

Percentage of children living in low income falls in 2016

According to the Census Family After-tax Low-Income Measure (CFLIM-AT), 19.6% of children lived in low income in 2016, down from 20.9% in 2015. The concept underlying the CFLIM-AT is that all persons in a census family are in low income if their family after-tax income is below half of the median after-tax income, adjusting for family size.

About one in eight workers say they have started to look for a new job


In Canada, 12% of paid workers reported that they had taken steps to find a new job in the previous month. This proportion has been on the rise since the mid-1990s, when it was around 5%. These findings come from a new study called "Workers looking for a new job." The study examines the reasons why these workers want to leave their job.

The population clock also models how often, and where, births, deaths and migrations are occurring.

Little change in new home prices in May

Canadian new house prices remained unchanged on a national basis in May, for a third consecutive month. New housing prices were flat or declined in 15 of the 27 census metropolitan areas surveyed in May. Recent



mortgage rate hikes, along with tighter mortgage regulations, may have slowed the demand for new homes.
