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


Wage Settlements Covering 500 or More Employees


May 2007

Major collective bargaining settlements reached in May 2007 provided base rate wage adjustments averaging 3.4% annually over the term of the contracts. These results are based on a review of 36 settlements with a coverage of 100,330 employees.

When the parties to these settlements previously negotiated, the resulting wage adjustments averaged 3.0%, a smaller average than in their current settlements. Contract duration in May 2007 averaged 35.4 months, compared to 36.6 months in the previous round of settlements.



In May, wage adjustments in the public sector averaged 3.4% for 19,740 employees in



17 agreements. Private-sector wage adjustments also averaged 3.4% for 80,590 employees in 19 agreements. The dominant contract in the private sector was a Ouebec residential construction agreement, providing 45,320 employees (accounting for 56% of the month's total private-sector employee coverage) with wage increases averaging 3.8%. Excluding this construction contract. the

remaining 18 private-sector agreements received wage adjustments averaging 2.9%. The aggregate figure for both public and private sectors would drop from 3.4 to 3.1%.

On an industry basis, wage adjustments ranged from a low of 2.2% in the manufacturing sector to a high of 4.0% in the utilities sector; the largest concentration of employees was in construction with wage adjustments averaging 3.5%. On a jurisdiction basis, wage adjustments ranged from 2.5% in British Columbia to 4.4% in Alberta; the largest concentration of employees was in Quebec, where wage adjustments averaged 3.8%.

Approximately 63% of employees covered in May settlements received increases in the 3.0 to 3.9% range (due in large part to the Quebec construction settlement), and approximately 27% of employees received increases in the 2.0 to 2.9% range. Approximately 1.0% of employees received wage adjustments below 2.0% and 8.6% of employees received 4.0% or above.

Wage adjustments in the first 5 months of 2007 (January through May) averaged 3.0% for 468,085 employees in 122 major settlements.
