2011 Census of Population: Families, households, marital status, structural type of dwelling, collectives

The families and living arrangements of Canadians underwent further changes during the past five years, according to data from the 2011 Census of Population released on September 19, 2012. A more detailed analysis is available in the report, Portrait of Families and Living Arrangements in Canada. This analysis is complemented with four short articles on specific topics of interest in the Census in Brief series:

Census Profile

The 2011 Census of Population provides information on various levels of geography, including provinces and territories, census metropolitan areas, communities and census tracts. Use the tabs to search for an area of interest to you either by typing its place name or by browsing a list and entering a postal code or a geographic code.

Focus on Geography Series

The Focus on Geography Series provides you with quick access to key results from the Census at different levels of geography, including Canadian municipalities with a population of 5,000 or more.

Highlight tables

Highlight tables display information highlights by topic via key indicators for various levels of geography. For example, you can view the percent distributions and percentage changes from 2006. The tables let you perform simple rank and sort functions.
