WHAT IS ENVIRONMENTAL PUBLIC HEALTH?

- Environmental public health refers to conditions in the environment, both natural and human-built. that can affect a person's ability to achieve and maintain good health.
- A healthy environment includes safe water and food supplies, suitably built and maintained housing and community facilities, as well as proper treatment and disposal of wastewater and solid waste.
- Planning for and responding to emergencies is also important to maintaining a healthy environment and to prevent and control communicable diseases.



WHY SHOULD I CONSIDER A CAREER AS AN **ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH OFFICER IN FIRST NATIONS COMMUNITIES?**

Canada is facing a shortage of Environmental Health Officers because many will be retiring soon. As an **Environmental Health Officer working in First Nations** communities, you would:

- Earn a salary that is competitive with other health professionals:
- Make a difference in the communities you serve. The work is exciting, rewarding and different everyday;

- Get to travel, spend time outdoors, work independently, and apply your skills in different settings; and,
- Interact with all sorts of people including children, adults, Elders, Chiefs, Councils, and healthcare workers.

WHAT DO ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH OFFICERS DO?

- Environmental Health Officers working in First Nations communities do everything from health inspections of homes, public buildings and community events such as pow-wows, to training food handlers in restaurants, monitoring community drinking water supplies, providing public education, and investigating diseases such as rabies and hantavirus.
- Some Environmental Health Officers are employed by Health Canada, the federal department responsible for helping the people of Canada maintain and improve their health. Others are employed directly by First Nations or Tribal Councils.

HOW DO I BECOME AN ENVIRONMENTAL **HEALTH OFFICER?**

Environmental Health Officers working in First Nations communities require a bachelor degree in environmental health or science, and successful completion of the Canadian Institute of Public Health Inspectors (www.ciphi.ca) certification process.

Becoming an Environmental Health Officer takes four years for high-school graduates and two years for graduates with a relevant Bachelor's degree or technology program.
