

The annual Shelter Capacity Report provides capacity statistics for emergency homeless shelters, transitional housing and violence against women (VAW) shelters in Canada. The number of shelter facilities and the number of permanent beds are reported for each province and territory, as well as by community.

The information contained in this report was obtained from the National Service Provider List as of November 1, 2012. The National Service Provider List is the only comprehensive listing of homeless shelters in Canada. It is compiled by the Homelessness Partnering Secretariat as part of the National Homelessness Information System (NHIS), a data development initiative that focuses on the collection and analysis of homeless shelter data in Canada.

Emergency Shelters are defined as facilities providing temporary and short-term accommodation for homeless individuals and families, which may include essential services such as food, clothing and counselling.

Transitional Housing provides temporary shelter, but can be differentiated from emergency shelters by the longer length of stay and greater intensity of support services offered to clients. Transitional housing is an intermediate step between emergency shelter and permanent housing. Support services help clients gain stability and self-sufficiency to maintain permanent housing. Stays may be between three months and three years.

Violence Against Women Shelters (VAW) are defined as facilities providing temporary shelter to women and women with children fleeing domestic abuse. They may function in either a crisis capacity or as transitional or second-stage housing.

Emergency shelters and transitional housing are further characterized according to the clients they serve



Men's shelters provide services to adult men



Women's shelters provide services to adult women



Youth shelters provide services to youth. Shelters have varying definitions of youth, including a range of ages between 12 and 29 years



Family shelters provide services to families and adults with dependants. Some accept single adult women without dependants




General shelters provide services to any combination of men or women with or without dependants, or youth

Highlights

Changes from 2011 to 2012

- The number of emergency shelters in Canada remained fairly stable from 2011 to 2012. The total number of shelters decreased marginally to 407 from 408 in 2011.
- The reported number of permanent emergency shelter beds increased by 102 in 2012, from 15,493 in 2011 to 15,595 in 2012.
- Changes in the reported number of shelters and beds between 2010, 2011 and 2012 primarily reflect updated information and better classification of shelter types, rather than actual changes in shelter capacity.


Average Number of Beds



Emergency Shelters

- 30% of emergency shelters in Canada are general shelters, serving a variety of clients.
- Family shelters account for 8% of all emergency shelters and 12% of emergency shelter beds.
- Nearly one quarter of emergency shelters in Canada serve youth exclusively; they account for approximately 9% of emergency shelter beds.
- Men's shelters and women's shelters account for a similar proportion of all shelters in Canada, but they differ in size, as men's shelters account for 35% of all shelter beds and women's shelters for 12%.


Emergency SheltersBreakdown of Clientele Served



Transitional Housing

- There are 233 transitional housing facilities, with 5,500 beds in Canada
- Just over 30% of these facilities serve the general population, while 32% serve youth exclusively
- 6% of transitional housing facilities serve families

Violence Against Women (VAW) Shelters

- In Canada, there are 442 VAW shelters with 6,729 beds
- Nearly 70% of the 442 VAW shelters are found in Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia
- VAW shelters, on average, have fewer beds (15) than transitional housing (24) or emergency shelters (38)

Men's Emergency Shelters

Of the 407 emergency shelters in Canada, 82 exclusively serve men. Men's emergency shelters account for 5,499 of the 15,595 emergency shelter beds in the country.

Women and Family Emergency Shelters

Of the 407 emergency shelters in Canada, 107 exclusively serve women, women with children or families. Women and family shelters account for 3,714 of the 15,595 emergency shelter beds in the country.

- 44 emergency shelters with 1,335 beds serve single women without children
- 29 emergency shelters with 576 beds serve women with children
- 34 emergency shelters with 1,803 beds serve families, including adult men with dependants

- 13 emergency shelters with 229 beds serve male youth
- 8 emergency shelters with 104 beds serve female youth
