Residential property assessment values, 2006 to 2011



Which of Canada's 33 Census Metropolitan Areas (CMA) experienced the highest growth in total property values from 2006 to 2011, and which CMA had the highest per dwelling value in 2011?

This is Statistics Canada's **first** release of estimates for residential property assessment values.

Residential property comprises all types of properties categorized as residential for assessment purposes in the majority of provinces. It includes single and multi-family properties, farm residences, cottages and vacation homes, mobile homes, institutional and communal residences, and vacant lands that are lawfully usable for residential purposes.

Report on energy supply and demand in Canada



Primary energy production in Canada increased 3.7% between 2010 and 2011 to 16,801 petajoules. This followed a 1.0% increase in 2010.

Crude oil made up the largest proportion of primary energy production in Canada in 2011, at 41.1%. This was followed by natural gas (36.2%), primary electricity (10.0%) and coal (8.8%).

Store and non-store retailers' operating revenue increased 4.6% in 2011 to \$488.2 billion. There were increases in 10 out of 12 retail sub-sectors.

In dollar terms, gasoline stations, motor vehicle and parts dealers and non-store retailers contributed to more than 70% of the total operating revenue growth.

Gross domestic product by industry: Provinces and territories, 2012

Real gross domestic product (GDP) by industry increased in eight provinces and all of the territories in 2012. GDP declined in Newfoundland and Labrador and New Brunswick. Nationally, real GDP rose 1.8% in 2012 after increasing 2.6% in 2011.

Among the provinces, growth surpassed the national average in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Real GDP increased 4.3% in Nunavut, the fastest pace of any region.

Video: 'Statistics: The invisible made visible'


2013 is a big year for statisticians.
