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Foreword

Opportunity Trails: An Atlantic-Wide Connection is intended to improve the ability of educators to identify and access resources which can serve as valuable teaching and learning tools for entrepreneurship educators at all levels. The underlying goal of this information guide is to nurture the creation of learning partnerships that will elevate student independence, perseverance and engagement in entrepreneurship education and venture creation. It is hoped that this information guide might become valued as one of the numerous resources entrepreneurship educators will use to enrich learning for their students.

Since the early part of this decade, a collective effort has been made to enhance entrepreneurship development at all levels of public education, as well as at the college and university levels, in Atlantic Canada. This effort has focused mainly on development of entrepreneurship curricula, resources, programs, professional training and student venturing. Initiatives in entrepreneurship education that have emerged in Atlantic Canada strongly advocate the skills, attitudes and knowledge required by students to meet the economic and social challenges of the 21st century.

In keeping with the rapid advancement in this area of education, there is an ongoing need to ensure optimum representation of worthwhile entrepreneurship resources. In addition to this published guide, the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA) will be posting the information on its website (www.acoa.ca) so as to facilitate access by stakeholders and allow updating. The idea of this guide evolved from work by the Centre for Entrepreneurship Education and Development for the 1997 Entrepreneurship Educators Symposium.

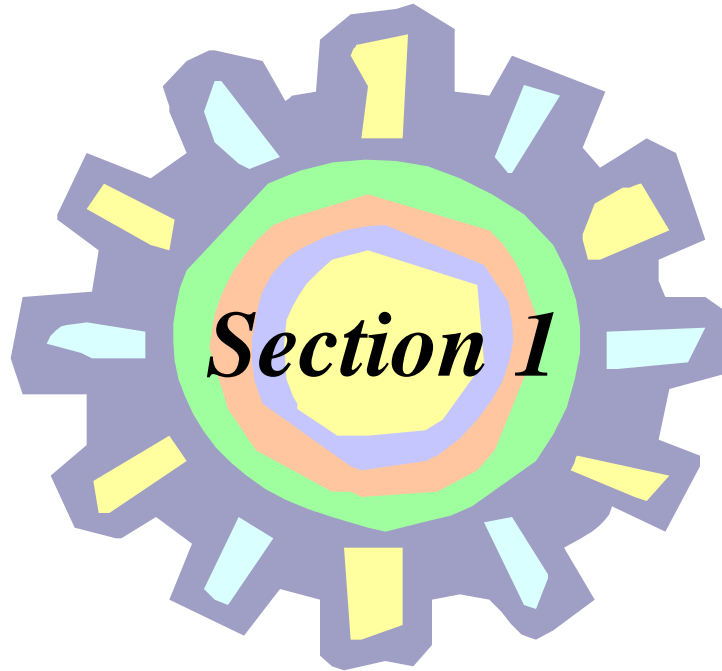

1.1 Introduction

As a pathway to venture creation, entrepreneurship education provides a vehicle for students to demonstrate their success beyond the walls of the classroom. This section explores the creative utilization and potential of existing entrepreneurship resources by advancing an established learning approach as a framework for developing entrepreneurial concepts, skills, and attitudes. As such, this section represents only a small part of the pertinent information entrepreneurship educators would require for the effective delivery of their course or program.

1.2 Entrepreneurship as an Opportunity for Learning

Through entrepreneurship education, there exists a real possibility for learners at all levels to discover and develop entrepreneurial skills and abilities that will encourage them to identify, create, initiate and successfully manage personal, business and community venture opportunities.

Entrepreneurship education offers students an opportunity to build upon their experiences and interests and take greater responsibility for their own learning. Through learning about venture creation and being provided with opportunities to experience venture creation, students may simultaneously work towards the achievement of identified personal and career goals.

The ability of students to recognize their entrepreneurial potential might be a measure of their exposure to various resources and venture-based experiences. Nurturing the shift from learner dependence to independence and sparking the growth of a vibrant entrepreneurial spirit is something which can be facilitated by the appropriate combination of entrepreneurship content and pedagogy.

Value beyond instruction, clear feedback, collaboration beyond the classroom, and greater flexibility for learning are qualities identified by Newmann (1992) that are often missing from the classroom. Through entrepreneurship education, we have a tremendous opportunity to focus on those qualities in an effort to encourage the future success of students.

1.3 Some Key Aspects of Student Ventures

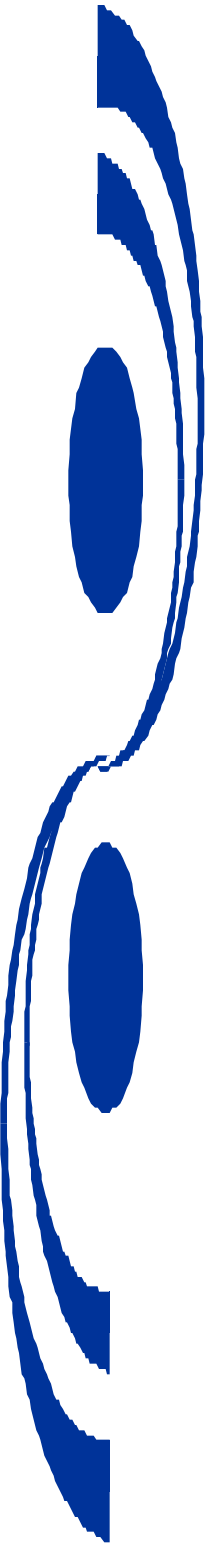
If students are to become actively involved in their own learning, educators should be able to ascertain the value of the tasks they encourage their students to undertake. What factors might be considered during the process of determining resources and activities for students to utilize? Through teacher and student feedback a number of key aspects have emerged to help identify the benefits of venture creation experiences in the context of entrepreneurship education.

The following are *Some Key Aspects of Student Ventures* which have been identified to help motivate and engage student learning beyond the walls of the classroom, and to highlight significant components of an entrepreneurial learning culture:

Exploration

- ❖ Student ventures should allow students to explore their interests and talents, and encourage the exploration of new ideas and opportunities.

Networking

- ❖ Student ventures should encourage students to utilize the expertise of others and promote opportunities for mutually beneficial partnerships.
- ❖ Student ventures provide effective networking opportunities that allow for the demonstration and/or development of essential communication skills.

Technology

- ❖ Student ventures should create opportunities for students to explore and use appropriate technology.

Risk-Taking

- ❖ Students should be challenged to learn from their mistakes, rather than be punished for them.
- ❖ The venture creation process should encourage students and educators to take informed risks.

Environment

- ❖ Student ventures require a supportive and flexible learning environment.
- ❖ The learning experience provided by student ventures is as important as the end product.

Planning

- ❖ The venture should require students to plan, and encourage the idea that informed risk-taking comes through planning.

Resources

- ❖ Student ventures should involve a variety of resources, including the consideration and use of resources beyond the walls of the school.

Empowerment

- ❖ Through ventures, students are provided with opportunities to have greater ownership of their own learning and demonstrate and/or develop leadership qualities.
- ❖ Student success needs to be celebrated. There is always something positive to celebrate, it is just waiting to be found.

New Thinking

- ❖ The student venture should nurture a creative spirit. Forget about why it can't be done, and figure out how to do it.

Evaluation

- ❖ The utilization of performance-based assessment tools are effective in the evaluation of student ventures.
- ❖ Through student ventures, educators can evaluate outcomes as they have always done.

Understanding

- ❖ The power of understanding is grasped more effectively when students are engaged in the identification, planning and implementation of their own ventures.

Reflection

- ❖ It is important to provide frequent opportunities for review and reflection to discuss and share entrepreneurial challenges, solutions and personal achievements.

Solving Problems

- ❖ Student ventures provide numerous opportunities to solve real problems in an effort to meet new challenges and achieve personal and team goals.

Hands-On

- ❖ The student venture should be experiential in nature.
- ❖ I see, and I forget - I hear, and I remember - I do, and I understand.

Interaction

- ❖ The venture should enable students to have some degree of interaction with their peers and other learning partners, and provide opportunities to develop teamwork skills.
- ❖ Communication and inter-personal skills can be effectively developed through student venture experiences.

Purposeful

- ❖ The venture should have a purpose beyond the activity itself, and that purpose should be known to students.
- ❖ Highly successful student ventures often have goals which bring about change and innovation in an authentic context.

1.4 Learning Through Entrepreneurship

Venture creation opportunities often provide a vehicle for students to learn-through-entrepreneurship. Learning through entrepreneurship simply means that students are provided with learning experiences, such as venture creation, to develop and demonstrate their entrepreneurial knowledge, skills, and values in an experiential and authentic context. *Some Key Aspects of Student Ventures* outlined in Section 1.3 provide a foundation for the following entrepreneurial learning approach whereby the learning partnership between the teacher and student is dynamic and fluid.

The educator's and the learner's role in active, entrepreneurial learning:

1.5 Teaching Approach Template

The *Teaching Approach Template* was designed simply to help educators quickly identify the learning approach they are employing with their students in the classroom. Entrepreneurship educators will obviously move back and forth along the continuum of teacher-directed versus student-centred approaches depending upon learner needs and lesson objectives.

To use the *Teacher Approach Template*, check the applicable boxes under each of the four key areas of entrepreneurship as they apply to a particular lesson, activity, or venture opportunity. By calculating the total number of checks you will be able to provide yourself with a general indication of where you are on the Entrepreneurship Continuum.

Experiential

Are students encouraged to:

- problem solve in an effort to meet intended outcomes?
- explore and draw upon their own experiences?
- become actively involved in their learning?
- take learning beyond the walls of the classroom?
- apply skills, knowledge, and personal qualities in an authentic context?



Ownership

Are students encouraged to:

- take responsibility for certain aspects of their learning?
- build on existing skills?
- be involved in developing some of the evaluation methods?
- provide input on ways to achieve curriculum outcomes?
- risk-take and be creative?

Collaboration

Are students provided with an opportunity to:

- develop an ability to work in teams?
- experience their teacher as a partner in learning?
- network with peers and other sources?
- support and/or respect the opinions of others?
- be responsible/accountable for various tasks?

Evaluation

Is there opportunity for:

- guided reflection with students?
- performance-based assessment?
- peer assessment?
- self-assessment?
- on-going review of goals and activities?

1.6 *Community Links and Entrepreneurship Education*

When we refer to **student ventures** and **learning through entrepreneurship** we require one essential ingredient, **the community**. Nurturing an entrepreneurial culture requires that we extend learning beyond the walls of the classroom and work creatively with our community resources.

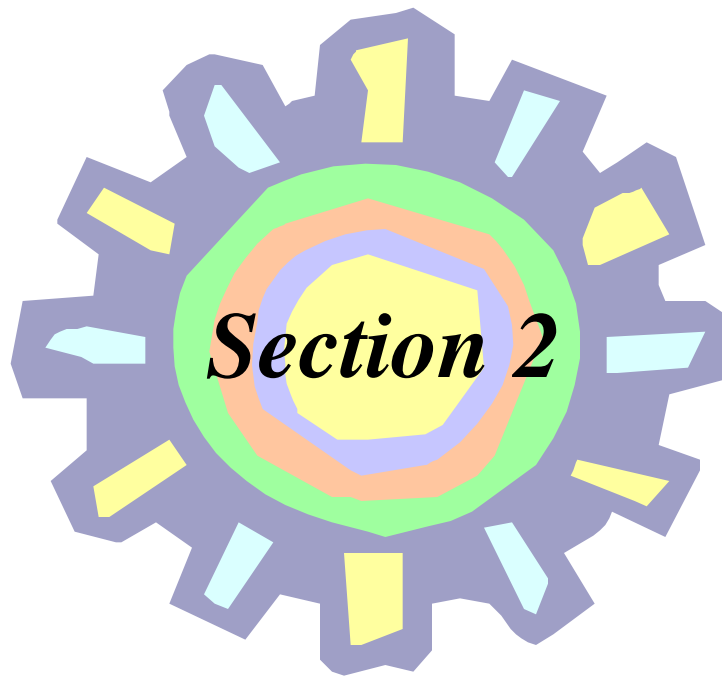
Outside of their lives at school, students use entrepreneurial skills on a daily basis, but not necessarily in the context of entrepreneurship. Through community links in entrepreneurship education we create a powerful window of opportunity to achieve this goal.

Entrepreneurship education....is an adventure in reality. The classroom walls recede as the home, community, and the free enterprise system become learning labs. The teacher becomes a facilitator rather than the holder and dispenser of knowledge. We all learn by discovery and through trial and error. There are no standard, carved-in-stone teacher's guide answers. Students and teachers learn from each other. Parents, entrepreneurs from the community, inventors, bankers, artists, (etc.)...all become visiting professors.

2.1 Introduction

The purpose of this section is to highlight current Atlantic Canadian professional development opportunities for entrepreneurship educators at the K/P-12 and post-secondary levels, as well as identify the current entrepreneurship curricula and Atlantic Provinces Education Foundation resources offered to students in Atlantic Canada. Through exposure to these resources it is hoped that educators will access various opportunities for continuing professional development and student learning.

2.2 APEF Coordinated Entrepreneurship Resources for Kindergarten/Primary to Grade 12

The Atlantic Provinces Education Foundation (APEF), an agency of the Departments of Education (DOE) in the four Atlantic Provinces and with support from the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA), have collaborated through the *Pan-Atlantic Entrepreneurship Development Project* to develop entrepreneurship/enterprise resources from the Kindergarten/Primary to the Grade 12 level.

Cross-curricular French resources have been created for kindergarten through grade six, as well as one English resource for grades four through six. English resources are being developed at the K-3, 7-9, and 10-12 levels and will be available for use in Atlantic Canada. It is helpful for entrepreneurship educators to be aware of the Atlantic-wide initiative to infuse entrepreneurial and enterprise knowledge, skills, and attitudes at the various levels, so that they may nurture and support this experience and understanding.

Resources have been accompanied with extensive professional development activities for implementation of these Atlantic-wide resources.

Cap sur l'entrepreneuriat:

Grades 4-6: This is an activity-based teacher's resource designed to facilitate the development of entrepreneurial attitudes and skills for grades four, five and six. The format of this resource enables teachers to achieve existing curriculum outcomes while simultaneously promoting an entrepreneurial learning environment.

APEF Coordinated English Language Resources

K - Grade 3: *Learning Through Enterprise* is a cross-curricular activity-based resource for teachers. This resource is currently under development.

Grades 4-6: *Pathways to Enterprise* is a cross-curricular teacher's resource designed to promote the development of enterprise skills, qualities, and values at this level. The resource provides enterprise awareness for teachers, student activities, and showcases a large number of student entrepreneurship and enterprise experiences throughout Atlantic Canada. A French translation of this resource has been completed by the Department of Education in New Brunswick.

Grades 7-9: A cross-curricular activity-based entrepreneurship resource for teachers is currently under development.

Grades 10-12: *Entrepreneurship and the Cultural Industries* is a teacher's resource designed to infuse entrepreneurship into the High School Fine Arts curriculum. This resource is currently under development.

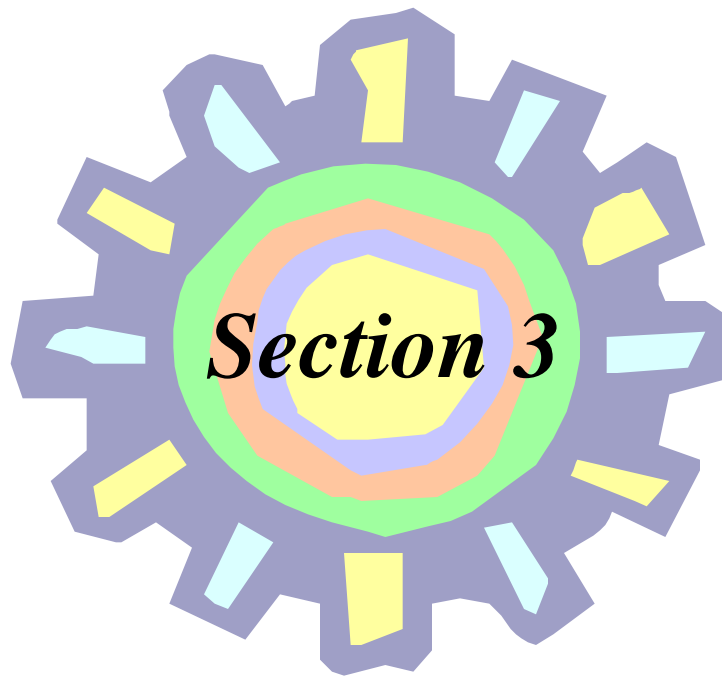

3.1 Introduction

This section provides entrepreneurship educators with opportunities to access human resources that will enhance the entrepreneurial learning experience for their students. Inviting the community to share in the learning process provides students with the authenticity and relevance which might otherwise be missing from traditional classrooms. Local entrepreneurs in the workplace or the classroom can have a powerful influence on students' motivation to explore entrepreneurship as a career choice. The approaches suggested in this section may be used or adapted in a creative effort to improve community interaction with local entrepreneurs.

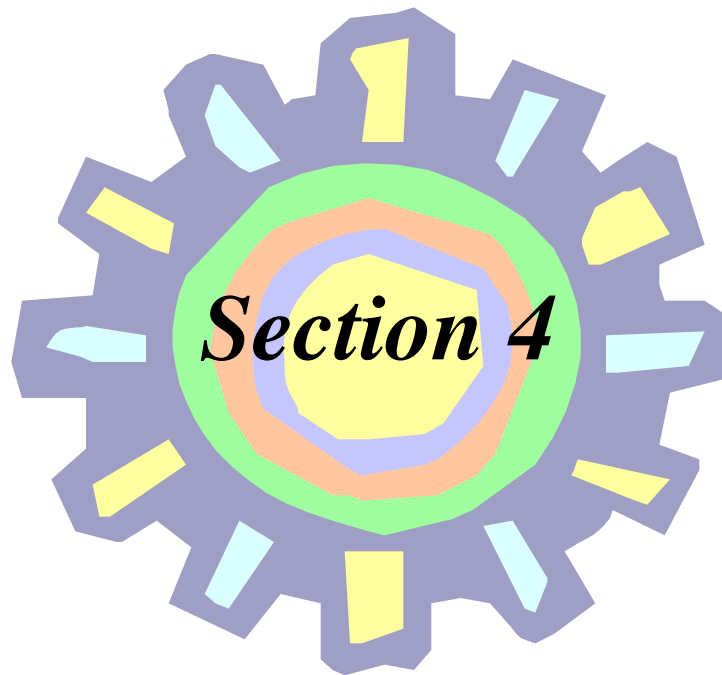

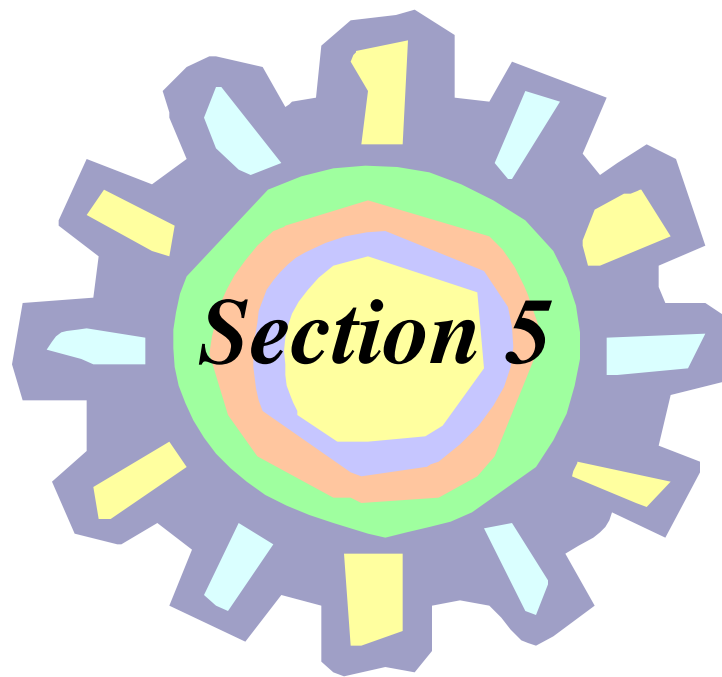
