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## 1.0 Overview of Canada Council funding to New Brunswick in 2006-07

- In 2006-07, the Canada Council for the Arts provided grants totaling \$2.1 million to the arts in New Brunswick.
- In addition to grants, \$152,550 in payments was provided to 334 authors through the Public Lending Right Program in 2006-07.<sup>1</sup> This brings the total funding to New Brunswick to over \$2.26 million.
- The Canada Council awarded \$195,250 (9%) to 20 artists and over \$1.9 million (91%) to 53 New Brunswick arts organizations in 2006-07.
- Grants were awarded to artists and arts organizations in New Brunswick in all disciplines: dance, interdisciplinary arts, music, media arts, theatre, visual arts and writing and publishing. In 2006-07, the largest amount of funding went to visual arts (\$505,599). Writing and publishing received the second largest amount of funding awarded (\$483,350), while theatre received \$433,150.
- 313 applications from New Brunswick artists and arts organizations were submitted to the Canada Council in 2006-07, representing 2.0% of the total number of received applications.
- Funding to artists and arts organizations in Moncton totaled \$739,845, comprising 35.1% of the total funding going to New Brunswick. Fredericton received \$652,104 in funds, representing 30.9% of total funding. The communities of Caraquet (\$222,400) and Sackville (\$213,600) also received significant amounts of funding. A total of 22 additional communities in New Brunswick received the remaining 13.3% of all funding to the province in 2006-07.
- In 2006-07, New Brunswick artists received 0.9% of Canada Council funding to artists, and New Brunswick arts organizations received 1.6% of the funding to arts organizations. In total, New Brunswick artists and arts organizations received 1.5% of Canada Council funding. In comparison, New Brunswick represents 2.3% of the total population of Canada,<sup>2</sup> and 1.4% of Canadian artists.<sup>3</sup>
- As a result of the increase to the Canada Council's parliamentary appropriation (for the fiscal years 2006-07 and 2007-08) announced in the federal budget of May 2006, 15 arts organizations in New Brunswick received \$353,500 over a two year period as part of the Supplementary Operating Funds Initiative.
- 16 New Brunswick artists and arts professionals served as peer assessors in 2006-07, making up 2.1% of all peer assessors. 43.8% of New Brunswick assessors were Anglophone, and 56.3% were Francophone.

## 2.0 Statistical highlights about the arts in New Brunswick<sup>4</sup>

- In New Brunswick, one-quarter of the province's 1,800 artists reside in Moncton (260) or Saint John (185).
- Between 1991 and 2001, the number of artists doubled in Moncton. This is tied for the sixth-highest growth rate among 92 large Canadian cities. There was also very significant growth in the arts in Saint John (23%).
- Between 1991 and 2001, the arts labour force in Moncton grew at a rate that was over seven times higher than growth in the overall local labour force.
- New Brunswickers spent "\$500 million on cultural goods and services in 2005, which equals 3.2% of total consumer spending in the province. The \$500 million in consumer spending on culture is almost four times larger than the \$130 million spent on culture in New Brunswick by all levels of government in 2003/04. On a per capita basis, New Brunswickers' cultural spending ranks eighth in the country at \$709 per resident."<sup>5</sup>

### *Examples of Canada Council funding in New Brunswick<sup>6</sup>*

The Canada Council supports the endeavours of professional artists and arts organizations through its programs. The following selection illustrates the scope of the activities supported by the Canada Council in New Brunswick.

In 2006-07 **Robin Ettles** of Pointe-du-Chêne received **\$6,000** through the **Grants to Professional Musicians (Individuals) - Non-Classical Music (Popular Traditions) of All World Cultures** program to research and compose for three months. As a first-time grant recipient, **Ettles** proposed a project for a “sound recording of 12 pieces/songs, composed in 12 different New Brunswick municipalities, with the theme of interpreting musical identity in New Brunswick.” During her stay in each municipality, **Ettles** will take a reading of the community’s dialect, pulse (interpretation of the community’s beats per minute), musical key (overall tone and feel), genre of music enjoyed, arts practiced and sounds specific to each.

The **Inter-Arts Program: Dissemination Grants** awarded **\$20,000** to Moncton’s **Association acadienne des artistes professionnel(le)s du N.-B. (AAAPNB)** to organize the **États généraux des arts et de la culture dans la société acadienne au Nouveau-Brunswick (Summit on Arts and Culture in New Brunswick’s Acadian Society)** from May 2 to 6, 2007. The **AAAPNB** is the official body for the promotion and defence of the rights and the interests of francophone professional artists of New Brunswick. The summit was a collective undertaking that enabled all sectors of Acadian society to reflect on the role and importance of arts and culture in the development of New Brunswick’s Acadian society.

Markhamville multiple award-winning ceramist and sculptor **Peter Powning** was awarded the Canada Council’s **\$25,00 Saidye Bronfman Award** in 2006 for excellence in the crafts. **Powning** is known for his mixed-media works created by the manipulation and transformation of clay, glass and metals, through fire. New Brunswick Crafts Council’s Executive Director Kate Rogers nominated **Powning** and wrote “Not only is he informed by his natural surroundings, but his shapes embody earthly elements. This symbol represents a dedication that Peter brings to his life and to his work – balance between humankind and nature, production and sculpture, practice and ideal.”

Rap/spoken word artist and beat composer **Phyllis Grant** from Pabineau First Nation received **\$4,900** from the **Grants to Aboriginal Writers, Storytellers and Publishers** program to work on a book of poetry entitled **Awti** in 2006-07. **Grant** will spend seven months to gather information and write approximately 30 poems. Of the book **Grant** wrote: “the poems will be written about my journey – and the ‘dreamprints’ or reflections of my experience as a Mi’gmaq woman today.” **Grant**’s writing is a “collective array of ideas meant to inspire people to push farther – at their own discretion – despite labels, circumstances, statistics or stereotypes – and have fun doing it.”

The **Atlantic Ballet Theatre of Canada (ABTC)** located in Moncton received two **Dance Touring Grants** totaling **\$90,000** for three presentations of their show **Amadeus** in Quebec, British Columbia and Saskatchewan in 2006-07. **Amadeus** is a full-length dramatic and energetic ballet created by **ABTC's** Artistic Director **Igor Dobrovolskiy** in which the "music of Mozart and Salieri is interwoven with a spell-binding plot and larger-than-life characters. The riveting story traces the life of Mozart through his music and examines his isolation by a society that accepts the musical works but not the composer." While touring, **ABTCB** will offer Master Classes to the dance communities in all three provinces.

In 2006-07 the **Assistance to Practitioners, Critics and Curators in Architecture** program awarded **\$20,000** to architect **John Leroux** of Fredericton to research, assemble and curate an exhibition and accompanying publication entitled **Building New Brunswick**. The exhibition will take place at the Beaverbrook Art Gallery and will "promote the distinction significance, and value of the entire range of modern (post-1945) architecture within New Brunswick, and include works from all regions of the province." **Leroux**, a first-time grant recipient, will include architectural plans, photographs, models and building tools in the exhibition to bring into focus an overlooked aesthetic period that he feels deserves reexamination.

Moncton's **Atelier d'estampe Imago** received a **\$12,000** grant from the **Visual Arts - Supplementary Operating Funds Initiative** for several projects including a traveling exhibition and the creation of a virtual gallery. The exhibition, **Le Tourist II**, will include 10 15x15cm prints by **Imago's** members, all displayed in a suitcase which will travel to venues across Canada. The virtual gallery project will allow **Imago's** members to combine traditional and new technologies to create digital works which will be displayed on their website. **Imago** is the only artist-run production centre for contemporary print artists in New Brunswick and the only francophone production centre outside Quebec.

Author **Sara O'Leary** of St. Martins was awarded **\$20,000** through the **Grants to Professional Writers - Creative Writing** program to work on a young adult novel tentatively entitled **Malone Alone** in 2006-07. **Malone Alone** is aimed at readers from approximately 9 to 12 years of age and makes reference to James de Mille's 1870 novel *Lost in the Fog*. **O'Leary** wrote: "In that novel a boy is lost at sea and part of the story is set in Quaco, New Brunswick, which happens to be part of St. Martin's community. I plan to use this novel to impart a sense of history to Malone, the boy in the story. It also parallels the story I want to tell about a young boy's growing independence and self-sufficiency."

**Amanda Fauteux** will present her film entitled **You Love Chinese Food** at the 8th Dawson City International Short Film Festival in April 2007 with the aid of a **\$1,500** grant from the **Travel Grants to Media Artists** program. **Fauteux**, a first-time grant applicant and recipient, graduated with a BFA from Mount Allison University in 2006 and currently lives and works in Sackville. **You Love Chinese Food** tells the story of a "young couple about to be married, with all of their doubts, fears and the true reason they have remained friends." As an emerging artist, **Fauteux** will be able to further her artistic practice through meeting other filmmakers and artists and speaking about her work at the festival.

Fredericton's **Motion Ensemble** participated in the Sound Symposium XIII in St John's, Newfoundland, from July 7 to 15, 2006 with **\$4,800** from the **Music Festival Travel Grants** program. **Motion Ensemble** is a chamber music group comprised of **Andrew R. Miller** (bass), **Helen Pridmore** (soprano), **Nadia Francavilla** (violin), **Karin Aurell** (flute), **Richard Hornsby** (clarinet) and **D'Arcy Philip Gray** (percussion/electronics). While at the festival, **Motion Ensemble** participated in the Cape Spear Project in which various Sound Symposium artists joined together for a late night performance and improvisation.

Fredericton's **NotaBle Acts Theatre** produced a new work entitled **Lutz** by **Ryan Griffith** with a **\$15,000** grant awarded by the **Theatre Production Project Grants: Established Artists' Development /Production** program in 2006-07. **Griffith** is a young dramatist and talented writer who recently graduated from the Playwriting program at the National Theatre School of Canada in Moncton. **Lutz** is **Griffith's** first full-length play. As he wrote, it "confronts emotion, discourse and memory. It simultaneously tells two stories occurring in two different time frames, both centering on a tragedy that befell one rural New Brunswick family." The play premiered at the **NotaBle Acts** Summer Theatre Festival in July 2006.

In 2006-07 the **Project Assistance to Visual Arts and Fine Craft Organizations** program awarded a **\$7,400** grant to **Mount Allison University Department of Fine Arts** in Sackville for their visiting artist series entitled **Politics of Individuality**. From February 2007 through February 2008 artists from Toronto, New York, Vancouver and Dartmouth will give public presentations, facilitate workshops, give studio visits, and participate in panel discussions giving embodiment to the theme **Politics of Individuality**. With this project the **Department of Fine Arts** seeks to "create an ongoing forum in the Sackville community and beyond wherein singular voices and visions are heard and seen."

Big Cove's **Elsipogtog Elders Advisory Group** received **\$20,000** from the **Elder/Youth Legacy Program: Support for Aboriginal Artistic Practices Pilot Program** in 2006-07 to instruct youth in the art of basket making. The Group is a first-time grant applicant and recipient and has chosen Elder **Joe John Sanipass** to teach the art of basket making to a group of youth from the community who they feel are in need of spirituality and rediscovery. In addition to teaching basket making **Sanipass** will also share his traditional knowledge of "ceremonial aspects such as the Sacred Fire, Sweat Lodge, Pipe Ceremony, Fasting, Sunrise Ceremony, Teaching Circles, Healing Ceremony and other ceremonial rituals."

Moncton's **Front des réalisateurs indépendants du Canada (FRIC)** received **\$20,000** from the **Development Project Grants** program to organize activities at two festivals in 2006-07. The **FRIC** (Independent Directors' Front of Canada) is a young organization established in 2004 to represent Francophone directors. **FRIC** presented round table discussions at the Festival international du cinéma francophone en Acadie in Moncton from September 15 to 21, 2006 and the Rendez-vous du cinéma québécois (RVCQ) in Montreal from February 15 to 27, 2007. Through participation in these festivals, **FRIC** members were able to take part in personal development activities including workshops and discussions, network with other directors and discuss the possibility of future collaborations with RV

#### 4.0 Overall arts and culture funding in New Brunswick by all three levels of government<sup>7</sup>

- Arts and culture funding to New Brunswick from all three levels of government stood at \$131.9 million in 2003-04 (the latest year of overall data from Statistics Canada).
- Federal funding was the largest part of total government expenditures at 42.5% (\$56.0 million), closely followed by provincial funding share at 39.4% (\$52.1 million). 18.1% (\$23.9 million) of total government expenditures to New Brunswick came from municipal sources.
- Federal government cultural funding to New Brunswick totaling \$56.0 million is primarily concentrated (85%) in three areas – broadcasting, heritage resources (historic parks/sites and nature/provincial parks) and performing arts. The remaining 15% of funding (\$8.2 million) is allocated to areas including film and video (\$3.2 million) and multidisciplinary arts (\$2.9 million). In the comparable year (2003-04), Canada Council funding accounted for 3% of all federal cultural spending in New Brunswick.
- Between 1999-00 and 2003-04, federal cultural spending in New Brunswick increased from \$49 million to \$56.1 million (an increase of 15%). During the same period, Canada Council funding in New Brunswick increased from \$1.5 million to \$1.8 million.
- The largest part of provincial government funding is concentrated in two areas – libraries and heritage resources (79% or \$41 million). However, funding is also allocated by the provincial government to multidisciplinary arts (\$2.8 million), arts education (\$2.2 million), performing arts (\$2.0 million) and film and video (\$1.7 million).

## 5.0 Detailed tables of Canada Council funding to New Brunswick

### *Canada Council for the Arts funding to New Brunswick*

- Since 1999-00, Canada Council funding to New Brunswick has increased, rising from \$1.5 million in 1999-00 to \$2.1 million in 2006-07 (an increase of 36.00%).
- In terms of percentage of total grants from the Canada Council, funding to New Brunswick has registered small variations over the past eight years, and stands in 2006-07 at 1.50%, the same as in 1999-00.

**Grant applications from New Brunswick**

- Since 1999-00, the number of grant applications from New Brunswick has increased from 235 in 1999-00 to 313 in 2006-07, a substantial increase of 33.19%. The total share of grant applications from New Brunswick artists and arts organizations between 1999-00 and 2005-06 has varied very little ranging from 1.51% to 1.68%, however it now stands at 2.00%. New Brunswick's share of grant applications (2.00%) is higher than its share of artists (1.40%) and is lower than its share of population (2.31%) – see Table 7.

*New Brunswick – Various comparisons with other provinces<sup>8</sup>*

- In terms of its level of Canada Council funding, New Brunswick is in eighth place at 1.50%. The province's share of funding is slightly higher than its share of artists, but is lower than its share of applications and significantly lower than its share of population. New Brunswick ranks 11<sup>th</sup> in terms of Canada Council funding on a per capita basis per province at \$2.89.
