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Commentary

For the second consecutive month, employment edged down with a slight decline of 13,000 in March. This leaves employment 0.1% (-20,000) below the level at the start of the year. In March, the unemployment rate edged up 0.1 percentage points to 7.5%.

Over the first three months of 2004, an increase of 61,000 full-time jobs partly offset a decline of 81,000 part-time jobs. This contrasts with the last four months of 2003 when employment grew sharply, mostly in full-time work.

Continued weakness in youth employment

While youth employment was little changed in March, it is down 36,000 so far in 2004, with most of the decline occurring in February. Youth employment had shown signs of improvement towards the end of 2003, however, it has weakened since then and is now 1.6% below the level of a vear ago.

For adult women, employment declined by 18,000 in March, all in part-time (-28,000). Despite this decrease, the trend is up with growth of 1.8% (+113,000) since last August when employment regained momentum. Employment gains among adult women over this period have been in full-time iobs.

In March, the number of adult men with jobs increased slightly (+11,000). Since last August, gains for adult men total 81,000 (+1.1%), with increases in full and part-time jobs. Over this period, the pace of employment growth has been slower for adult men than for adult women.


Industry employment

Employment decreased by 20,000 in business, building and other support services, bringing declines since the start of 2004 to 28,000 (-4.4%). This recent decline follows gains totalling 43,000 (+7.2%) in the last four months of 2003. Losses in March were mainly in employment and travel services.

Employment fell by 19,000 in educational services, mostly in primary and secondary schools. The decline was spread across several provinces. The decrease in March offset the gain in February, leaving employment in the sector little changed from a year ago.

There were also job losses in information, culture and recreation (-14,000) in March, with the decline mainly in amusement, gambling and recreation. Despite this decrease, employment in information, culture and recreation is up 31,000 from March 2003.





Unemployment rate



In March, employment rose by 15,000 in finance, insurance, real estate and leasing. This brings gains since June 2003, when employment growth in the sector began to accelerate. to 41,000 (+4.4%).

In March, employment in manufacturing was little changed for the fourth consecutive month, leaving losses since November 2002, when the downward trend started, at 76,000 (-3.2%).

Job losses in Ontario

Employment in Ontario fell by 25,000 in March, mostly in business, building and other support services. The decline in this sector was mainly in employment services. There were also job losses in information, culture and recreation, mostly in amusement, gambling and recreation. Employment in manufacturing increased by 13,000 in March with gains of 25,000 (+2.3%) since last October. Despite overall employment losses in March, gains total 66,000 (+1.1%) since last August when job growth in the province regained momentum. In March, the unemployment rate increased by 0.5 percentage points to 7.1%.

Employment rose by 4,000 in Newfoundland and Labrador with the largest gains in retail sales and construction. Despite fluctuations in recent months, employment has trended up 2.2% over the last year. In March, the unemployment rate fell 1.0 percentage points to 15.5%.

In Quebec, employment was little changed for the third consecutive month. In March, employment gains in professional, scientific and technical services and slight increases in manufacturing and health care and social assistance jobs were offset by declines in a number of other sectors, most notably educational services. The unemployment rate edged down 0.2 percentage points to 8.6%.

In British Columbia, employment in March was little changed as an increase of 18,000 in full-time employment was partly offset by a decline of 13,000 part-time jobs. Despite a large decline in February, job gains since last May total 37,000 (+1.8%). In March, the unemployment rate was unchanged at 7.9%.

There was little change in employment in the other provinces in March.

Rebound in hours worked in Nova Scotia and **Prince Edward Island**


While hours worked at the national level edged down 0.1% in March, there was a substantial increase of 19.5% in Nova Scotia and 15.3% in Prince Edward Island. The strong increase in hours worked in both provinces represents a rebound from the effects of the winter storm that forced many people to miss work in February.


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
Employment and unemployment indicators, seasonally adjusted, Canada




Index of employment by industry, Canada, seasonally adjusted, January 2001 = 100




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
















Data Quality

About the Labour Force Survey

The statistics contained in this report are based on information obtained through a sample survey of 53,000 representative households across the country. The Labour Force Survey, started in November 1945, was taken at quarterly intervals until November 1952. It has been carried out monthly since then. The information generated by the survey has expanded considerably over the years with a major redesign of the survey content in 1976 and again in 1997, and provides a rich and detailed picture of the Canadian labour market.

The sample used in the Labour Force Survey has been designed to represent all persons in the population 15 years of age and over residing in the provinces of Canada, with the exception of the following: persons living on Indian reserves, full-time members of the armed forces and people living in institutions (for example, inmates of penal institutions and patients in hospitals or nursing homes who have resided in the institution for more than six months). Monthly estimates of employment, unemployment and persons not in the labour force refer to the specific week covered by the survey each month, normally the week containing the 15th day.

Definitions and explanations

The **labour force** is composed of those members of the civilian non-institutional population 15 years of age and over who, during the reference week, were employed or unemployed.

Employed persons are those who, during the reference week:

- a) did any work at all
- b) had a job but were not at work

A person is considered to be **full-time** if his/her usual hours at the main job are greater than 29 hours per week. When the number of hours worked at the main job is usually less than 30 hours per week then he/she is considered to be part-time.

Unemployed persons are those who, during the reference

- a) were without work, had actively looked for work in the past four weeks (ending with reference week), and were available for work:
- b) had not actively looked for work in the past four weeks but were on temporary layoff and were available for work;
- c) had not actively looked for work in the past four weeks but had a new job to start in four weeks or less from the reference week, and were available for work.

Persons in the civilian non-institutional population 15 years of age and over who, during the reference week, were neither employed nor unemployed are classified as not in the labour force.

The unemployment rate represents the number of unemployed persons expressed as a percentage of the labour force. The unemployment rate for a particular group (age, sex, etc.) is the number unemployed in that group expressed as a percentage of the labour force for that group.

The participation rate represents the labour force expressed as a percentage of the population 15 years of age and over. The participation rate for a particular group (age, sex, etc.) is the labour force in that group expressed as a percentage of the population for that group.

The employment rate (formerly the employment/ population ratio) represents the number of persons employed expressed as a percentage of the population 15 years of age and over. The employment rate for a particular group (age, sex, etc.) is the number employed in that group expressed as a percentage of the population for that group.

The part-time rate represents the number of persons employed part-time expressed as a percentage of the employed. The part-time rate for a particular group (age, sex, etc.) is the number employed part-time in that group expressed as a percentage of the employed for that group.

All geographic regions are based on the 1996 Census boundaries.

Seasonal adjustment

Fluctuations in economic time series are caused by seasonal, cyclical and irregular movements. A seasonally adjusted series is one from which seasonal movements have been eliminated. Seasonal movements are defined as those which are caused by regular annual events such as climate, holidays, vacation periods and cycles related to crops, production and retail sales associated with Christmas and Easter. The seasonally adjusted series contains irregular as well as longer-term cyclical fluctuations. The seasonally adjusted series are revised each year to take into account current data and to generate new forecast factors for the next twelve months. The data are therefore subject to slight revisions in future issues of this publication.

Sampling error

Estimates in this publication are based on the Labour Force Survey, a monthly survey of approximately 53,000 households across Canada. Because they are based on a sample survey, the estimates are subject to sampling error. Changes in the level of any estimates between two months can be the result of a true change or sampling variability. In most tables in this publication an indicator of the sampling error is provided. Two thirds of the time, a change greater than the sampling error indicates a real change. Movements in estimates that are smaller than the sampling error are less likely to reflect a real change and more likely to be due to sampling variability. While the above is true for monthly movements, one can have more confidence in a series of consecutive movements in the same direction, even though some of the monthly movements may be smaller than the sampling error.
