
## Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada

## **Canada-Wisconsin Trade**

- → Canada and the state of Wisconsin have a dynamic trading partnership that reached \$10.7 billion in 2006. Canada is Wisconsin's largest trading partner for agricultural goods, and in 2006 sales of these products reached \$484.2 million. Wisconsin also represents an important customer of Canadian agricultural products, with sales amounting to \$324 million in the same year.
- → Wisconsin is a major producer and exporter of agricultural products. In 2006, the state's cash farm receipts totaled \$6.6 billion.
- → Processed foods top the list of Wisconsin's 2006 agriculture and agri-food exports to Canada. Like Americans, Canadians are increasingly demanding high-quality, ready-to-eat foods that fit into their busy lifestyles. In 2006, Wisconsin's top processed food exports to Canada included: mixes and doughs for baking which totaled \$55.8 million; beer worth \$46.4 million; sauces and condiments, \$16 million; chocolate food, \$19.8 million; fruit and vegetable juices, \$10.8 million.
- → A national leader in the production of mink furs, Wisconsin exported over \$56.5 million in furs to markets all over the world in 2006. Canada is an important customer for these mink products, as \$49.4 million of this total was sold to Canadian consumers. Also a leader in dairy production, Wisconsin sold Canadians \$11.5 million in cheese and cheese curds, nearly \$1 million in other milk products and \$6 million in whey in 2006.

→ Wisconsin's top imports from its Canadian neighbors included \$21.7 million in fresh and chilled beef cuts, \$19 million in pork, and \$32 million in live swine. Canada also shipped \$20.88 million in dairy spreads, \$12.2 million in breads, pastries and cakes, \$10 million in prepared foods, as well as \$22.7 million





## TRADE SUPPORTS **NORTH AMERICAN FAMILIES**

## **HOW IMPORTANT IS AGRICULTURE?**

In the U.S., the agriculture and agri-food industry represents roughly 5% of GDP, and is responsible for roughly 24 million jobs when you consider everything from growing the food to selling it at the local supermarket. In Canada, the agriculture and agri-food industry generates 8% of the GDP. It also employs nearly 2.1 million people, or approximately one out of every eight Canadians. Agriculture remains a central component of Canada's economy.
