First results from 2011 National Household Survey

On May 8, 2013, Statistics Canada released the first results from the 2011 National Household Survey (NHS).

The NHS was the largest survey ever conducted by Statistics Canada, with some 4.5 million households invited to take part. The voluntary survey included questions on such topics as place of birth, citizenship and immigration, ethnic origin, Aboriginal identity, language of work, education, labour market activity, income and housing.

The release on May 8 focuses on Aboriginal Peoples, and immigration and ethnocultural diversity. This release features two analytical reports:



Aboriginal Peoples in Canada: First Nations People, **Métis and Inuit**

This report provides a profile of the total Aboriginal population, and each of the Aboriginal groups: First Nations people, Métis and Inuit. It examines where Aboriginal people live and their age structure. The report also looks at the living arrangements of Aboriginal children.

Immigration and Ethnocultural Diversity in Canada

This report examines the size and geographic distribution of foreign-born people in Canada and particularly of those who arrived between 2006 and 2011, as well as their countries of birth and knowledge of official and non-official languages. The report also presents the ethnocultural origins of the

Canadian population, as well as data on visible minority status and religious affiliation.

NHS Focus on Geography series

Data and highlights on key topics found in the analytical products are also available for various standard levels of geography in the NHS Focus on Geography Series.

NHS Profile

The NHS Profile, 2011 presents information from the 2011 NHS for various levels of geography. Using the tabs, you can search for an area of interest by typing its 'place name' or browsing a list, by entering a postal code or by entering a geographic code.
