Programs and projects are delivered through both national programs and industry-led adaptation councils in each territory and province. Creating partnerships and new alliances among industry groups and between industry and government is a key feature of many CARD-assisted projects.

The emerging life sciences economy offers opportunities to address all of these issues. CARD plays an important role in helping the sector take advantage of these opportunities and thereby contribute to the strength and vitality of Canada's agriculture and agri-food sector for future generations.

CARD OBJECTIVES, PRINCIPLES AND CRITERIA

Proposals to access CARD funds, whether from national initiatives or from the industry-led councils in each province and territory, must meet the following requirements.

OBJECTIVES

- Foster increased long-term growth, employment and competitiveness of Canada's agriculture and agri-food industry and agricultural rural areas.
- Support a market-driven policy for the agriculture and agri-food sectors by providing measures, other than income support, to help individuals and firms to adapt to structural change and capture emerging opportunities in the marketplace.
- Promote self-reliance of the agricultural and agri-food sectors.
- Foster greater co-operation, strategic alliances and partnerships among individual companies, segments of the industry and rural stakeholders.
- Focus adaptation measures on the following priorities:
 - capturing marketplace opportunities;
 - maintaining an internationally recognized safe and high quality food supply;
 - accelerating sustainable environmental practices;
 - intensifying the focus on innovation and its adoption as a foundation for competitiveness;
 - strengthening the agriculture and agri-food sector's contribution to rural development; and
 - increasing the sector's human resource capabilities by providing tools and learning opportunities to its members.

Principles

- Consistent with overall federal government policy directions, such as employment growth, sustainable development, etc.
- Consistent with Canada's international and domestic trade commitments.
- Consistent with the Charter of Rights.



- In accordance with applicable federal acts, regulations, and environmental directives.
- Within the mandate of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada.
- Benefits to the public should exceed the benefits to private individuals and firms.
- Avoid duplicating, overlapping or replacing federal and provincial programs and delivery mechanisms.

CRITERIA

- Funds should contribute to initiatives which will be economically viable and self-sufficient.
- Funds will not be used as direct income support to individuals or firms.
- Benefits to the industry and public should exceed the costs.
- Funds should be used for programs which benefit the industry as a whole as well as projects aimed at specific local/provincial/regional needs.
- Federal funding should not be considered ongoing but should be provided for a limited period to help the industry and rural stakeholders adapt to structural changes and to capture new opportunities.
- Priority should be given to projects where there is industry direct or in-kind financial support.
- Federal visibility guidelines must be adhered to in all communications respecting federal funding.
- Funding is conditional on recipients establishing a Performance Management Framework.
