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INTRODUCING THE QUESTIONNAIRE RESPONSES

Volumes 2, 3 and 4 of this report contain the 92 responses that the Standing Senate Committee on National Security and Defence received to an emergency management questionnaire, in alphabetical order by municipality. This questionnaire was distributed to first responders in 100 municipalities across Canada with a minimum population of 20,000 people.

Similar to the committee's 2004 questionnaire, this was not supposed to be a scientific survey. Rather, the committee asked a range of both pointed and open-ended questions in order to give municipal officials the opportunity to comment freely on their emergency management capacity. We believe that a picture of emergency preparedness across Canada emerged from this broadspectrum approach.

The committee received positive feedback in response to its 2004 report, which included positive comments on how useful the questionnaire responses were to its readers. Once again, the committee hopes that these responses will be used as a reference piece by:

- The media;
- First responders and emergency management organizations within these communities so that they may compare themselves to other communities of similar size;
- The people who actually live in these communities so that they may have an idea on how prepared their community is to manage a natural or man-made disaster.

The committee is grateful to all those who responded to its questionnaire and would like to extend its thanks to the first responders who provided feedback on the content of the questionnaire.

To the Director of Emergency Management:

The Standing Senate Committee on National Security and Defence is conducting a follow-up study of our 2003 investigation of emergency preparedness across Canada. On behalf of the Committee, I am requesting your help in completing this study. In 2003, the information your municipality provided gave the Committee great insight into how first responders view emergency preparedness, and was invaluable to the publication of the Committee's report *National Emergencies: Canada's Fragile Front Lines*. Once again, the Committee turns to your municipality to help us understand its level of emergency preparedness.

Our March 2004 report *National Emergencies: Canada's Fragile Front Lines* was based on one simple question: what do first responders need in order to effectively respond to large-scale emergencies and disasters? In that report we pointed out our concern with the lack of government attention and funding to health, natural disaster and terrorist emergency preparedness. We remain concerned about these issues today.

While the Committee has heard testimony from a number of federal government officials, we found that the most helpful source of information came from men and women on the front lines – municipal first responders and emergency management officials such as yourself. Last time, questionnaires were sent to approximately 100 municipalities – those with a population exceeding 20,000. We received responses from 86 municipal emergency preparedness coordinators of 100 Canadian municipalities. The Committee would appreciate hearing from you once again.

Attached is a questionnaire that deals with the same key issues and themes that have consistently emerged since the start of our investigation in 2003. The Committee would be grateful for an update on your municipality's desired and current state of readiness including information on your emergency management organization, funding requirements, potential threats to your community, efforts to protect critical infrastructure and the state of your relationship with provincial, territorial and federal emergency management organizations.

The Committee hopes to address the responses it receives to the questionnaire in hearings at the end of June. Please e-mail your reply to defence@sen.parl.gc.ca. As in *National Emergencies: Canada's Fragile Front Lines*, which can be viewed at http://www.sen-sec.ca, your municipality's responses will be reproduced verbatim. This will allow us to reflect the various views from across Canada.

It use to provide funding towards Emergency Public Alerting which no longer applies for grant dollars. An Emergency Plan is no good unless you can notify the public in harms way of the emergency. Why does the JEPP program no longer fund Municipal Siren systems? This is clearly a mistake.

We have applied twice since 1998. We were turned down by the Province of Ontario the first year 1998 because we submitted our application a day late even though we had received verbal permission. We submitted a JEPP application in 2006 for 2007 and was granted a federal share of 2,959.11 with the City paying 55% of two new radios for the E.O.C. We have not abuse the system. In fact I would say that we have been constantly overlooked for hazmat funding when you consider that we represent over 80% of the Chemicals in Ontario in a border City which could impact on First Nations, Federal Lands, Federal Water ways and on U.S. soil.

We have the ability to interrupt both Radio and T.V. Broadcasting from the Sarnia E.O.C. / Police Station. Only a Police Officer in charge is authorized to do this. We based this on the fact that each Municipality has a Police Service and they are required to up hold Federal Law, Provincial Law and Municipal By-Laws. Since Broadcasting is under the CRTC Federal Law we only have Police that at the local level up hold federal Law. We have never had an issue with this in all the years we have done this. We also have the ability to alert a small portion of our population with municipal sirens. These work well to inform the public which are outdoors and which are the most affected by chemical releases or severe weather. We also have a radio system that links us with all chemical plants, transit, city works, hospitals etc. which is used for notify large portions of the population.

I have been directly involved full time in emergency management in the City of Toronto (and former Metro Toronto) for over 19 years (since 1988). I have received the designation of Certified Emergency Manager (CEM) through the International Association of Emergency Managers. I was originally certified in 1997, re-qualified in 2002, and am currently re-qualifying in 2007.

Toronto is a highly urbanized area and has a population of 2.6 million people (5 million in the GTA - Greater Toronto Area). Toronto covers 641 sq. km. and stretches 43 km from east to west and 21 km from north to south at its longest points. The perimeter is approximately 180 km. Population density 4177/km^{2.} 34.8 per cent of the city's area is residential; 7.8 per cent industrial, 2.3 per cent commercial, 7.3 per cent institutional (schools, universities, churches and cemeteries).

Toronto is home to 90% of Canada's foreign banks and 80% of the largest R&D, law, advertising and high-tech firms. Nearly all Canadian banks and financial sector companies have their head office in Toronto. There are 75,000 businesses employing 1.2 million people, which is one sixth of all Canadian jobs.

There are 90 foreign consulates in Toronto. We are home to the 4^{th} largest airport in North America and we operate the 2^{nd} largest transit system in North America handling 450 million passengers each year.

The City of Toronto is faced with a variety of risks that could require a mass casualty response, including major industrial land use, an international airport, 3 smaller commuter airports, a port, major highway 401, miles of railway, trans-Canada pipeline, densely populated, major sporting venues with capacities exceeding 50,000, high-rise residential and office towers, tourist attractions etc. The eastern border of the City is located within 10 km of the Pickering Nuclear Generating Station which has six working reactors.

Union Station is also located in Toronto and serves as a hub for an inter-city trains. It carries over 63 million passengers every year (more than many major airports).

There were 444,544,000 passenger trips on the Toronto Transit Commission (TTC) system in 2006 (over 1.2 million trips daily). The TTC runs buses and subway system to serve the City.

Some industry partners are more cooperative than others. If they are federally regulated, there may be less cooperation and willingness to share information if it is felt that they only need to comply with the requirements of their regulators. In that environment, a request for information from a municipality may not be considered with adequate gravity without compelling legislation.

This lack of information reduces the comprehensiveness of municipal emergency plans to reduce or mitigate the risk and may hamper our ability to respond. Risks may be reduced through measures such as targeted public education, worker training, evacuation planning and increased integration between the operators of the facilities at risk and municipal responders.

The Toronto Police Service is lead agency in the development, maintenance and deployment of a counter-terrorism plan. They work closely within the law enforcement intelligence community, their provincial and federal counterparts and international contacts. TPS runs an exchange program with NYPD intelligence.

From a response point of view, Toronto has an equipped and trained Joint CBRN Response Team.

Since SARS and the 2003 Blackout, the emerging risks in global terrorism, pandemic diseases, climate change and technological convergence, it is not possible to answer this question in a definitive sense. The nature of emergency management is such that while we are prepared, we are continually moving forward in our preparedness activity.

We are unable to assess this as we do not have direct knowledge of federal emergency plans or their response and preparedness organizations. The response and coordinating abilities of the federal government have never been tested in any actual large scale events. Our belief is that real operational support to local municipalities is one of the shortcomings of the current hierarchy of emergency management in Canada.

This is borne from our experience with an event that is not comparable to the scale of Hurricane Katrina i.e. the evacuation and accommodation of refugees from Lebanon. The federal agencies that were involved did not demonstrate an adequate level of operational preparedness. At the onset of the emergency, there was prolonged debate during initial

teleconferences with federal and provincial levels to identify which ministry would be 'lead agency'. The lead agency coordinates the overall direction of the emergency response. Until that issue was resolved, City of Toronto staff in different divisions were contacted by federal and provincial agencies with requests for assistance to receive and accommodate the evacuees. These requests did not appear to be coordinated nor aligned with each other. At times, it seemed that the provincial and federal responders were not communicating details of their respective plans and activities to each other, while they both tried to provide direction for City of Toronto staff. At a debrief meeting following the termination of the emergency response, it was agreed that communications and mechanisms for coordination among responders at all levels need to be improved.

Therefore, we would surmise that in an event of the scale of Hurricane Katrina, the level of preparedness demonstrated by the federal government would have been insufficient.

We are confident that the provincial government will try to support municipal emergency response efforts. However, real operational (tangible) support is more difficult to assess as we unable to determine what resources they can deploy to support or complement what we have. It also depends on how the Province itself is impacted by the emergency. We have some information on what provincial resources are available but those resources may be deployed to assist others rather than us if the emergency is of sufficient scale.

The services provided by municipalities are very different than those provided by the provincial government. When we need help in an emergency, it is often in the way of front-line operational assistance. Often this type of support is not readily available from the Province.

It has been our experience that the City of Toronto is better positioned to provide key services direct to the public. In an emergency, the City needs assistance in terms of front-line operational support (people, equipment, vehicles, etc.) working under the direction of the municipal responders (emergency services, public health, building inspectors, works, etc.).

The Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) is a facility located almost on an entire floor of a low rise office building. The building is located in mid-town Toronto and houses other critical operations of the City. The EOC consists of the main briefing room, breakout work rooms, television monitors throughout, live news feeds from satellite and cable stations, computers, printers, faxes, internet connection, audio-visual aids, complete amateur radio capability, redundant back-up generators, media conferences capability, dedicated teleconferencing to City Hall, GIS and Mapping station, telephones, offices, touchdown stations, servery.

The JEPP process is not synchronized with municipal budgeting and spending cycles. It is very awkward to work within and increases the complexity of financing our emergency preparedness program. This problem has been expressed to provincial and federal officials many times over the years.

However, the need for more funding is constant as supplies expire and equipment becomes obsolete. If prices or specifications change between the time of the application and approval for expenditure, the paperwork needed to reconcile the differences in documentation is very onerous and time-consuming. The system needs to be more user-friendly, efficient and flexible.

The total federal budget of approximately \$8 million annually, shared nationally is inadequate. In contrast the US government has provided significant funding, directly to large urban municipalities across a much broader scope of projects.

There are competing priorities when a federal program is administered through the province, and municipalities have not been engaged in the decision process.

Annually. Some specialty programs have been successful, e.g., HUSAR, while others have been turned down ongoingly.

There should be base funding available that is predictable and stable to enable us to engage in multi-year planning for emergency plan development, exercises and corrective actions. Funding for correction action is often over-looked as the focus tends to remain on the response phase. Some corrective actions may involve changes to procedures, others may require capital expenditures, specialised multi-agency responder training, technology upgrades, stockpiling, recovery, public alerting, public education etc. Some of these initiatives have to be repeated and continual e.g. public education. We constantly compete for funding.

We maintain a website with information for the public on emergency management, distribute a City of Toronto booklet on personal preparedness, and make presentations to local groups and organizations as requested. We participate in Emergency Preparedness Week annually. However, like most issues in emergency management, we need to do more but are limited by funding constraints.

We rely on local media outlets to broadcast emergency messages (television, radio and internet). However, this is not 100% effective for inside/outside, daytime/night time notification. It is less effective during a major power outage, since not all media outlets have installed backup generators as part of their business continuity.

Toronto is one of the most media saturated markets in North America. When a major event occurs in Toronto it is well communicated through the media in all forms. There is no single system that will notify all people effectively accounting for the four long-standing, problematic variables of public alerting, i.e., Inside/Outside, Daytime/Nightime

We are participating on CANALERT working groups and sub-committees of the CRTC Interconnection Steering Committee (CISC) to develop new approaches for public alerting. The implementation of these initiatives will require sustained funding.

Notwithstanding the above comments, it should be acknowledged that during large events in Toronto, the media is a very effective means for mass communications. Events such as the power outage, the Air France crash, the flooding in 2005, were all broadcast almost immediately after occurring. I haven't come across any member of the public who was not aware of those incidents almost immediately.

The CANALERT initiative will address many of our concerns. The CRTC recently ruled to allow for unilaterally breaking in to local broadcasts when there is an impending threat to life, and doing the same but with the cooperation of the broadcasters when there is a threat to property

Toronto has established a Joint CBRN response team with police, fire and EMS. Team leaders conduct annual live agent training for members of their respective services in Suffield, Alberta, when there are funds. Some JEPP funds have been obtained for this program, and the Ontario Fire Marshall provides some annual support directly to Toronto Fire. The annual operating budget is administered through the Office of Emergency Management. Sustained funding from higher levels of government is required to sustain the team. With retirements and turnover, on-going training is required to ensure that skills are continually transferred to other members of the emergency services.

We rely on the private sector ISPs to be prepared for cyber-attacks as part of their business continuity. This risk is included in our Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment under the broader telecom heading, but is also considered under the terrorism sector. The City's IT is engaged in business continuity projects. A successful attack on the financial sector would be particularly impactive and they are active in their prevention strategies. Other critical infrastructure that may rely on such technology may be in provincial or federal jurisdictions and should be monitored accordingly e.g. power transmission grid, banking and financial institutions and any critical infrastructure that relies on the internet to operate properly.

No. The Canadian Emergency Management College cannot accommodate our numbers. Toronto Police have 7,000 staff, Toronto fire has 3,000 staff, Toronto EMS has 1,100 staff, Shelter Support & Housing Administration has 700 staff, Toronto Water has 1,500 staff, Corporate Security & Life Safety has 135 staff, etc.

In total, there are approximately 36,000 staff in City of Toronto. Obviously, not all of them require training at the federal facility in Ottawa, however, it demonstrates the challenges of size and scale that Toronto faces when training our workforce. The Toronto Office of Emergency Management fills most local training needs, but we are also unable to keep up with demand.

If a HUSAR team is made available to be deployed outside the community, in other jurisdictions, the total cost of equipping and maintaining the team should be borne federally and provincially. It should be treated as a shared, national resource that can be directed anywhere in Canada. As the technical and organizational skills of a HUSAR team are traditionally based on local first responders such as fire, police and emergency medical services, the team should remain embedded in the municipal domain. This will ensure seamless coordination, compatible communications (language and equipment), command and control with local emergency services.

Federal, Provincial and Municipal levels of government need to collaborate in a strong partnership to support a national Heavy Urban Search & Rescue program.
