

2006 Census Housing Series Issue: 7—The Housing Conditions of Immigrant Households

INTRODUCTION

This *Research Highlight* examines the housing conditions of immigrant households in Canada (see text box: Definitions of immigrant households) in Canada based on custom data from the 2006 Census.

Housing conditions are assessed using CMHC's measures of acceptable housing and core housing need (see text box: Acceptable Housing and Core Housing Need).

FINDINGS

According to the 2006 Census, there were 12.4 million private households in Canada, an increase of 7.6% over 2001 (see Table 1). There were about 2.8 million immigrant households in 2006, accounting for about 23% of all households, an increase of 1.1 percentage points from 2001. Recent immigrant households which numbered 318,000 comprised 2.6% of total households and 11.3% of immigrant households. Given the relatively minor share (0.7%) of households headed by non-permanent residents, this group is not discussed below.

Definitions of Immigrant Households

The analysis below groups Canadian households into three exclusive categories based on the immigration status of their primary maintainers: non-immigrants, immigrants, and non-permanent residents:

- **Immigrant households** are defined as households whose primary maintainer (see below) is an immigrant to Canada.
- **Non-permanent residents** are people from another country in Canada claiming refugee status or holding student authorization (student visas or student permits), employment authorizations (or work permits), or Minister's permits (including extensions) and family members living here with them.
- The **primary household maintainer** is the first person identified by Census respondents as being responsible for household payments. This will normally be the person who contributes the greatest amount toward the payments for shelter expenses.
- **Recent immigrant households** are defined as those whose primary maintainer has been granted the right to live in Canada permanently by immigration authorities, and who landed in Canada between 2001 and (Census Day) May 16, 2006 (Census Day).

A large share of all immigrant households live in CMAs

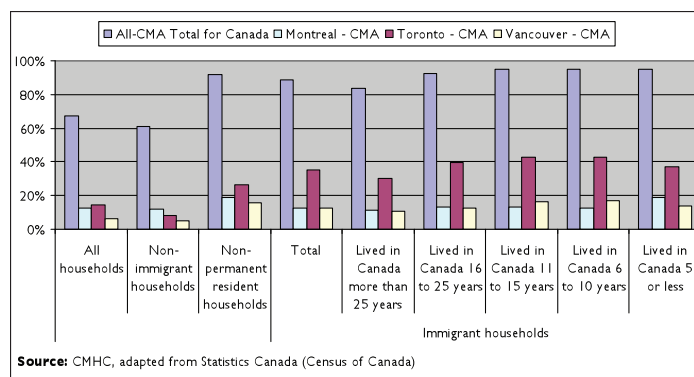


Figure 1 Proportion of households living in CMAs by immigrant status and period of immigration, 2006

About 89% of immigrant households lived in Canada's Census Metropolitan Areas (CMAs)¹ in 2006, compared to 61% of non-immigrant households (see Figure 1 and

Table 2). Recent immigrants tend to be more strongly concentrated in CMAs, with 95% of such households living in CMAs.

Toronto, Vancouver and Montreal, together, were home to about 61% of immigrant households and 70% of recent immigrant households. Some 35% of immigrant households (and 37% of recent immigrant households) lived in the Toronto CMA, compared to about 8% of non-immigrant households. Vancouver and Montréal also had larger percentages of both immigrant and recent immigrant households than of non-immigrant households.

Home ownership rates lowest among recent immigrant households

The rate of home ownership in 2006 for all households was about 68%, increased from about 66% in 2001 (see Table 3). The biggest increase (from about 50% to 59% or some 9 percentage points) was for those immigrant households who had lived in Canada between 5 and 10 years. The home ownership rate also increased for recent immigrant households, from about 30% to 35%; however, it was still well below that of other households. The highest home ownership rate in 2006 was for immigrant households who had lived in Canada for over 25 years, at some 80%.

In 2006, non-CMA households had much higher home ownership rates than households living in CMAs. For non-CMA households, the homeownership rates ranged from 85% for immigrant households in Canada over 25 years, to 56% for recent immigrant households, compared to 75% for non-immigrant households.

Household size largest, and dwelling size smallest, among recent immigrant households

In 2006, households headed by recent immigrants had relatively more household members: on average, about 3.1 persons per household, compared to 2.8 for all immigrant households and 2.4 for non-immigrant households (see Table 4).

The dwelling size for recent immigrant households was relatively smaller, whether measured by average number of rooms or average number of bedrooms. Recent immigrant households had an average of 4.7 rooms and 2.1 bedrooms in 2006, compare to 6.5 rooms and 2.7 bedrooms for non-immigrant households.

Core housing need

Acceptable Housing and Core Housing Need

The term **acceptable housing** refers to housing that is adequate in condition, suitable in size, and affordable.

- **Adequate** housing does not require any major repairs, according to residents.
- **Suitable** housing has enough bedrooms for the size and make-up of resident households, according to National Occupancy Standard (NOS) requirements. Enough bedrooms based on NOS requirements means one bedroom for each cohabiting adult couple; unattached household member 18 years of age and over; same-sex pair of children under age 18; and additional boy or girl in the family, unless there are two opposite sex children under 5 years of age, in which case they are expected to share a bedroom. A household of one individual can occupy a bachelor unit (i.e. a unit with no bedroom).
- **Affordable** housing costs less than 30 per cent of before-tax household income. For renters, shelter costs include rent and any payments for electricity, fuel, water and other municipal services. For owners, shelter costs include mortgage payments (principal and interest), property taxes, and any condominium fees, along with payments for electricity, fuel, water and other municipal services.

A household is in **core housing need** if its housing does not meet one or more of the adequacy, suitability or affordability standards and it would have to spend 30 per cent or more of its before-tax income to pay the median rent of alternative local market housing that meets all three standards.

The universe of households tested for core housing need includes only private non-farm, non-band, non-reserve households with incomes greater than zero and shelter-cost-to-income ratios (STIRs) less than 100%. Shelter costs for farm households are not separable from costs related to other farm structures. Shelter costs are not collected for households whose housing costs are paid through band housing arrangements (both on-and off-reserve). For the purpose of measuring affordability, CMHC regards STIRs of 100% or more and STIRs for households with incomes of zero or less as un-interpretable.

Core housing need decreases with time spent in Canada

In 2006, the incidence of core housing need of immigrant households decreased from 18.3% in 2001 to 18.2% in 2006, while that for non-immigrant households decreased from 12% to 11% (see Table 5).

The incidence of core housing need for recent immigrant households was 35% in 2006, down from 36% in 2001. Recent immigrant households had more than three times the incidence of core housing need of non-immigrant households in 2006.

Generally, the longer immigrant households reside in Canada, the better their housing conditions become (see Table 5). At 13%, the incidence of core housing need among households headed by immigrants residing in Canada for more than 25 years is less than that for those here for 15 to 25 years (at 19%), for 10 to 15 years (at 23%), for 5 to 10 years (at 24%), and for recent immigrant households (at 35%).

Recent immigrant households in core housing need had relatively high incidences of falling below the housing standards for affordability and suitability

Affordability is generally the main reason for falling into core housing need (see Table 6). In 2006, 16% immigrant households were experiencing affordability problems and in core housing need, compared to 10% of non-immigrant households. An estimated 2% of immigrant households were experiencing core housing need and adequacy problems, compared to 2% of non-immigrant households. At the same time, 5% if immigrant households experienced suitability problems and were in core housing need, compared to 1% of non-immigrant households.

For recent immigrant households, 30% were experiencing core housing need and affordability problems and 3% core housing need and adequacy problems. The largest incidences of core housing need and suitability problems were faced by recent immigrant renter households (at 24%).

Immigrants, especially recent immigrants, generally experienced higher incidences of core housing need due to suitability problems than did non-immigrants.

Household incomes increase with time spent in Canada, but shelter costs vary

Immigrant households' average before-tax income was \$73,380 in 2006, about 1.7% more than that of non-immigrant households (at \$72,180) (see Table 7). The average incomes of immigrant households increased with time spent in Canada, from about \$51,691 for recent immigrants to \$79,013 for those here more than 25 years. The average incomes for immigrant households here for more than 15 years exceeded that of non-immigrants.

In 2006, home owner households, whether immigrant or non-immigrant, had average before-tax incomes which were about double that of renters (see Table 7). Immigrant and non-immigrant household home owners had average household incomes before taxes of \$86,432 and \$85,662, respectively, compared to immigrant and non-immigrant household renters' household incomes of \$43,082 and \$41,470, respectively. The average household income increased from \$51,691 for recent immigrants to \$79,013 for immigrants who have lived in Canada for over 25 years. The average income for the latter households exceeded that of non-immigrant households by nearly \$7,000. Recent immigrant renters had the lowest average incomes (at \$39,782).

With their much higher incomes, homeowners spent more on shelter than did renters, but the differences were smaller than the income differences (see Table 7). Shelter costs varied from \$1497 per year for immigrant home owners who had lived in Canada for 6 to 10 years, to \$704 for non-immigrant renters.

The average shelter cost-to-income ratio (STIR) of immigrant households (at 24%) was higher than that of non-immigrant households (at 21%) in 2006 (see Table 7). The highest STIR was faced by recent immigrant renters (at 33%).

SUMMARY

In 2006, about 23% of all households in Canada were immigrant households. Recent immigrant households (who had come to Canada between January 1 2001 and Census Day in May) accounted for 2.6% of all households. The great majority (some 89%) of immigrant households lived in CMAs. Toronto, Vancouver and Montreal were home to 61% of immigrant households. Recent immigrant households had relatively lower incomes, lower home ownership rates, and higher incidences of core housing need than non-immigrant households and than immigrant households who had been in Canada longer. Problems with affordability and crowding were also more prevalent among recent immigrant households. Immigrants, especially recent immigrants, generally experienced higher incidences of core housing need due to suitability problems than did non-immigrants. The housing conditions for immigrant households improved as they stayed in Canada longer.
