Did you know October 21-27, 2013 was Open Access Week? In light of that, we want to remind every funded researcher that they must comply with the CIHR Open Access Policy. While we encourage researchers to make their publications accessible for free as soon as possible after publication, it is mandatory to do so within 12 months of publication – at the latest. Read more about CIHR's Open Access Policy and the two ways to comply.

On October 22 & 23, our Research Ambassadors (RAs) - a panel of non-scientist consumers identified by health charities relevant to IMHA – met with us to choose the winning abstracts for the 2013 "IMHA Research Ambassadors Knowledge Translation Award". It is important that researchers be able to communicate their work to a general audience and a variety of stakeholders; IMHA hopes that this award will encourage success in this area. CIHR recognizes the importance of planning and dissemination activities and will continue to support these activities through the Institute Community Support (ICS) Program going forward.

The ICS Program is designed to allow Institutes and Initiatives the flexibility to tailor programs to meet the needs of their communities and to foster community development. The new planning and dissemination program under the ICS model is proposed to launch twice per year with application intakes in February and August. The first launch is planned for December 2013 with


Knowledge Translation Corner



Achieving the goal of patient-oriented care, where the right patient receives the right treatment at the right time, takes time and effort. What kinds of changes are necessary to ensure that promising research advances are brought quickly to the point of care? How do we alter the research process and the health care system to fully integrate the patient point of view? CIHR-supported researchers are already conducting work that illustrates the benefits of patient-oriented care.

The stories in this Fall edition of <u>Show Me the Evidence</u> highlight:

- An innovative research initiative that is using advances in genomic technology to provide answers to parents of children with rare diseases;
- Efforts to synthesize relevant research to inform Saskatchewan's health care reform plans; and,
- A new evidence-based tool to improve classification of the impacts caused by cerebral palsy.

Ethics Update 2013 - What does "knowledge translation" mean for ethics research?

At the words "ethics" and "research", what may first come to mind is a research ethics board poring over submissions for ethics approval before eager researchers can receive their funds and their studies begin. Or perhaps you first think of a code of ethical conduct in research, such as the Research Integrity Policy contained in the Tri-Agency Framework for Responsible Conduct of Research.

In this **Update 2013**, however, the focus is on ethics re-

searchers: the cadre of those whose area of inquiry is health ethics or, for some, the intertwined ethical, legal and/or social issues (ELSI) in the health domain. At the core of CIHR's legislated mandate is not only the creation of scientific knowledge, but also its translation into health-related benefits. Celebrating the Impact of Health Research: Patient Involvement in Peer-to-Peer Mentoring

When no one else understands: Arthritis patients learn they don't have to 'go it alone' in their journey

Arthritis cross-disciplinary research with consumer involvement leads to the development of a Peer-to-Peer Mentoring program

he benefits of peer support programs are well documented, but rheumatologist and arthritis researcher Dr. Mary Bell from Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre noted this kind of therapy was missing from the early inflammatory arthritis (EIA) treatment landscape. Dr. Bell was curious to investigate the impact a peer support program could bring to people living with EIA. Specifically, what would result from pairing a newly diagnosed person with someone who has been living with and managing their arthritis for several years?

The team that Dr. Bell brought together was made up of researchers and two patients – also known as a 'consumers' - Dawn Richards, PhD from the Canadian Arthritis Network's Consumer Advisory Council, and Jennifer Boyle PhD. They began by conducting an intensive literature review from which an intervention model was developed and tested on nine EIA patients who were paired with a peer best matching their needs based on factors such as age and work status. The pairs met face to face or by phone once a week for 12 weeks. At the completion of the study, both mentees and mentors experienced improvements in the overall impact of arthritis on their life, coping efficacy and social support (effect size>0.3).

"It's a lot like what online communities are accomplishing by bringing together people with a shared disease experience to support each other," says Dr. Dawn Richards.

Building on that study, a pilot randomized control trial (RCT) was conducted from 2011-2013 (supported with a grant from the Canadian Initiative for Outcomes in Rheumatology care), comparing patients who received peer support and those who received usual rheumatology standard of care. The results showed that early peer support for individuals with EIA improved perceived social support but had little effect on the use of treatment, self-efficacy, health-related quality of life, disease activity, level of anxiety, and other measures.

"What I didn't expect is how being a mentor in the program would lead me back to re-examine what I had learned over the years, the things I did well to self-manage and the things I could have done a whole lot better," said Catherine Hofstetter, one of the mentors in the study. "I dare say I learned as much or more as my men-

tee did, and we developed a friendship with mutual respect, understanding and eagerness to learn and live well."

In fact, Drs. Mary Bell and Jennifer Stinson at the Hospital for Sick Children have been awarded a Canadian Institute for Health Research (CIHR) Grant to develop an online version of peer to peer mentoring for adolescents. The research team is now seeking funding to do a larger RCT in the adult population. Research thus far has been made possible in part through funding from the Canadian Arthritis Network (CAN), Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) Canadian Initiative for Outcomes in Rheumatology Care (CIORA). The Canadian Arthritis Network is a research network funded under the Networks of Centres of Excellence (NCE) program.
