and sustainability of Canada's forests.

The LFC: 50 years of history... and research

The Laurentian Forestry Centre (LFC) was the first federal institution officially devoted to forestry in Quebec and is one of five forestry centres in Natural Resources Canada's (NRCan) Canadian Forest Service (CFS). Its establishment was a milestone in Quebec's forest history, bringing together scientists dedicated to improving the knowledge of Quebec's forests under one roof.

At its inception in 1960, the LFC was known as the Laurentian Forest Research Centre (LFRC). There were 30 scientists and professionals within its workforce, in addition to several technicians and students. Researchers from other federal research centres and other countries joined, gradually reinforcing the LFC's expertise. It was during those early years that closer collaboration with Université Laval began, and it continues to this day.

The work of the LFRC primarily dealt with the fight against tree pests and diseases. Among other insects, entomologists focused on the spruce budworm and jack pine sawfly, while pathologists were mainly interested in coniferous rot, damping off and Dutch elm disease. Solid expertise in the diagnosis of tree insects and diseases validated the LFRC's status as a leader in this field.

Over the next two decades, the LFRC consolidated its scientific expertise and introduced significant developments in many cutting-edge fields. New fields of research were added, including biological control and genetic improvement, which had major impacts on forest management in Quebec.

In April 1986, the LFRC's name was changed to the Laurentian Forestry Centre and it became responsible for forestry development programs and joint agreements with the Government of Quebec.

During the 1990s, more fields of research were added, including biotechnology, genomics, forest ecosystem productivity and the impacts of climate change. Community involvement was also added to the LFC's mandate with the establishment of the First Nations Forestry Program and Forest Communities Program.

Art at Work

The Art at Work project was the first activity undertaken as part of the LFC's 50th anniversary, and the unveiling of the collective work of art on September 25, 2009 marked the beginning of the celebrations.

The employees worked under the guidance of professional artist Benoît Royer. Inspired by the LFC's mission, he designed a mural project that pays tribute to forests. It is composed of wood pieces that are either intact or transformed by various natural elements: water is represented by resin flow, wind by wear and tear, fire by charcoal, insects and diseases by grooves and holes, and lastly, the land through the use of perspective. The work, entitled Reflet d'histoire, is tied together by 50 wood rings sculpted in bas-relief, symbolizing the 50-year history of the LFC.

"We developed mobilizing а and unifying project through the collective creation of a lasting object that reflects our organization. During all of the artwork production stages, from design to completion, we were surprised by the collateral effects of creating a piece of art with several people, such as the natural spirit of camaraderie and a work environment filled with gusto. All of the participants, over 60 employees, worked together to build a mural that expresses the pride and commitment of people throughout the LFC. Permanently displayed in the lobby of the centre, this piece is an original way of marking history and it will remain a legacy for future generations that will evolve within these walls."

Conference on Insects and fire

The conference on insects and fire was jointly organized by the LFC and Université Laval's iFor Consortium. It aroused great interest, with over 100 people in attendance. The program was designed to help bring researchers and participants together.

Three of the 14 lectures were presented by LFC researchers: Christian Hébert, Sylvie Gauthier and Martin Girardin. The day was divided into five themes: animal ecology, economic issues, use of prescribed burning as a forest management tool, the impact of salvage operations on biodiversity, and practitioners' points of view. The conference ended with an interactive plenary session on three matters of interest: What information that you heard today do you think is most useful? What information is still missing? What should our research priorities be? Participants were also able to peruse 10 scientific posters prepared for the occasion.

Discussion forum: LFC / Université Laval

On the evening of September 13, 2010, the LFC and Université Laval organized a debate on the future of forest research in Quebec. This activity was conducted as a dual celebration: the 50th anniversary of the LFC and the 100th anniversary of Université Laval's program for teaching forestry in Quebec.

The theme for the evening was "For science to make a difference." 
