

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# **Note to Users:**

The 2002 release of provincial gross domestic product (GDP) by industry has incorporated the major classification and conceptual changes of the 2001 data released in CANSIM table 379-0025. The most important changes are: replacement of the 1980 Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) with the 1997 North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS); rebasing from 1992 to 1997 prices, i.e., updating the price structure used to derive constant price GDP; a change in valuation from factor cost to basic prices; and the capitalization of computer software.

The GDP of an industry is the value added by labour and capital in transforming inputs purchased from other industries into outputs. The estimates presented here are valued at 1997 prices.

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# The System of National Accounts

In Canada, the National Accounts have been developed since the close of the Second World War in a series of publications relating to their constituent parts. These have now reached a stage of evolution where they can be termed a "System of National Accounts". For purposes of identification, all publications (containing tables of statistics, descriptions of conceptual frameworks and descriptions of sources and methods) which make up this System carry the term "System of National Accounts" as a general title.

The System of National Accounts in Canada consists of several parts. The annual and quarterly Income and Expenditure Accounts (included with Catalogue Nos. carrying the prefix 13) were, historically speaking, the first set of statistics to be referred to with the title "National Accounts" (National Accounts, Income and Expenditure). The Balance of International Payments data (Catalogue Nos. with prefix 67), are also part of the System of National Accounts and they, in fact, pre-date the Income and Expenditure Accounts.

Greatly expanded structural detail on industries and on goods and services is portrayed in the Input-Output Tables of the System (Catalogue Nos. with prefix 15). The Catalogue Nos. carrying the prefix 15 also provide measures of the contribution of each industry to total Gross Domestic Product at basic price as well as Productivity Measures.

Both the Input-Output tables and the estimates of Gross Domestic Product by Industry use the establishment as the primary unit of industrial production. Measures of financial transactions are provided by the Financial Flow Accounts (Catalogue Nos. with prefix 13). Types of lenders and financial instruments are the primary detail in these statistics and the legal entity is the main unit of classification of transactors. Balance sheets of outstanding assets and liabilities are published annually.

The System of National Accounts provides an overall conceptually integrated framework in which the various parts can be considered as interrelated sub-systems. At present, direct comparisons amongst those parts which use the establishment as the basic unit and those which use the legal entity can be carried out only at highly aggregated levels of data. However, Statistics Canada is continuing research on enterprise company establishment relationships; it may eventually be feasible to reclassify the data which are on one basis (say the establishment basis) to correspond to the units employed on another (the company or the enterprise basis).

In its broad outline, the Canadian System of National Accounts bears a close relationship to the international standard as described in System of National Accounts, 1993, a joint publication of the Commission of the European Communities, International Monetary Fund, Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development, United Nations and World Bank.

# Introduction

This publication presents estimates of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by industry for each province and territory for the period 1997 to 2002. It is the result of a major effort to reconcile these provincial GDP estimates with the provincial Input-Output tables for 1997-1999, and the Provincial Economic Accounts for 1997-2002.

The GDP estimates for the years 1997-99 were prepared using a value added approach by subtracting intermediate inputs from gross output. This parallels the practice employed to estimate the national GDP benchmarks by industry. For the most recent three years, data on inputs are scarce, so constant price value added has been projected on the basis of movement in related indicators such as output or employment, again consistent with the practice used to estimate the national GDP by industry.

Appendix I presents the System of National Accounts (SNA) industry codes with the corresponding North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes.


Appendix II contains a brief description of sources and methods used.

# **Highlights**

The Canadian economy moved ahead 3.2% in 2002, more than double the 1.4% of the previous year. The creation of over 300,000 jobs and the continuation of low interest rates kept consumer confidence high throughout the year, fuelling demand for big-ticket items such as houses, cars and furniture.

Activity picked up in most provinces, with 9 out of 13 jurisdictions registering growth higher than in 2001. Newfoundland and Labrador outpaced all other provinces with a 10.9% increase, more than double the healthy gains made by its second place neighbour, Prince Edward Island (+5.4%). Most other provinces in the eastern half of the country surpassed the national growth rate, with the exception of New Brunswick. Saskatchewan's economy, hit by drought and weak export markets, was the only province to contract.



Across the country residential construction boomed in 2002. Propelled by low interest rates, a strengthening job market and rising personal incomes, home-building expanded at a pace not seen since the mid 1980's. Every province and territory saw residential construction jump by at least 10%. Quebec registered the highest gain among provinces with a 30.3% growth, while Newfoundland and Labrador, Prince Edward Island and Alberta all grew by at least 20%.

As consumers moved into their new homes, demand for furniture and appliances surged. Manufacturers of furniture and cabinets each increased their output by 10.3%. Quebec and Ontario both benefited from the increased furniture demand, while Quebec and British Columbia were the main beneficiaries of the demand for cabinetry. Appliance manufacturing in Quebec accelerated to 10.5% from a 1.4% increase the year before. In Ontario, an 8.0% increase revitalised an industry that faced successive declines in 2000 and 2001.

Banking services benefited from the increased consumer demand for mortgages and other personal loans. A national increase of 4.6% was the best in 5 years. Most provinces moved in tandem with the national rate, with the exception of Alberta where a 23.4% increase in home-building contributed to a 10.3% increase in banking services.

North American housing construction and favourable exchange rates fuelled demand for Canadian wood products. Early in 2002 softwood lumber export quotas to U.S. markets were lifted and shortly thereafter replaced with U.S. import duties. The lumber industry responded by ramping up production at more efficient, modern mills, and shutting down less profitable operations to lower production costs. Canadian sawmill operations grew 9.5% and provinces

from Nova Scotia to Saskatchewan registered double digit increases. In British Columbia, sawmills recovered from a 13.7% decline in 2001, and grew by 7.6% in 2002.

Stimulated by the low cost of borrowing and generous buyer incentive plans offered by North American car manufacturers the auto assembly industry turned around in 2002 after two years of decline. Favourable exchange rates helped ensure a U.S. market for Canadian built parts and automobiles, Ontario gained the most as auto production increased 5.4%. Ontario auto parts producers nearly doubled this increase to 10.0%, while Nova Scotia tire makers advanced 9.1%.

Surging demand for automobiles and overall strength in consumer confidence combined with low interest rates to give retailers across the country a boost, with increases ranging from over 3% in Newfoundland and Labrador, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick to around 5% in most other provinces. Sales in Alberta and Quebec were particularly strong with increases of 8.1% and 7.1% respectively. In addition to motor vehicles, retailers of other durable products like furniture and appliances had brisk sales. Wholesalers kept pace with the strength in retail trade in every province except Saskatchewan where drought continued to hamper grain wholesaling.

The commencement of production at the Terra Nova facility in Newfoundland and Labrador provided the sole source of growth for oil and gas extraction in Canada. Production began early in the year and was largely responsible for the 10.9% increase in the province's GDP. Oil and gas extraction was hampered by weak U.S. demand, falling 0.9% in Alberta and 5.8% in Saskatchewan. Lacklustre demand for energy products hit the exploration side of the industry hard. Support activities for mining oil and gas extraction in Alberta fell 23.5%, while Saskatchewan suffered a 13.4% drop. British Columbia was not immune to the devastation as exploration activity tumbled 24.6%.

Mining industries across the country were hampered by low world prices. Small increases in Ontario and Quebec were offset by declines in almost every other province. The Northwest Territories Ekati diamond mine was the only bright spot in the sector. Diavik, the Territories' second mine, will be on stream early in 2003 and diamond exploration continues across the north. The Yukon and Nunavut territories both suffered on the mining front. In Nunavut, two lead zinc mines were closed late in 2002, and gold mining in the Yukon continued to suffer falling 26.1%.

The public sector continued its slow but steady growth of the last few years. Across the country, public administration grew in the 2-3% range, slightly outpacing the 1-2% expansion in education services. Health operations ran slightly ahead of other public sector activity as the aging population increased demand for health care services.


Ongoing drought conditions hammered agriculture in the western provinces. In Saskatchewan and Alberta, the crop industry fell 29.2% and 45.3% respectively. Manitoba escaped the worst of the impact with a decline of only 0.6%. For all three provinces, this was the second year of poor growing conditions. In 2002 crop production in Saskatchewan and Alberta was half of what it was just two years ago. Livestock operations in Alberta, home to 40% of the national herd, were also affected by the drought. The increase in animal production in Alberta masked a major sell off forced upon livestock operators by parched fields, escalating feed costs and scarce water supplies casting a shadow over future activity.

Prince Edward Island received good news on the agriculture front in 2002. Operations at potato farms recovered from last year's drought and disease hampered crop. The downstream processing industry continued to prosper, this year processing island grown potatoes.

#### **Newfoundland and Labrador**

#### More oil fuels growth

The start up of production at Terra Nova, the province's second offshore oil field was the catalyst in the province's explosive 10.9% growth in 2002. The growth topped all other provinces by a wide margin, nearly triple the Canada rate. GDP in Newfoundland and Labrador has exceeded the national growth rate in four of the past five years.



Oil and gas extraction soared 105.5% in 2002, as the industry pumped out more than 100 million barrels of oil, almost double the previous year's output. The oil extraction industry was responsible for three quarters of the province's growth. Terra Nova commenced activity on January 20<sup>th</sup> and attained production capacity more quickly than anticipated contributing 38.5 million barrels. Hibernia, the province's first offshore oil field, recovered from production problems in the first half of 2001 and pushed production 21.3% higher. Most of the oil extracted was exported to the United States with the remainder going to New Brunswick for refining.

Propelled by a rebound in the shrimp catch, the fishing industry enjoyed its most productive year since 1999, posting a 13.7% gain. Strong world demand enabled the fishery to operate for a full season as shrimp accounted for about 50% of the value of the fishing industry output in 2002, and pushed seafood processing 14.3% higher.

Labour income growth in Newfoundland led the country climbing 6.9%, markedly higher than the 4.6% recorded nationally. Despite the province's phenomenal growth rate, job creation cooled, as 2,700 jobs were added, a modest 1.3% increase. The labour force expanded 2.2%, faster than the province's ability to accommodate labour force entrants, pushing the unemployment rate back up to the 1999 level of 16.9%. However the improving economy did slow the net out-migration to its lowest level since 1993.

Residential construction surged 21.9% as low mortgage rates and high income growth pushed housing starts to their highest level since 1990. The hot housing market also benefited the finance, insurance, real estate and legal services industries, posting their best gain in four years.

Retail trade advanced 3.6%, sharply lower than the previous three years. There were strong sales of trucks, office machines, computers, as well as clothing.

The public sector added economic strength with spending on health care and social assistance up 4.2%, due in large part to an expansion of health care facilities. Hospital expenditures were up 4.9%, the highest level in five years. Federal government activity grew 1.6%, bolstered by DND spending on rescue helicopters. Provincial administration continued to be restrained while local administration expanded 5.2%.


The completion of a large oil rig project at the end of February pushed manufacturing output lower and the construction industry dipped 3.3% in between mega projects. Engineering construction related to oil and gas and transportation shrank 30.3%. The building of platform modules for White Rose, the province's next producing oilfield, will again help bolster manufacturing and construction activity in 2003. There is also optimism for future construction activity, as infrastructure work began in the fourth quarter of 2002 at the Voisey's Bay nickel mine site.

Professional services climbed 4.5%, led by a resurgence in demand for architectural services. Software designers and customer contact centres continued to expand. Telecommunication surged 12.2%, the province's fifth consecutive double digit increase as cellular phone and long distance usage continued to grow. Aliant Telecom continued to expand the province's broadband network. Utilities climbed 6.0%, on the strength of increased hydroelectric generation capacity by newsprint companies. Tourism did well as there was a substantial rise in the number of visitors travelling to the province by car.

#### **Prince Edward Island**

#### Strong growth in 2002

The Prince Edward Island economy grew 5.4% in 2002 bouncing back from its weak performance in 2001. Farmers and potato processors profited from a recovery in the potato crop and a flurry of construction activity helped to push the Island's economic growth ahead of most provinces.



The cultivation of potatoes jumped 41.3%. Higher yields of harvested acreage contributed to the recovery in the potato crop after last year's severe drought and the lingering effects of the potato export ban. Potato processors continued to operate at the peak levels of the past three years. In 2002 however, they returned to processing mostly PEI potatoes. Aquaculture operations, which have become an increasing share of fish output, eased back from last year's peak, but remained well above recent levels. The fish catch shot up 23.2%, with shellfish harvesting leading the way. Fish processing operations leapt ahead 14.4%.

In addition to food processing, the repair and rebuilding of jet engines for regional aircraft resulted in the aerospace industry soaring 30.6%.

Housing starts in 2002 reached a level not seen in more than a decade, topping 775 units and pushing residential construction ahead 24.5%. Renovations at the Confederation Centre and Holland College, as well as the construction of the Atlantic Technology Centre boosted non-residential construction 4.9%.

After several years of weak growth, bankers cashed in on the flurry of construction activity with a 6.3% increase. Lessors of real estate enjoyed the hot housing market, posting a 5.4% gain. Lawyers, accountants, architects and engineers also benefited after three lean years.

Prince Edward Island's employment rose 1.8% with 1,300 jobs added to the economy. Employment gains were concentrated in service industries. The overall unemployment rate however, rose from 11.9% in 2001 to 12.1% as more job seekers entered the market pushing up the participation rate.

Retailers advanced 3.2% in 2002, with supermarkets, home centre stores and incentive driven auto sales leading the way. Auto repair shops and personal care services also flourished.

The telecommunications industry continued to shine in 2002 with a strong increase of 12.7%. Growth in long distance service, cellular phone use and the establishment of new call centres in the province helped to fuel the increase.


Despite a modest increase in the number of visitors to the Island, accommodation and food services remained unchanged in 2002. An increase in the accommodation industry was more than offset by a drop in restaurant trade, as Islanders spent less, particularly at fast food restaurants.

Residential care facilities output increased 2.7% and physicians were somewhat busier. Construction at the East Prince Health Care Facility is ongoing, and it is expected to open in 2003. Universities posted a healthy increase in 2002 topping four years of steady growth, while community colleges continued their sporadic pattern, dropping 8.5%. Federal administration rose by 6.4% and defence services by 4.7%.

#### **Nova Scotia**

#### Steadfast expansion in 2002

The Nova Scotia economy grew 3.8% in 2002, compared to 2.4% in each of the two previous years. Solid growth in the manufacturing sector coupled with residential construction growth and consumer activity supported the province in 2002. Gains in financial services, information and cultural industries were also notable.



Manufacturing activity advanced 6.7%. Output of the shipbuilding industry nearly quadrupled as work on a large oil platform progressed in Halifax. Strong North American car production helped to push tire fabrication ahead 9.1%. Wood product manufacturing was also stronger in 2002. Production of paper products slumped 15.3%, the first decline in 7 years.

After two years of explosive growth, oil and gas extraction increased 6.4% as Sable Island maintained steady production throughout 2002. The completion of the construction phase of the Sable Island energy project resulted in a drop in non-residential construction. Not all was bright in the energy sector as mine closures hit the coal mining industry causing output to plummet 79.3%.

Telecommunications, which constitutes more than 70% of the information and cultural services industry, grew 12.4%. Call centres continue to proliferate as a US based company opened two new call centres in the province (at Annapolis and in Queens County). Likewise, continued strength in computer services propelled output in the professional scientific and technical services industry by 8.9%.

The vibrant provincial economy generated almost 5,400 new jobs in 2002, however, improved economic circumstances were not sufficient to lower the unemployment rate as an increase in labour force participation and a growing population caused it to end the year unchanged at 9.7%. The province continues to boast the lowest rate of unemployment in all of the Atlantic Provinces.

The growth of new jobs in the recent past and continuing low mortgage rates helped to bolster new home construction. Housing starts rose to 4,970 units, the highest level in a decade resulting in a 15.2% rise in residential construction.

The flurry in home-building and consumer activity sustained growth in banks, credit intermediaries and lessors of real estate. In total the finance, insurance and real estate group of industries increased 3.7%. Related business services, such as architects, engineers, lawyers and accountants also enjoyed a good year.

Growing labour income also lifted consumer spending and domestic demand to new heights, with retail sales moving ahead by 6.1%. Supermarkets, home centres and hardware stores rang up substantially higher sales. Led by food products and machinery and equipment wholesalers, wholesale trade also grew in 2002, advancing by 6.6%.


The hospitality industry continued to succeed in the province, with food services and drinking establishments leading the industry to surpass last year's growth. A healthy increase in the number of tourists to the province and increased visitor expenditure on accommodation and food services led the industry to a 2.9% increase.

Government GDP was up by 1.9% in 2002 despite continued declines in provincial administration. Defence services grew 0.8% after several years of cutbacks. The federal government and regional public administration advanced 4.6% and 6.0% respectively.

#### **New Brunswick**

#### **New Brunswick accelerates**

A strong rebound in both manufacturing and construction enabled the New Brunswick economy to expand by 2.9% in 2002 after a lacklustre 0.6% advance a year earlier.



Manufacturing expanded a robust 4.3%, after a setback in 2001. Sawmills ratcheted up their production to feed the explosive growth in residential construction in Canada and south of the border. Elsewhere in manufacturing, an oil refinery refit began to pay off in 2002 as oil from Newfoundland's Hibernia platform was processed in Canada for the first time. This additional production boosted the exports of New Brunswick oil products by more than 10%. Increased fish landings and a 4.5% increase in aquaculture led to advances by seafood processors; exports of seafood products were also up by a third.

Labour income increased by 4.0%, buoyed by the creation of 11,400 new jobs, almost double the number created in the past two years. The unemployment rate eased to 10.4%, notwithstanding an influx of job seekers, who sent the participation rate to 63.5%.

Construction activity bounced back in 2002 advancing 4.3%. Consumers, encouraged by low mortgage rates, pushed homebuilding ahead 13.2%. The completion of a major condominium project in Shediac was the catalyst in boosting housing starts by 20.4%. Non-residential construction roared back to life after two sub par years, accelerating by 40.6%. Several medium sized projects were completed including the opening of a number of retail stores in the Moncton and Fredericton corridor. The provincial government also helped by allocating nearly \$26 million on a variety of infrastructure projects.

Banks responded to the heightened construction activity by posting a 5.5% gain, their best growth in over five years. Real estate brokers, insurance companies and lessors of real estate all advanced in line with the flurry of activity in the new and resale housing market. Lawyers followed suit, cashing in on strong demand for housing.

A high level of consumer demand helped to push retail sales up 3.6%. Some categories had substantial increases; incentives drove new motor vehicle sales ahead by 7.5% while drug and pharmaceutical product sales advanced 9.3%.

Telecommunication carriers climbed 12.0%, their fourth consecutive double digit increase. Long distance services used by New Brunswick call centres provided the main impetuous for growth, while increased cellular phone use also contributed. Software designers continued to expand propelling other business services to a notable increase, while demand for the services of advertisers also advanced smartly.

For the fourth time in the past five years the mining industry flagged, declining 6.7%. The lowest price for zinc in the past fifteen years forced Noranda's Brunswick Mine to scale back its production. A 27.1% decline in drilling activity further weakened the sector.


Utilities contracted 6.2%. Electric power generation dipped 9.3% as the generation of steam was hindered by continuing problems at the Point Lepreau nuclear generating facility. This resulted in a 63% decline in the exports of electricity which was partially offset by the development of a distribution system for natural gas in the province.

Public administration was mixed. There was above average growth in provincial and local government administration, the latter growing for the first time in three years. Spending by the federal government on administration and defence services slowed considerably, thereby muting the overall growth to half of the previous year.

#### Quebec

#### **Quebec economy shines**

The Quebec economy perked up with GDP advancing 3.9% after a sluggish performance in 2001. Higher peaks of economic activity were evident in most sectors of the economy with manufacturing, new homebuilding and utilities most prominent.



The Quebec economy created an additional 118,200 new jobs in 2002, the bulk of which were full time employment. Despite an increase in the labour force participation rate, the unemployment rate ended the year at 8.6%, down marginally from the 8.7% recorded in December 2001. Labour income was up 5.2%.

Residential construction roared ahead 30.3% as low interest rates and strong labour income boosted demand. Manufacturers feeding the construction industry, such as wood producers did well, as did producers of household furniture, appliances and cabinets, all enjoying double digit growth. In the finance and professional services sector, insurance carriers, brokers and real estate agents all posted strong gains, while banks and other deposit intermediaries were also significantly higher.

Retail trade was up 7.1% in 2002, with every major retail trade sector advancing. New motor vehicle sales were especially strong, as manufacturers' rebate programs and long term zero based financing schemes helped dealers move an additional 35,872 units, a 9% improvement over the previous year. Furniture, home furnishing, home electronic, and appliance stores revelled in the booming housing market.

Output in the manufacturing sector advanced 1.9% in 2002, after a 3.1% decline the previous year. The manufacturing sector was bolstered by substantial advances in wood product manufacturing and chemical manufacturing.

Quebec's pharmaceutical industry continued to expand at double digit rates. Output was up 10.4% on the heels of a 40% surge in 2001. Large scale investments by patent and generic pharmaceutical manufacturers continue to flood into the province. The Montreal region is quickly becoming a magnet for investment in high-tech laboratories specialising in pharmaceutical research and development.

Demand for wood products was bolstered by strong residential construction activity in North America. Despite the imposition of a 27% tariff, exports to the U.S. were up sharply as quotas on softwood lumber were eliminated early in 2002. Output of sawmills and other wood product manufacturers surged 12.8% and 15.3% respectively. Sawmills in the province went through a period of consolidation, as more remote and less efficient operations were closed in favour of increased production from more modern facilities. The industry undertook measures which allowed it to remain competitive in the U.S. market despite the steep import duty.

After years of stellar growth, the aerospace product and parts manufacturing industry came back to earth in 2002 with output remaining virtually flat. The aerospace industry in the province held out the promise of continued growth, as orders poured in for short haul jets, but the emergence of uncertain global economic and political conditions and the events of September 11, 2001 held the reins on expansion in 2002.

The long anticipated closure of the General Motors Boisbriand assembly plant drove motor vehicle assembly operations down 1.2%.

The collapse of global markets for telecommunication equipment, computers and other goods associated with "high-tech" manufacturing was precipitous resulting in the output of Quebec producers of these products to plummet 23.5%. Especially hard hit were navigational, measuring, medical and control instrument manufacturing and telephone apparatus manufacturing. Semiconductor and other electronic manufacturing, another mainstay of the group, fell an additional 16.6% in 2002 after having faltered by 31.7% in the previous year.


Telecommunication services registered a 10.8% increase. As the province becomes more connected, telecommunication service providers continued to prosper, having boosted output by more than 62% since 1998. Pay and speciality TV providers continued to exhibit strength, posting growth in the double-digit range for a third consecutive year.

The public sector expanded by 3.6% in 2002, largely as a result of increased activities by both federal and provincial governments. Activity in health care and social assistance services showed some vigour, increasing 4.1% after a sustained period of lethargy. Increases at C.E.G.E.P.s and at other instructional institutions expanded educational services in the province.

#### **Ontario**

#### Ontario growth export driven

Economic output in the province of Ontario moved ahead by 3.8% in 2002, due largely to a turnaround in the manufacturing sector. Consumers, spurred on by low interest rates and a seemingly unending run of good news on the job front, were in a spending mood. Increased consumer demand for housing and cars were instrumental in strengthening the Ontario economy.



Labour income in the province of Ontario grew by 4.4% in 2002. For a fifth year in succession, the provincial economy generated better than ninety thousand new jobs. Total employment grew by 1.8%, with full time employment opportunities outpacing gains in part-time employment. Of the 105,300 new jobs created in 2002, 67,400 provided full-time employment. In fact, for the five year period ending in 2002, the Ontario economy spawned some 754,600 new jobs, the vast majority of which (89.6%) were of the full time variety.

In spite of the growth in job creation, Ontario's unemployment rate ended the year at 7.1%, up from the 6.3% posted in 2001. The provincial unemployment rate was led higher as improved economic circumstances found a greater proportion of the working aged population willing to offer up their services in the labour market. The labour force participation rate ended the year at 67.8%.

Transportation equipment manufacturers prospered in 2002, as consumers throughout North America embraced automobile financing incentives announced in the latter half of 2001. As the mainstay of the manufacturing sector in the province, the rise in new motor vehicle sales was instrumental in propelling the fortunes of the manufacturing sector to a 3.4% increase.

With the overwhelming popularity of zero based financing and assorted rebate programs taking hold, the industry was faced with the happy prospect of having to ramp up production to replenish significantly depleted dealer inventories. Motor vehicle assembly operations were up 5.4%, and auto part manufacturing surged 10.0%.

Car makers expanded production through planned overtime and, in some instances, adding shifts to existing lines at their assembly plants. A spate of investment spending announcements were made in 2002; several assembly lines were slated to be re-tooled for the roll out of new models and capacity expanded in certain other instances.

The allure of discounted carrying charges offered by automobile manufactures was evident in the strong growth enjoyed by motor vehicle dealers. New motor vehicle sales in the province were running well ahead of last year's pace (up 6.5%), as both retail and fleet sales were stronger than initially expected. Overall, retailers in the province improved their circumstances by 5.2% in 2002.

Residential building construction prospered in 2002. Historically low interest rates and strong consumer sentiment propelled housing to a 10.0% increase. Single detached family home construction continues as the mainstay of the

industry, with housing starts for this type rising by 29%. The strong employment gains witnessed in the recent past, and continued low vacancy rates for rental accommodation in most urban centres also helped to boost new home construction.

With the elevated activity in new home construction and a burgeoning re-sale housing market, household expenditures on furnishings and consumer durables were greatly stimulated. Sales at appliance and furniture stores in the province were up significantly in 2002.

Non-residential building construction declined marginally in 2002 following three years of growth. The exuberance of the recent past has been somewhat tempered as vacancy rates in the commercial sector started to trend higher throughout the year. With the effects of a softening market for commercial space taking hold, previously announced projects were either set back or scaled down.

Primary and fabricated metal product manufacturers saw their fortunes rise on the tide of the surging automotive sector. The fact that Canadian producers were exempted from U.S. imposed tariffs on imported steel also had a positive effect on the industry in Ontario. Led by a 9.5% increase in iron and steel mill activity, primary and fabricated metal product manufacturers witnessed a 6.4% improvement.

Growing demand for, and a constricted supply of steel products in the U.S. and domestic markets helped to bolster both the value and volume of shipments. The market for steel was so expansive that, for a time and in spite of increased production, inventories were being depleted.

An unprecedented heat wave boosted demand for electricity in the summer of 2002. Ontario's energy reserves were severely tested as some generating capacity had been idled for needed maintenance and Ontario faced the possibility of rolling blackouts. The province was forced to import electricity in order to avoid shortages.

In the interim, work to bring both the Bruce and Pickering nuclear facilities on line continued. Utilities in the province generated a 2.7% increase as electric power production led the charge, rising by 2.4%.

In the ICT sector, computer and electronic product manufacturers continued to languish. After suffering a 22.9% decline in 2001, the industry fell off by an additional 13.1% in 2002. The protracted post millennium swoon affecting the industry is pervasive, with only one of the ten industries in the group showing any growth. The bulk of the downturn was centered in the telephone apparatus and semiconductor industries with declines of 45.9% and 8.8% respectively.

The use of telecommunication services on the other hand, shows no sign of abating as the industry continuously finds new and innovative strategies to promote the use of regular and cellular telephones. The growth in discount long distance usage, 800 services and the expansion in the use of cellular services and the internet are all factors in the 8.1% increase for this industry.


The ongoing proliferation of television offerings from both cable suppliers and the increasingly popular satellite service providers continued to propel the pay TV, speciality TV and program distribution industry. The 13.4% growth in 2002 follows on an 11.8% increase in the prior year.

Despite a drawn out strike by provincial public servants, public administration grew by 2.5%. The Ontario Public Service Employees Union (OPSEU) ended an eight week strike on May 5, 2002. A two-week strike by municipal workers in Toronto, which affected garbage collection, road maintenance and other outside maintenance activities, was settled on the eve of the Papal visit to the city.

#### **MANITOBA**

#### Consumers lift Manitoba economy

Gross domestic product in Manitoba advanced a modest 2.1% in 2002, after a lacklustre performance in 2001. This is the fourth year in a row that the Manitoba economy failed to surpass the national rate of growth. Strong consumer demand helped the economy with increased activity in residential construction, retail trade, and finance industries. These gains were partially offset by lower output in the mining, other construction and electric power generation industries.



Low interest rates and a robust labour market fuelled strong consumer spending and fostered growth in many industries. Residential construction stormed ahead 18.6% which in turn encouraged manufacturers of construction materials such as lumber, windows, construction paper and plastic pipes to increase output. Credit services industries grew 3.9% as new home buyers increased loan traffic. The insurance industry also benefited from the hot housing market with a 5.0% increase.

Both retailers and wholesalers benefited from the surge in consumer spending. Retail activity increased 6.0% in 2002 with traders of motor vehicles, computers, televisions, video equipment, and clothing leading the way. New motor vehicles sales were pushed up by aggressive dealer incentives. Wholesalers were 7.8% busier in 2002 moving more food products, pharmaceuticals, machinery and motor vehicles to markets.

Manufacturing returned to growth in 2002 as this highly diversified sector edged up 1.4%. Beside the construction feeder industries, food manufacturing increased 4.3% to continue a string of good performances. The clothing industry turned around bringing to an end three years of losses. Strong export demand boosted agricultural implement manufacturing 19.3%. Transportation equipment manufacturing bounced back after two years of cutbacks to post a gain of 3.7%. In sharp contrast, producers of fertilizers and pesticides were clobbered by drought conditions that plagued the agricultural sector in Western Canada.

In tandem with better economic conditions, the labour market bounced back in 2002 with more than 9,000 new jobs. The turn around, however, fell short of recovering the losses suffered in 2001. Manitoba's year end unemployment

rate of 5.2% was one of the lowest in Canada. Service industries posted the largest gains with consumer oriented industries and public sector health and education industries leading the way.

The telecommunications sector in Manitoba continued its steady climb as cellular phone sales and long distance usage rose. As well, an initiative to expand and enhance broadband and digital service, helped propel the industry 9.4% in 2002.

Electric power generation – a big export earner in 2001 – was forced to cutback production 6.7%. Reduced U. S. demand and reduced water levels curtailed production.

The agriculture industry was also hit by dry weather conditions, but managed to escape the carnage suffered in Alberta and Saskatchewan. Agriculture output edged up 0.6% in 2002 as a 2.9% increase in hog operations offset a small decline in crop production. The lower grain outputs resulted in reduced rail activity for a 2<sup>nd</sup> consecutive year. Manitoba trucking firms were also less busy over the last two years.


The logging industry showed resiliency and overcame the negative effects of U.S. tariffs to eke out a small gain of 2.3%. In mining, depressed world prices for zinc led to the June closure of a zinc mine in northern Manitoba, pushing mining activity down 9%.

Despite the jump in residential construction, total construction activity in the province contracted 3.9% in 2002. Non-residential and engineering construction declined sharply as major projects wrapped up. Elsewhere in construction, repair activity was down slightly. Architects and engineers shared in the decline as design work fell off 6.7%.

#### Saskatchewan

#### **Economic activity dries up**

Real gross domestic production fell 1.6% in Saskatchewan in 2002. This is the first time in fourteen years that real output has declined two years in a row. Economic activity was hobbled by a crippling drought, weaker export markets and lower average energy prices.



Output in the important agriculture sector was hit with drought conditions that gripped much of the province for the second year in row. In the last two years, crop output has been cut in half, plunging 29.2% in 2002. Production of specialty crops, such as lentils and mustard and canary seed, recovered somewhat from the carnage of the year before, but remained well off the 2000 levels. Animal production increased 3.2% as ranchers responded to scarce water supplies and skyrocketing feed prices by selling off their herds in record numbers to feedlots in the United States.

The grain handling system got caught in the downdraft of the agricultural sector. Farm product warehousing activity was down 36.6%. The dramatically lower volume of grains shipped to port left railcars idle. Truckers were also hard hit by the slow down in the goods producing sector as output declined for a second year.

Lower average energy prices in 2002 and weaker demand from the United States discouraged exploration, which dropped sharply, and oil and gas extraction fell 5.8%. Investment in new and existing facilities to develop, process and transport crude petroleum products also faltered with ripple effects in feeder industries in the manufacturing sector.

Elsewhere in mining, weaker international demand forced uranium operations to cut back 22.2% after charging ahead 20.3% and 14.2% in the previous two years. Potash producers increased output by 5.0% to satisfy a major export contract signed with China.

Manufacturing output rebounded 2.5% in 2002 following a 3.5% slump the year before. Bolstered by strong residential construction across the continent and a reprieve from quotas, softwood lumber producers ramped up output by 20.6% arresting a three year slide. Manufacturers of pulp and paper products (excluding newsprint) raised output by 27.0%

as prices improved over the latter half of the year. Agricultural equipment benefited from increased export demand. Makers of pesticides and other agricultural chemicals increased output by 73.9% in response to farmers' desperate efforts to offset a grasshopper infestation.

Not all manufacturers shared in the upswing. With lower construction activity in the oil and gas sector, demand for primary and fabricated metal products and machinery fell off sharply. The high-tech crash coupled with a sluggish world economy dragged down output of communication energy wire and cable for the second year in a row.

The labour market regained some of the ground in 2002 creating 9,500 new jobs compared to 12,500 lost the year before. Almost all the new jobs were generated in the services sector as employment in goods producing industries fell for the fourth straight year. The unemployment rate edged down to 5.7%, with the number of new jobs outpacing labour force growth and a declining population.

Low mortgage rates propelled residential construction 15.6% higher in 2002, arresting a three year slide. Providers of loans and mortgages, lawyers and insurance operators also benefited from the housing boom and the purchase of big ticket items. Retailers gained from the positive attitude on the part of consumers, advancing 4.6% in 2002 as purveyors of household furnishings and appliances rode the housing wave to higher sales. Sellers of new, used and recreational vehicles had a good year as showrooms filled up with buyers taking advantage of buyer incentive programs offered by manufacturers.

Wholesale trade activity fell 0.9% as wholesalers of apparel, computers, and general goods did less business during the year. Not all wholesalers suffered as traders of food products, pharmaceuticals, motor vehicles, and household

goods benefited from healthy consumer spending.

Construction activity in the province fell 4.5% continuing a downward trend started two years earlier. Weakness in the key energy sector and the winding down of construction work at the province's electric power generation facilities contributed to the fourth consecutive contraction in non-residential construction. On a brighter note, the construction of the high profile Canadian Light Source Synchrotron at the University of Saskatchewan stimulated demand for engineering construction and provided work for engineers and technical professionals.

As the market for electric power stabilized in the United States and Canada, export demand was cut in half dragging down electric power generation by 2.4%.


A weak tourism sector undercut growth in air transportation, accommodation, and food and drinking places. Other recreational and amusement services, including movie houses, also suffered.

The downward trend in enrolment numbers and a tighter fiscal situation, forced elementary and secondary schools to scale back output and rationalize operations. A one month strike in September forced hospitals to cut back the delivery of services by 1.4% as critical care patients were moved to facilities in other provinces and to the United States for care. Providers of specialized medical services, such as patient transportation services and chronic care services, benefited from the strike. All levels of government administration provided some small impetus for growth in 2002, except for defence services which declined for the tenth straight year.

#### **Alberta**

#### Alberta loses momentum for second straight year

Gross domestic product edged up 1.7% in 2002 as growth slowed for a second year from the 5.9% pace set in 2000. Two key forces drove the economy in 2002. On the positive side, strong population growth, a healthy labour market and historically low interest rates stimulated consumer oriented industries such as retail trade and housing. On the negative side, lower average energy prices in 2002 and severe drought conditions hurt key natural resource industries, spilling over into related manufacturing and transportation industries.



Output of crude oil and natural gas has remained largely unchanged for the last three years due to weaker demand from a struggling U.S. economy. Following the frenzied pace of the last two years, exploration activity tumbled 23% in 2002 as lower average energy prices undercut the demand for new supplies. Despite the precipitous drop, the level of exploration activity has remained high by historical standards. Investment in the construction of new and existing facilities to produce oil and natural gas tapered off in 2002 as oilsands projects were completed.

Lower investment in the oil patch reduced demand for the manufacture of steel pipes and tubes, fabricated metal products, and oil and gas field machinery. Weaker demand from the United States forced producers of industrial and general purpose machinery to cut back output. Chemical producers were hard hit by both weaker export demand and by fewer orders from a drought stricken agricultural sector.

The worst drought conditions in over 40 years had a devastating impact on the agriculture sector. Output in the crop and animal industries sagged 28.4% in 2002. For the second year in a row the output of all major field crops suffered in the dry conditions. Considerably lower grains production dragged down rail and truck transportation services. Alberta is home to 40% of the nation's cattle and drought conditions forced ranchers to sell off their stock, pushing up livestock output, but reducing the province's herd by 10.4%. Meat slaughtering operations benefited from the abundant supply of cattle at low prices.

Despite slower growth for the second consecutive year, labour market conditions remained quite healthy. In 2002, the economy cranked out 41,500 new jobs on top of the 44,000 generated a year earlier. Unlike previous years, most of the growth was in the services sector. The unemployment rate moved up to 5.3% in 2002 from a twenty year low of 4.6% in 2001, reversing a downward trend that began in 1993.

Job seekers continued to pour into the province from elsewhere in Canada at near record rates; notably from Saskatchewan and British Columbia. In the last five years alone, the population has swelled by 10%, more than twice the national rate, fuelling demand and encouraging public sector growth.

The surging population, robust job growth and historically low interest rates propelled demand for consumer-oriented goods and services. The demand for housing and motor vehicles drove both the retailing and wholesaling industries to some of the strongest performances among the provinces. Stimulated by attractive dealer incentive plans, new car dealerships enjoyed another banner year. Other notable performers were purveyors of household furniture and appliances, home building stores, sellers of used and recreational vehicles.

Residential construction shot up 23.4% as housing starts hit their highest number since 1981. Real estate agents also revelled in the housing boom moving a record number of dwellings. The financial services and insurance industries also benefited.

Non-residential building construction advanced 13.2% as retail space, schools and health care facilities were needed to service the growing population.

The construction activity spilled over into manufacturers of paper building products, glass and cement. As well, the temporary elimination of softwood lumber quotas and increased homebuilding propelled wood products output 5.5% higher. Pulp producers raised output by 13.9% in response to stronger product prices in the latter half of the year. Manufacturers of telephone equipment increased output after a dramatic production drop the year before.


The Grey Cup festivities provided a boost to the hotels and other accommodation services in Edmonton and visitor entries from the United States increased as the industry rebounded from a lacklustre performance the year before. Restaurants faired less well as fast-food restaurants reported much lower sales.

Education and health services increased output in 2002 in response to the demands of a growing population. Despite a three week teachers' strike, education services increased output 2.3% with a major contribution from community colleges and universities. The provision of certain health care services by the private sector and the growth in new health screening facilities contributed to an increase in health care services.

# **British Columbia**

#### British Columbia's economy grew at a modest rate

British Columbia's economy grew 2.1% in 2002, greatly improving upon last year's 0.9% performance. A rebound in wood products manufacturing and wholesaling provided the main thrust behind the stronger GDP. Continued growth in services such as retail and finance industries also helped the B.C. economy in 2002.



The elimination of quotas for softwood lumber exports to the United States and a delay in the imposition of a 27% tariff in May pushed export sales sharply higher. Increased efficiencies and a weak Canadian dollar resulted in continued export growth after the introduction of the punitive duty. The feverish pace of homebuilding in Canada provided strong domestic demand for lumber and other wood products.

Historically low interest rates triggered growth in several industries. Homebuilding climbed 15.2% and banks profited with their second annual increase. Output of real estate agents moved up 20.1% due to the hot housing market. Wholesale trade rebounded 8.1% in 2002 after slipping 3.3% in 2001. Retail trade was driven 5.8% higher as buyers took advantage of low financing rates to purchase new cars, trucks and vans. Non-residential building construction shrank by 8.2%; a third year of decline.

There was mixed news in the labour market in 2002. Employment grew 1.6% creating 31,000 new jobs compared to a loss of 6,700 in 2001. Most of the jobs created, however, were part-time, while the number of full-time jobs declined 8,500. The unemployment rate moved up to 8.5%, from 7.7% in 2001 as people flooded the job market. The population of British Columbia edged up 1%, the same rate as last year, but well down from the 2.3% average for the 1990s'. More inter-provincial migrants left the province than arrived from other provinces for the fifth straight year. Half of the migrants left for Alberta.

In high-tech industries, telecommunications services and software publishers continued to flourish, but the manufacturing of computers and semiconductors was scaled back for the second consecutive year.

Electric power generation surged 3.7% aided by a new 230 megawatt gas-fired plant near Campbell River and excess capacity from scaled back smelting operations.

Elsewhere in business services, equipment rental operations expanded 13.4%. Lawyers and accountants posted a 1.8% decrease. Securities, commodity contracts, and funds showed sharp losses down 12.0% as analysts, traders, salespeople and call centre staff were laid off in tandem with a struggling stock market.

Motion picture and video production and distribution fell 8.4% after several years of strong growth. Labour unrest by American screen writers contributed to a scaling back of T.V. and movie production in Vancouver.

Urban transit returned to 2000 levels after a strike plagued year in 2001. Trains and cruise ships brought more passengers and tourism dollars to Vancouver and discounted room rates encouraged traveller accommodation. A drop in fast food business held back restaurant operations. Increased cruise ship activity was not enough to overcome a slippage in goods movement and support activities for transportation decreased 1.7%. A labour dispute with grain handlers at Vancouver diverted some business to Prince Rupert. Slowdowns in logging and manufacturing hampered trucking.

Oil and gas extraction pumped 3.0% more output. More exports of natural gas were piped to the United States. Oil and gas engineering construction was down by 15.4% after projects were completed following two years of strong growth. Low prices for natural gas also discouraged drilling activity and support activities for mining fell 24.6%.


Elsewhere in mining, coal production suffered as exports continued to fall. Metal ore mining, scaled back operations 16.8% as inventories accumulated and world prices stagnated.

In the public sector, a 3.1% decrease in provincial government administration overshadowed growth in local and federal government activities. Colleges grew by 5.2% and universities grew by 6.2%.

#### Yukon

#### Consumers rise above ongoing troubles in the mining sector

The Yukon economy grew for the third consecutive year, edging up 1.4% in 2002. Historically low interest rates fostered consumer spending on housing and personal and entertainment services. Public sector spending on construction of an aquatic complex and health care facilities also provided an economic stimulus. The ongoing slump in the mining sector continued to restrain the economy as GDP in 2002 stood at early 1990 levels. The population declined for a sixth consecutive year as discouraged workers left the territory for better prospects elsewhere.



Mining operations tumbled 22.2%, with fewer mines operating in 2002. Gold output plunged 26.1% for a second consecutive drop. Gold production in 2002 stood at one third the level of 1997. The outlook for gold mining continues to remain bleak as some placer operations may have to shut down in the face of stiffer licensing regulations from the department of fisheries and oceans. Weaker average energy prices in 2002 sent the oil and gas extraction industry reeling; output fell 35.7% to one half its 1999 peak. Exploration activities were also cutback sharply in 2002, although more claims were staked than in the previous year. An emerald deposit shows promise for a brighter future.

Construction workers were kept busy as residential construction shot up 24.5%. However, non-residential construction fell sharply as the finishing touches were put on a retail mall complex in Whitehorse. Additions to infrastructure such as telecommunications, electric power, schools and hospitals provided some offset. Construction of an aquatic centre was completed as part of a multiplex for the 2007 Canada Winter Games. Work began on a new electric transmission line from Mayo to Dawson City to replace the aging diesel powered electricity plant in Dawson City.

Consumer spending on new homes and cars kept financial institutions and insurance agents busy with higher loan and mortgage activity. Real estate agents took a breather following the frenzied pace of 2001; still, the number of houses sold was the second highest on record after 2001.

Retail trade enjoyed its 11<sup>th</sup> consecutive year of growth as output jumped 7.4%, aided by a new department store mall complex built in Whitehorse. Retailers of motor vehicles, furniture, appliances and home electronics prospered. Telecommunication services increased 5.6% as customers took advantage of improved telephone service – the result of a four year plan to invest in new equipment and technology.

The tourism sector had a good year. The territory reported the number of visitors jumped 11% in 2000 with most arriving in private vehicles. Hotels, motels and other traveller accommodation such as fishing and hunting lodges, increased output 3.4%. Despite new air routes linking Whitehorse with Vancouver, Calgary and Edmonton, air transportation declined on the year.

In the public sector, services provided by federal and local governments increased, while new fiscal measures imposed by the territorial government kept output unchanged on the year. New and improved facilities increased elementary and secondary school services by 2.0%. Family services, community housing and child day-care were up by 7.1%. The addition of a CT scanner ensured residents would not need to go outside the territory for care, and hospitals increased 3.0%.


The labour market improved slightly in 2002. Employment grew by 0.8% as jobs were created mostly in retail sales. Two hundred full-time jobs created, while there was a loss of 100 part-time jobs. The unemployment rate was 9.4% in 2002, down from 11.3% in 2001. The participation rate fell for the third year as discouraged job-seekers left the job market.

#### **Northwest Territories**

#### Diamonds put NWT on the world stage

After a robust expansion in 2001, the NWT economy forged ahead by a further 5.5% in 2002. With the Ekati diamond mine running at capacity, and the construction of the Diavik mine nearing completion, the NWT economy continued its diamond studded expansion. The Diavik mine site was almost completed by year-end, and production is expected to boost Canada's share of the world trade in diamonds beyond 10%.

The Ekati diamond mine produced almost 5 million carats in its fourth year of production, giving total mining more than one-quarter of the territories' total output. Gold production however, suffered a setback dropping 14.8%. Development of natural gas reserves near the B.C. border at Fort Liard have been delayed, waiting on the outcome of negotiations surrounding the Mackenzie Valley pipeline.

Continued expansion at Ekati, as well as grading facilities expected at Yellowknife and the anticipated opening of the Diavik mine will keep the outlook bright for the NWT. Construction at the Diavik mine site kept workers busy throughout 2002 on non-residential buildings and other engineering projects. Wholesalers were kept busy supplying machinery and building supplies to the bustling construction industry.

More than 1000 jobs were created in the territory in 2002, with the public sector accounting for approximately one third of the expansion. The population of the territory edged ahead for the third consecutive year as successes in the mining sector boosted the territory's prospects. The newfound prosperity in the territories boosted labour income 12.0%.

Residential construction benefited from home-building projects in Yellowknife enjoying its best year of the last five. Strength in labour income provided a lift to retailers. Gains were widespread as consumers took advantage of dealer incentives to purchase new cars and trucks, and new homeowners sought to furnish their homes.

Truck transportation edged ahead. During the last two years, truck transportation has been 30% higher than usual as truckers hauled 3800 loads on the 400 km ice-road between Yellowknife and the Diavik mine site. Thanks to a modest increase in tourism, air transportation held ground despite a trimming of staff at airlines serving the north.


Telecommunications moved ahead smartly as satellite technology gave remote communities access to digital communication. Engineering firms continued to provide the impetuous for growth in professional services. Other business and personal services were unable to cash in on the diamond related growth due to the remote location of the mines.

Public spending in health care and administration more than offset a modest decline in education. Territorial government swelled by 9.9%, overshadowing a 1.7% increase in federal administration to give overall administration a 6.2% increase.

#### Nunavut

#### **Growth despite mining woes**

The Nunavut economy grew by 1.5% in 2002 through an expansion of the public sector. Growth was restrained by a faltering mining sector.

With mining representing approximately 15% of the fledgling territory's economy, the almost simultaneous closures of the Polaris mine on Little Cornwallis Island and the Nanisivik mine on northern Baffin Island in 2002 dealt a formidable blow. The full impact of these closures will not be felt immediately as staff will be retained in order to complete decommissioning and clean up at the mine sites over the course of the next year. In total, mining dropped 11.3% in 2002.

Although two lead zinc mines closed, the territory has hopes for the exploitation of diamond discoveries on the Melville Peninsula. The discoveries are situated south of Igloolik and Contwoyto Lake, near the Northwest Territories diamond mines at Lac Des Gras.

Approximately 500 jobs were created in the territory in 2002. Most of the new jobs created were in the public sector as Nunavut continues to build its decentralised locally based administrative infrastructure. The territory's growing population has spurred demand for education and health care, which the young territorial government has been supplying through increased spending.

In the public sector, spending on education climbed 4.7% as the territory continued to strengthen partnerships with southern based colleges and universities. Satellite campuses are now in place to offer degree programs to northern residents. In addition, primary and secondary education facilities built in the first few years of the territories existence came in to full use. Providing health care services to a sparse but widely distributed population encouraged the building of community health clinics, boosting hospitals by 6.9%. Other health care services were buoyed by new social program spending and rose 4.7%.

Federal administration rose 8.9%, powered by the administration of a transportation infrastructure project and increased funding for local RCMP detachments. Local government administration benefited from the continued efforts of the territorial government to decentralise and rose by 13.4%.

Home building grew by 94% as government incentives to give down payment assistance provided the necessary boost. A drop in non-residential building and other engineering construction pulled total construction down 7.5% in 2002. The 43.9% drop in non-residential construction was mainly due to the completion of educational facilities. This slump was somewhat tempered by increased spending for community health care facilities.

Retail trade was boosted in part by a government program to compensate people for tainted gasoline that damaged motor vehicles and snow machines in 2001-2002. As well, new homeowners kept furniture and appliance retailers busy.

The advent of wireless technology has given Nunavut access to high speed internet and digital television. This combined with increased long distance sales boosted broadcasting and telecommunications 12.7%. Transportation held its ground in 2002 with air and ground transportation making up for a small drop in truck transport.

Most of the finance industries in Nunavut are made up of real estate related activities. The growing population and government home-building incentives helped push total finance industries up 4.5%.

#### Appendix II - Sources and Methods of Provincial GDP by Industry

#### 1. Introduction

Provincial GDP by industry estimates are based on the same definitions and concepts as the national estimates, and where possible, draw upon the same data sources and methods. Provincial GDP estimates are reconciled at a detailed industry level with the national estimates of monthly GDP, and are consistent with those published in Gross Domestic Product by Industry Catalogue 15-001-XIE. For a detailed description of the sources, methods, concepts and definitions employed in the monthly measures of GDP by industry refer to catalogue 15-547-XIE Gross Domestic Product by Industry Sources and Methods. Provincial GDP are further benchmarked to the provincial Input-Output (IO) tables available from 1997 and the most current three years are derived in conjunction with the provincial income and expenditure accounts.

Current price estimates of provincial GDP by industry are available from 1984 to the most recent IO benchmark year, with the period from 1997 on being derived from the provincial IO tables. Constant price data cover an additional three-year span.

Gross Domestic Product (GDP) measures the unduplicated value of production arising within the geographical boundaries of Canada. In deriving total GDP, the approach used, often referred to as 'value added' or 'net output' by industry, consists of subtracting intermediate inputs from output for each industry. This allows not only for the computation of total economic production but the industrial composition and origin of the economic production. A substantial and comprehensive data base is available for the compilation of the annual provincial IO tables from which GDP by industry can be ascertained. These tables are available annually beginning in 1997. Provincial GDP estimates by industry for IO table years, whether in current or constant dollars, are prepared using the net output approach. These years are referred to as the "benchmark years".

For the most recent three years, national GDP estimates in constant prices are projected on the basis of movements in related indicators such as deflated gross output or employment. This approach is necessary because the comprehensive data base necessary for the calculation of the GDP estimates using the benchmark approach is not available.

The data sources and methods for provincial GDP by industry, whether for the benchmark period or the most recent three years, parallel as much as possible those employed to derive the national GDP estimates by industry. The sum of the provincial estimates may not always equal the corresponding national estimates. The difference between the sum of provincial estimates and the corresponding national estimates is allocated across provinces in order to ensure consistency between the two data sets.

In the following pages, we will provide a brief description of the sources and methods of data used to calculate constant price provincial GDP by industry for the benchmark and indicator years.

#### 2. Constant price GDP estimates for the benchmark years

#### 2. i The general methodology

Ideally, provincial constant dollar GDP by industry is obtained residually, in a manner similar to the provincial current dollar GDP estimates by industry. That is, subtracting constant price intermediate inputs and net indirect taxes in constant prices from output in constant prices. This approach, known as double deflation, is similar to and consistent with the net output GDP by industry approach outlined above.

There is a large amount of data on price indexes related to final demand categories, such as export price series and the Consumer Price Index, that yield city, provincial or regional price indexes which could be used for deflation. However, there is little provincial price information relating to the provincial production by commodity and/or by industry; the Industrial Product Price Indexes refer mostly to price movements at the national level. Unless otherwise specified, all prices referred to are national prices whether they be specific commodity prices, or implicit price indexes originating from the national IO tables.

Provincial IO tables provide the detailed basis for deflation when used in conjunction with the national current and constant price IO tables. With provincial IO tables it is possible to use national prices to deflate the provincial outputs by commodity, by industry.

The deflation of inputs by commodity using national implicit prices for each input commodity can yield unexpected results. Input prices are often affected by import prices or by factors such as the use of inputs for which there is no commercial transaction (as in farmers feeding their own grain to livestock). For this reason, the inputs are grouped according to material inputs, service inputs, taxes and subsidies. The material and service inputs are then deflated using the national industry implicit price of material and service inputs. The taxes and subsidies constant price movement is made to follow the constant price movement of the industry's output, by province. The constant price GDP is then calculated residually by subtracting inputs from outputs.

There are several exceptions to this methodology and they are highlighted in section 2.ii Exceptions to the General Methodology.

#### 2. ii Exceptions to the general methodology

The following description highlights the approach used for the benchmark years when the more general methodology of deflating outputs by commodity and inputs by material inputs, service inputs and movement of subsidies and taxes is not used. For these industries there are several different approaches that may be taken. In some cases (e.g. agriculture) there may be some very good provincial measures of output prices. In some cases the use of double deflation to determine constant price GDP should not be used because of the nature of the industry. The description refers to the one used for the latest GDP.

For crop production, except greenhouse nursery and floriculture production, constant price provincial output for grains, tobacco and potatoes is derived as a product of base-year gross output value multiplied by an index of volume of marketable crops by province. Output for other crop production is the deflated cash receipts by province, using national prices. For animal production (except animal aquaculture), livestock output is projected on the basis of quantities of marketed livestock adjusted for inventory change. Hence outputs are deflated using provincial production prices. Inputs of fertilizers and pesticides are deflated individually while the balance of the material inputs are deflated using the national implicit price of these remaining material inputs. Service inputs are deflated using their national implicit price, while taxes and subsidies are moved with outputs in constant prices.

For certain manufacturing industries, the ratio of GDP to output is very small. In these industries, small changes in output can effect very large changes in GDP. In order to ensure that small changes in output do not produce large swings in GDP, the constant price GDP to output ratio remains fixed, even during the benchmark period. This method is used for:

- 311500 Dairy products manufacturing
- 311611 Animal (except poultry) slaughtering
- 322290 Other converted paper product manufacturing
- 324110 Petroleum refineries
- 325200 Resin, synthetic rubber, fibres, and filament manufacturing
- 331210 Iron, steel pipes, and tube manufacturing from purchased steel
- 331410 Non-ferrous metal (except aluminium) smelting and refining
- 333920 Material handling equipment manufacturing
- 336611 Ship building and repairing
- 334100 Computer and peripheral equipment manufacturing
- 334210 Telephone apparatus manufacturing
- 336400 Aerospace product and parts manufacturing

#### 3. Constant price GDP estimates for the most recent three years

#### 3. i Overview

For the most recent three years less information is available, therefore the ideal approach of deducting intermediate

inputs from gross output is not possible. Since technology changes relatively slowly over time, changes in output in constant dollars, in intermediate inputs as well as in GDP are assumed to be very similar over short periods of time. It follows that the data related to either outputs, intermediate inputs or GDP (for example, employment and capital stock) in constant prices can be used to project output and GDP estimates. This methodology relies on a less comprehensive data base and is similar to the one used in the national monthly GDP measures by industry.

The choice of which indicator to use depends largely on the availability and suitability of data. The most frequently used indicator is of the output type. In constant prices, output is derived in two ways: removing the impact of price changes as exhibited by price indexes from current values (deflation approach) or by multiplying current period quantities by base-year prices (extrapolation approach). Both are used in the provincial GDP by industry program.

When output data are not available or proved deficient, the sum of labour (employment) and capital (deflated depreciation) inputs is chosen as an alternative indicator; a variant of this consists of using only labour input. The selection of employment as GDP indicator assumes no productivity change during the period under review.

For some industries, both output and employment (at times, supplemented with depreciation estimates) are not available. In such cases, a myriad of other related data were evaluated to determine their accuracy and to select the best indicators of trends in provincial GDP by industry estimates in constant prices. For example, for religious organizations, provincial and territorial population is used as an allocator while for funeral services, the provincial number of deaths is the basis of the provincial allocator.

In practice, constant price output and GDP estimates of the most recent benchmark year are projected on the basis of movements in related provincial indicators by industry. The results are then used to allocate the national GDP estimates for a given industry across provinces and territories. A consequence of projecting benchmark GDP estimates in constant prices with related indicators is that it implicitly brings forward the provincial characteristics that existed in the benchmark year (e.g. price structure and IO ratios).

#### 3. ii Summary of industry-specific methodologies

An explanation of how related indicators are derived by industry is followed by a text table highlighting the approach used as well as the data source by industry.

Agriculture industries except animal aquaculture: Output in constant prices for grain, tobacco and potatoes is derived as a product of marketable crops by province weighted by their base year prices. For livestock and poultry, output is projected on the basis of marketed quantities, adjusted for inventory change. Output for other agricultural products (milk, eggs, fruits and vegetables excluding potatoes) equals deflated cash receipts by province.

Animal aquaculture: Quantities of aquaculture products produced, multiplied by 1997 prices are used, except for the most recent year, where export quantities of the major aquaculture products are used.

Fishing, hunting and trapping industries: The indicator reflects provincial volume measures of fish landings and of wildlife pelts, both by species, weighted with their 1997 provincial unit prices. For the most recent year, fish landings are replaced with a blend of quantities of exports and use by fish processing industries.

Forestry and logging: Output estimates for forestry and logging are projected using the volume of logs harvested for the major logging provinces. In the case where the latter is not available for a certain province, proxies are used; pulpwood receipts by pulp and paper mills, or production of lumber and ties by sawmills or finally, employment.

Support activities for crop and animal production: The movement of the industries served (i.e., crop agriculture for support activities to crop production) is used to project output. For support activities for forestry, employment is used.

Mining and oil and gas extraction: The quantities of various minerals produced (metals, non-metallic minerals and mineral fuels) and, in the case of support activities for mining and oil and gas extraction, meters drilled (for metal and for oil and gas deposits) are weighted with their appropriate 1997 unit prices and summed up by industry by province and used as projectors. Mining production is taken into account and employment is used for Nova Scotia and Yukon. Projections for sand and gravel quarrying are based on employment.

Utilities: Quantities sold to ultimate customers by the electric power and gas distribution systems are the driver series. Employment and depreciation estimates are used for water, sewage and other systems.

Construction industries: The provincial indicator is the deflated value of construction work performed, by province and by industry. Employment in construction industries is used to allocate output for repair construction.

Manufacturing: The methodology for the national monthly measures consists in deflating shipments, inventories of goods in process and finished products and summing shipments and inventory change in constant prices. On a provincial basis, inventories by industry are not available. Therefore, only deflated shipments by province are used as projectors. The deflated shipments are available by industry and aggregated to the proper industry classification. Deflators by province are the corresponding national ones which are, in turn, national commodity price indexes weighted according to their respective share of the 1997 value of shipments. There is one exception in manufacturing. For petroleum and coal products manufacturing, the indicator is based on provincial quantities of petroleum products refined weighted by their 1997 provincial unit prices.

Wholesale trade: The output of wholesale and retail trade is defined in terms of margins on commodities traded (sales minus the cost of goods sold) and the commodities themselves are not considered as output. In wholesale, the sum of margins in constant prices for various categories of wholesalers, by major trade group, is deflated with a national price index. Each of the volume measures is adjusted with its respective trade margins in order to derive the provincial indicator.

Retail trade: The provincial indicator equals the sum of trade margins in constant prices; current dollar sales adjusted with trade margins are deflated with implicit price indexes by trade group.

Transportation and warehousing: Employment and an estimate for capital consumption allowances in constant dollars by industry are often used as provincial projectors; this is the case for air transport, railway transport, water transport. These two factor incomes are weighted according to their respective share at the national level in 1997. For truck transport, a weighted output indicator is constructed to predict the use of trucking services by using industries such as the logging, manufacturing, wholesale, retail and construction industries. Due to the unavailability of depreciation estimates, kilometres of pipeline are used as a proxy in the estimate of constant price capital consumption allowances for pipeline transportation of natural gas and crude oil and other pipeline transportation industries. Urban and interurban and rural transit systems use CPI deflated gross revenues by province by industry as indicators. For all other transportation and support activities to transportation, as well as warehousing and storage, and couriers and messengers, employment only is used. The postal services industry uses the latest fiscal revenues by province.

Information and culture industries: Employment is used as a projector for all motion picture and sound recording industries. Employment is also used as a projector for radio and television broadcasting industry. The projector for pay, specialty and cable television refers to the number of subscribers to various services (cable, PAY-TV) while for telecommunications, the indicator refers to the number of network access lines in service and toll minutes for the major telecommunication carriers. For publishing industries, employment is used.

Finance, insurance, real estate, rental, leasing and management industries: Wages are used as the indicator for the central bank. For local credit unions and banking and other depository credit intermediation, interest receipts and interest payments are not available by province though information on assets (e.g. loans), and liabilities (e.g. deposits) are available; the amounts of these assets and liabilities determine interest receipts and payments. The national GDP estimates are allocated provincially based on assets and liabilities by province. These assets and liabilities are weighted with their base year national rates of return (e.g. the difference between the interest rate received or paid and the estimated pure cost of the funds). In this allocation, head office deposits, and loans booked-in-Canada are also taken into account. Explicit service charges (i.e., service provided for a fee) utilize wages and salaries as a provincial allocator. In the case of other financial intermediary and insurance industries, employment is the indicator.

Other finance, insurance, real estate, rental, leasing and management industries: The indicator for lessors of real estate is based on gross stock of real estate for all industries and employment. Capital stock estimates of dwellings in constant prices by province are used as an indicator for owner-occupied dwellings. The provincial indicator for offices of real estate agents is based on employment and unit sales as reported by the Multiple Listing Service from the Canadian Real Estate Association. For all other industries in the finance, insurance, real estate, rental, leasing and management industries, employment is used as the indicator.

Professional, scientific and technical services, and all administrative and support, waste management and remediation services: Employment by province is the indicator.

Government service industries, educational services and health and social services: Projections are based on employment (with special care to incorporate the impact of strikes) and on depreciation estimates in constant prices.

Arts entertainment and recreation services: Employment is used as the indicator.

Accommodations and food services: The stock of hotel and motel rooms adjusted with occupancy rates are the basis of the indicator for GDP estimates in constant prices for traveller accommodation whereas sales by province from the monthly restaurant survey are used for food services and drinking places. Employment is used for other accommodation services.

Other services: Employment by province is used extensively as indicator for repair and maintenance services. Funeral services use the number of deaths, and religious organizations and private households use population.

#### 3. iii Other issues

The process of projecting GDP from the benchmark of the IO tables assumes that the structure of the economy in the most recent three years is very much the same as in the benchmark year. When industrial activity occurs in a province where there is no prior activity the structure of the economy can change. In the case of large projects such as the Sable Island and Hibernia gas and oil rigs off the eastern seaboard, or the diamond mines in the Northwest Territories, this structural shift can have a marked impact on a provincial or territorial economy. In cases such as these, gross output measures in constant prices are usually readily available, and estimates of industry GDP are constructed using information from similar industries in other provinces, as well as information constructed by the companies themselves, and available through public sources (news media, internet sites of the companies, trade publications etc.).

Once the measures of GDP by industry have been constructed they are viewed in the context of the GDP as measured by income and expenditure. Significant effort is made to ensure that measures of industrial activity that correspond to categories of income and expenditure are reconciled. Measures of output of the construction industry are compared by province and consistency is assured. Residential construction industry output is identical to the income and expenditure measures of residential construction. Retail trade and the total of government activity (inclusive of hospitals, and education) are likewise assessed for consistency. As well, the prices used by the income and expenditure accounts for inter-provincial trade are derived from the output prices used in the GDP by industry estimates.

#### 4. Conclusion

The provincial GDP by industry measures are built within the framework of a complete set of provincial economic accounts. Data and resources from throughout Statistics Canada are used extensively to build the measures of GDP by industry. Results are then scrutinized in the context of a complete set of provincial accounts by reconciling areas of common measures between the income, expenditure and industry estimates of GDP. As well, the analysis of provincial economies is completed by assuring that all sources of information, be they trade publications, internet sources, or data provided by other levels of government are scoured to provide 'economic intelligence' about the activities within a province. Statistics Canada is also grateful to the provincial and territorial governments for the role that they play in building the provincial economic accounts. This is done directly by supplying much of the data on public spending within the province, but it is also done through Statistics Canada's provincial analyst program where provincial and territorial governments are afforded the opportunity to provide much needed and appreciated feedback prior to finalizing the provincial estimates.
