Facing the uncertainty of a cancer diagnosis, you and your loved ones will want to get all the information you can on what to expect and on treatment options.

In this situation, you might consider turning to the vast resources of the Internet.

And while there is plenty of good information to be found at the click of the mouse, there is also much to be wary of. There is no shortage of Web sites offering inaccurate and misleading information. Worse, there are sites advertising miraculous treatments and cures that just don't work and that lure people in with false claims.

The Competition Bureau launched Project False Hope to identify and stop this type of online fraud and to give you and those looking out for you the clues you need to recognize it.

Armed with this information, you can then search with more confidence for options that may be right for you. But always talk to a health care professional before starting any new treatment.

Confronting a cancer diagnosis can be deeply distressing. Having accurate and trustworthy information can help you move forward with hope.
