

# MASTER OF FISHING VESSELS

The *Marine Personnel Regulations* (MPR) came into effect on July 1, 2007. They require the master of **any fishing vessel** to hold:

- a Master's certificate;
- a Small Vessel Operator Proficiency (SVOP) training certificate;
- a Pleasure Craft Operator Card (PCOC); or
- a declaration of at least seven fishing seasons as master of a fishing vessel of up to 15 gross tonnage or not more than 12 meters in length overall.

Requirements depend on the gross tonnage (GT) and length overall (LOA) of your vessel, and the type of voyage you make.

### **PHASE-IN DATES**

The requirements to hold a certificate, a training certificate or a declaration of at least seven fishing seasons for the master and any other person in charge of the deck watch come into effect on the date shown in the table below.

Vessels	Required Beginning
Vessels with LOA of over 15 m (49 ft 02 in) $$	November 7, 2008
Vessels with LOA of over 14 m (45 ft 11 in)	November 7, 2009
Vessels with LOA of over 13 m (42 ft 08 in) $$	November 7, 2010
Vessels with LOA of over 12 m (39 ft 04 in)	November 7, 2012
Vessels with LOA of over 6 m (19 ft 08 in)	November 7, 2015
Vessels of all lengths	November 7, 2016

**Note:** The length overall is the distance between the foremost point and the aftermost point of your vessel. To measure your length overall, you must include aft deck extensions (platforms). Do not include the bulbous bow.

#### PERSONS CERTIFIED TO KEEP WATCH

The MPR state that only a person who holds certain certificates may keep the deck watch at sea. Any time the master himself cannot keep watch—for example when resting—only a person holding the proper certificate may replace him/her.

In the case of fishing vessels of up to 15 gross tonnage or not more than 12 meters in length overall, the person who already had at least seven fishing seasons of experience before July 1, 2007, may hold only a *Declaration of at least seven fishing seasons as officer in charge of the deck watch of a fishing vessel of up to 15 gross tonnage or not more than 12 meters in length overall* to replace the master for keeping the deck watch.

This requirement will phase in on the same date the master must hold a certificate or a Declaration of seven fishing seasons, as shown in the previous table.

# **TYPES OF CERTIFICATES**

Different types of certificates and declarations may allow a master or officer of a fishing vessel to meet *Marine Personnel Regulations* (MPR) requirements.

**Certificates of competency** include *Fishing Master, Fourth Class*, and *Watchkeeping Officer of a fishing vessel of less than 24 meters in length overall.* To get these certificates, you must pass exams and meet other training and physical fitness requirements (see Table 1, at the back of this pamphlet). You must renew these certificates every five years as well as hold a medical certificate, which is valid for two years.

**Certificates of service** include *Certificate of service as Master of a fishing vessel of less than 60 gross tonnage* and *Certificate of Service as Watchkeeping mate of a fishing vessel of less than 24 metres in length overall.* These certificates are for people who already have at least 12 months of service before the MPR came into force (before July 1, 2007). To get a certificate of service as master, you must have experience as master. For the certificate of service as watchkeeping mate, you must have experience keeping watch. Some training is also required. Training depends on whether you have at least seven fishing seasons or less than seven fishing seasons (see Table 2). You must renew these certificates every five years.

The **Small Vessel Operator Proficiency training certificate (SVOP)** is obtained by taking a 26-hour training course at a recognized institution (see Table 3). The SVOP is valid for life.

The **Pleasure Craft Operator Card (PCOC)** is accepted only on fishing vessels operating in sheltered waters or within two nautical miles from shore, near coastal voyage, class 2 (see Table 3). The PCOC is valid for life.

### DECLARATION OF AT LEAST SEVEN FISHING SEASONS FOR EXPERIENCED FISHERMEN

If you already had at least seven fishing seasons before July 1, 2007, and work on a fishing vessel of not more than 15 gross tonnage or not more than 12 meters in length overall, you are not required to hold a certificate if you fish within 25 nautical miles from shore and, in certain cases, within 50 nautical miles from shore (see Table 3). You may complete and keep on board a Declaration of at least seven fishing seasons along with official documents such as testimonial(s) of sea service, letter from an association or owner, discharge book or fisherman's booklet as proof of seven fishing seasons acquired before July 1, 2007. If you do not hold such documents, you must have a Commissioner of Oaths authenticate your Declaration form.

# **CLASSES OF VOYAGES**

The Vessel Certificates Regulations contain the complete definitions of the different classes of voyages. Of most interest to fishermen are:

- Near coastal voyage, class 1: within 200 nautical miles from shore and up to the edge of the continental shelf, when the shelf is at over 200 nautical miles; and
- Near coastal voyage, class 2: within 25 nautical miles from shore.

#### MARINE EMERGENCY DUTIES (MED) COURSES

The MPR require all members of the minimum complement of a vessel to hold a training certificate in marine emergency duties. The members of the minimum complement are listed in the vessel's *Safe Manning Document*. Here are the Marine Emergency Duties requirements for fishing vessels:

- For fishing vessels on a voyage beyond 25 nautical miles, members of the minimum complement must hold a training certificate in MED A1.
- For fishing vessels of up to 15 gross tonnage or not more than 12 meters in length overall that do not have a minimum manning document, the master and at least one other crew member must hold at least a training certificate in MED A3, if the master does not fish alone.
- For fishing vessels of more than 15 gross tonnage and up to 150 gross tonnage that fish within 25 nautical miles from shore, members of the minimum complement must hold at least a training certificate in MED A3.

# PERSON DESIGNATED TO PROVIDE FIRST AID ON BOARD

The MPR require that at least one person be designated to provide first aid on board each fishing vessel. This person must hold at least a valid Marine Basic First Aid training certificate or a valid certificate from a two-day first aid course recognized by a province or a territory.

### **RADIOTELEPHONE OPERATOR CERTIFICATES**

Any person who uses a radiotelephone must hold at least a restricted radiotelephone certificate. To qualify for a Certificate of Competency, you should hold the *Restricted Operator's Certificate – Maritime Commercial* (ROC-MC). To obtain a Certificate of Service, you may present a *Restricted Operator Certificate with Maritime Qualification* (ROC-M) obtained after January 1, 2005, but it will be valid only for voyages no more than 25 nautical miles from shore.
