Vacancy Rates Edge Lower in Manitoba Urban Centres

Vacancy rates in most of Manitoba's urban centres tightened in 2004 according to results of Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation's annual Rental Market Survey. Vacancy rates in Winnipeg and Brandon remain the lowest in the province at 1.1 and 1.0 per cent respectively, while the vacancy rate in Portage la Prairie was 6.1 per cent and was 9.9 per cent in Thompson.

The vacancy rate in the Winnipeg CMA decreased by 0.2 of a percentage point, going from 1.3 per cent in 2003 to 1.1 per cent in the October 2004 survey. This represents its lowest point since 1985. Over the last few years, the Winnipeg CMA has experienced several factors favourable to the rental markets. Demand is coming from positive net migration, particularly among international migrants who tend to first seek rental accommodation when they arrive. As well, some empty-nesters are taking advantage of price gains in the resale market, selling their homes and choosing to rent. Continued shortages in the resale market are also making it difficult for renters to make the jump to home-ownership as they face a lack of choice and rising prices. These factors, coupled with few additions to the rental stock, have caused the vacancy rate in Winnipeg to hover around one per cent since 2001.

The overall average apartment rent increased in the Winnipeg CMA in 2004, rising from \$554 to \$568 per month, an increase of 2.5 per cent. New construction, renovations to the rental stock and increased utility costs have contributed to an increase in average rent above the rent control guideline of 1.5 per cent in effect for 2004.

The Brandon rental market has also been facing pressures from high levels of demand. Positive job creation in the city has attracted many new migrants seeking rental accommodation and the Brandon rental market universe has not seen any substantial additions to its stock during the course of 2004 to meet this increased demand. The vacancy rate has therefore decreased slightly from 1.1 per cent in October 2003 to 1.0 per cent this October. The greatest decline came in Bachelor suites where the vacancy rate dropped from 2.4 per cent to 1.1 per cent. Vacancy rates in other bedroom types were all near one per cent. Despite the tighter market, average rents did not increase substantially; two-bedroom units, the most common type in the area, saw the average rent increase by 1.4 per cent, from \$566 one year ago to \$574 this October.

The overall vacancy rate in Portage La Prairie also dropped slightly over the past

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year. The total average apartment vacancy rate was 6.1 per cent in 2004, down from 6.8 per cent in 2003. The decrease in vacancy was felt in one- and two- bedroom units, while the vacancy rate for three-bedroom units increased. Average rents increased by 4.3 per cent, the greatest increase of all the urban centres. Increases were greater for one-bedroom units which comprise 40 per cent of the universe and where average rents went from \$433 to \$457 per month for an increase of 5.5 per cent.

Thompson was the only urban centre of those surveyed in the province to record an increase in vacancy rate. Total vacancy rose from 7.9 per cent in October of 2003 to 9.9 per cent in 2004. Much of this increase can be attributed to the return of 69 units to the rental market following renovation. The average rent for all units was reported at \$512, an increase of three per cent compared to the October 2003 survey.
