# **New DND Projects Contracts Click into Place**

DCC managed the procurement process on behalf of DND for two construction projects announced this spring: a central heating plant in Nova Scotia and a naval officer training centre in British Columbia.

The heating plant will be built at CFB Greenwood by a Halifax company, Cardinal Construction Inc. In the announcement on May 1, Gen. Ray Henault, Chief of the Defence Staff, said, "The new central heating plant will increase both the reliability and efficiency of the base heating system, while reducing maintenance costs by 50 percent."

The two 50-year-old systems will be replaced by a single modern plant, which will use far less fuel and can be converted to natural gas.

The second project is at Venture, the naval officer training centre in Esquimalt, British Columbia.

It is already through its first phase. The newly announced second and third phases will add 86 doubleoccupation accommodations and a 1500-square-metre dining hall. Ottawa's Westeinde Construction Ltd. was awarded the contract by DCC on behalf of DND.

The new facilities replace older buildings at CFB Esquimalt's Work Point property.
