

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# About this report

This is an annual Statistical Report on International Assistance (previously entitled Statistical Report on Official Development) prepared by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) on behalf of the Government of Canada. This report presents a comprehensive and detailed account of Canadian International Assistance in 2011–2012, published in accordance with the *Official Development Assistance Accountability Act* (ODAAA or the Act), which came into force in 2008.

Under the Act, the Minister of International Cooperation is required to issue two key reports on behalf of the government: a summary-level report six months after the end of each fiscal year, and an annual statistical report one year after the end of each fiscal year. In addition to meeting the requirements under the Act, this report provides a single source for international assistance expenditure statistics, including official development assistance (ODA) and other official assistance, for Canada as a whole. This statistical report is only part of the Government of Canada's commitment to transparency. To further enhance the efficiency and accountability of Canada's international assistance, the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA):

- provides all parliamentary reports as required (such as the Departmental Performance Report, for example);
- tables annual summary reports to Parliament on behalf of the Government of Canada on preliminary official development assistance expenditures;
- publishes a periodic report, *Development for Results*;
- publicly discloses on its website, on a quarterly basis, all contract awards over \$10,000 and all grants and contribution awards over \$25,000;
- outlines the country plan for each country of focus on the CIDA website, including country program disbursements and the objectives being supported by CIDA;
- maintains the Project Browser, containing a list of projects and project budgets, as well as the objectives being supported by CIDA and the expected and the achieved results of those projects;
- maintains the OpenData Web portal, a single online source for all of CIDA's international development statistical data;
- makes its evaluation, audit reports, and strategic environmental assessment (SEA) statements available to the public on the CIDA website;
- is a full member of the International Aid Transparency Initiative (IATI), a voluntary initiative for increased transparency across donors, partner countries, and civil society organizations; and,
- reports to the Development Assistance Committee (DAC) on all Canadian aid through its renowned DACStats database populated with statistics from most donor countries and major multilateral organizations.

In addition, the International Development Research Centre (IDRC) provides open, online access to information on all IDRC project since 1970, including details on project location, objectives, funding, recipients, and evaluations via [idris.idrc.ca](http://idris.idrc.ca). IDRC is in the process of reviewing the IATI standards.

The Statistical Report is a report on development aid and as such excludes non-development related activities. The report is presented on an expenditures basis consistent with other government department reporting. Expenditures are counted when the payment is recorded in the accounting systems with the understanding that organizations receiving Canadian funding would utilise it over the length of the project. Repayment of loans previously extended to developing countries are shown as information items in this report (for simplicity, they are not part of the total). The breakdown presented in the various tables is based on the most up-to-date available at the time of compilation and reflects the information provided to CIDA by other government departments (federal, provincial, municipal) that engage in providing international assistance.

The report uses international standards that facilitate historical comparison as well as comparison with reports from other aid donors. These standards are regularly revised in forums such as the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) to improve reporting and better capture the evolution of aid.

Some costs, such as refugee resettlement, are estimates based on sound methodologies for the estimation that are revised and updated to ensure they are a good reflection of reality.

# Understanding this report

The terms and definitions used in this report are consistent, where possible, with international reporting standards, such as those agreed upon at the Development Assistance Committee of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD-DAC). For more information, please refer to the Glossary in Annex 5.

The term “**international assistance**” refers to any financial resource provided by Canadian governments (federal, provincial, or municipal) in favour of development aid. The terms “international assistance,” “international aid,” and “aid” are synonymous and are used interchangeably.


The **International Assistance Envelope (IAE)** is the main structure and policy tool to coordinate federal funding for Canada’s international assistance. While the majority of Canada’s aid is funded by the IAE, it is not the only source of funding. For example, the estimated costs for providing assistance to refugees from developing countries during their first year in Canada is managed outside of the IAE.

**Official Development Assistance (ODA), as defined in the Act, is compatible with the international definition** created by OECD-DAC. However, unlike the international definition, the Act does not cover assistance from provincial or municipal sources. The acronym used to denote ODA under the Act is “**ODAAA**” while the **ODA under the OECD-DAC definition is denoted by “ODA OECD”** to differentiate the two (see Table 1).

**International assistance and ODA are not equivalent.** Although the majority of Canada’s international assistance counts as ODA, some aid does not qualify as such under the Act. In this report, when aid does not qualify as ODA, it is called “other official assistance.”

**Other Official Assistance (also known as non-ODA)** refers to international assistance that does not fall under the definition of ODA but is part of the IAE. Non-ODA activities (such as military interventions) outside of the IAE are not included to maintain the reports focus on development.

The report presents figures on an **expenditures basis** whereas the IAE budget is set on an issuance basis. This is relevant because the majority of international development projects often span multiple years, and amounts allocated to a project’s budget are not necessarily spent according to a strict schedule.

The terms “**bilateral**” and “**multilateral**” in this report refer to internationally accepted definitions (see Glossary in Annex 5). For multilateral aid, the purpose (sector) in Table B1 and the destination (recipient) in Table D3 are estimates based on reports prepared by multilateral organizations on their spending in the previous year. These

estimates are prepared according to international standards and provide a breakdown of Canadian multilateral aid (see “multilateral aid” in the Glossary for the complete explanation).

**Consistent with international standards, payments are reported in the year the government makes them**, rather than when they are used by the ultimate recipient<sup>1</sup>. For example, spending to developing countries through multilateral long-term institutional support is estimated based on when the payment to the organization is recorded and may not necessarily reflect the actual use of funds. In addition, many trust funds that aim to catalyze additional funding from other investors and donors typically need to reach a certain funding threshold before disbursements begin.

**Rounding errors** (also known as round-off errors) are common occurrences in financial/statistical reporting that result from rounding approximations when truncating decimal places. As such, details presented in this report’s tables may not add up to exact totals due to rounding. Please note that this report presents financial information on an expenditure basis.

\* Any difference between the figures in the “ODA: ODAAA (Statistical Report)” column and those published in the Report to Parliament on the Government of Canada’s Official Development Assistance 2011–2012 (the summary report) can be attributed to that report’s preliminary nature. The Statistical Report provides a more up-to-date set of data where some preliminary figures are finalized and provided in greater detail.

When Canada reports to the OECD-DAC, figures are reported on a calendar year basis in US dollars. Therefore, their depiction in this table is for illustrative purposes. In addition, loan repayments are excluded from this table to enable the comparison of the various columns. The ODA Accountability Act requires departments to report on their gross disbursements whereas the OECD reports on both gross and net basis. Loan repayments are disclosed in Table A as an information item.


# Delivering on Canada's international assistance commitments

CIDA is resolved to invest in development and humanitarian assistance that delivers tangible results for those most in need in the developing world. It has also espoused a principle of "pay what you pledge", to ensure that these commitments reach the intended beneficiaries in a fulsome and timely fashion.

Progress on key commitments include:


## Muskoka initiative on maternal, newborn, and child health

The Government of Canada is committed to its efforts to ensure that countries are able to deliver quality services, treatment, and advanced care for mothers and newborns. As part of Canada's 2010 commitment of \$2.85 billion over five years, Canada disbursed \$670 million in 2011–2012 towards maternal, newborn and child health objectives, of which \$219 million were specific Muskoka Initiative objectives. To date, Canada disbursed close to \$1.2 billion, or 42% of the target.



## Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria

The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria was created to dramatically increase resources to fight three of the world's most devastating diseases: HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and malaria. Support for the Global Fund has saved an estimated 8.7 million lives. Canada has supported the Global Fund since its inception. In September 2010, Canada pledged \$540 million to the Global Fund for the 2011-2013 period.




## Canadian HIV Vaccine Initiative (CHVI)

In February 2007, the Government of Canada and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation jointly announced the Canadian HIV Vaccine Initiative (CHVI), the goal of which is to accelerate the development of a safe, effective, affordable and accessible HIV vaccine. In 2010, the Government of Canada and the Gates Foundation announced their renewed commitment of \$111 million and \$28 million, respectively, to implement the Canadian HIV Vaccine Initiative from 2010-2017. Canada contributed \$19 million in 2011–2012 towards the initiative.

## Increasing Food Security

Canada remains a leader in the global effort to combat hunger and it is delivering measurable results through CIDA's Food Security Strategy. Since 2008, Canada's food assistance budget has been fully untied, reaching those who need it faster, at lower transportation costs, while supporting the development of local markets and agricultural development. In 2009, Canada committed \$1.18 billion as part of the G-8 L'Aquila Food Security Initiative for sustainable agricultural development, and in 2010-2011 became the first G-8 country to have met its commitment. Canada also continued to meet its commitment under the Food Aid Convention, providing at least 420,000 metric tonnes of wheat per year. In



2011, Canada pledged multi-year funding for global food security through the World Food Programme and the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, for a total of \$350 million over five years.

This funding will help meet the immediate food assistance needs of vulnerable populations affected by natural disasters and complex humanitarian situations.

Building on these commitments, the Government of Canada announced in May 2012 its support to the 2012 G-8 New Alliance for Food and Nutrition Security (the New Alliance), committing \$219 million over the next three years (starting in 2012-2013) to address the challenges of agricultural productivity in Africa.

# Fiscal year 2011–2012 in review

## Distribution of international assistance by source

In fiscal year 2011–2012, the volume of Canada's international assistance from all sources (federal, provincial, and municipal levels of government) reached **\$5.70 billion**. The breakdown below provides a summary distribution by source of funding:

**CIDA** provided 69 percent (**\$3,932.65 million**), up from 63 percent from the previous period.


Foreign Affairs and International Trade Canada (**DFAIT**) provided 8 percent (**\$470.57 million**) down from 9 percent from the previous year.

International Development Research Centre (**IDRC**) provided 3.5 percent (**\$199.90 million**) up from 3 percent for the 2010–2011 period.


The **Department of Finance** provided 9 percent (**\$503.65 million**), down from 15 percent (**\$846.56 million**) from 2010–2011.<sup>2</sup>

### Geographic distribution of Canadian international assistance

The following breakdown provides an overview of distribution by geographic area:

**Africa** received the largest portion of Canadian international assistance in fiscal year 2011–2012, with **\$2.39 billion**, or 42 percent, up from 38 percent from 2010–2011 period, due in part to the response to severe droughts.

**Asia** received **\$1.15 billion**, 20 percent (down from 21 percent from previous year).

**Americas** received **\$986 million**, 17 percent (up from 15 percent from previous year).

**Eastern Europe** received 3 percent with **\$181 million**.

**Middle East** received 2 percent (down from 3 percent from 2010–2011) with **\$122 million**.

**Unallocable** refers to costs that are global in nature and do not relate to a particular recipient or region (e.g. costs of refugees in Canada, see Glossary for more information). The share of unallocable expenditures decreased to 16 percent from 20 percent in 2010–2011.



## Top 20 country recipients of Canadian international assistance

Detailed below are the top 20 country recipients of Canadian international assistance. The top 3 country recipients in fiscal year 2011–2012 were [Ethiopia, \\$207.64 million](#), [Haiti, \\$204.58 million](#), and [Tanzania, \\$181 million](#). \* The Republic of South Sudan became independent on July 9, 2011. In 2011–2012, CIDA's Geographic Programs Branch allocated \$30.4 million for programs in South Sudan.

In 2009, as part of Canada's new aid effectiveness agenda, Ethiopia was selected by the Government of Canada as a country of focus. Canada is the third largest donor country in Ethiopia. CIDA's programs in Ethiopia support the vision set out in Ethiopia's Growth and Transformation Plan. Ethiopia's own budget allocation for the benefit of the poor is the highest in Africa, and numerous human development indicators have shown systematic improvements over the past five years. However, while progressing on many fronts, Ethiopia has experienced high inflation, exacerbated by the high fuel and food prices in the global market since 2010. Canada is helping Ethiopia meet its development objectives and meet these challenges. Canada is focusing its programming on the root causes of food insecurity, improving the coverage and quality of basic services, and promoting market-based agricultural development. A good example is Canada's support to the Productive Safety Net Program (PSNP), which is widely credited with ensuring the region's worst drought in 60 years did not become a famine in Ethiopia. This cash- and food-for-work program has helped an estimated 7.6 million people facing the possibility of hunger or starvation, mainly children and youth, access a stable source of food and protect their assets, enabling them to survive until the next growing season and preventing extreme malnutrition. As the drought intensified, Canada approved an additional \$35 million through this Program to extend support to drought-affected program beneficiaries, thereby protecting the important gains made since PSNP's inception.

When a devastating earthquake shook the already-fragile Caribbean nation of Haiti, Canada moved quickly to provide \$85 million in immediate disaster relief, in addition to \$55 million for the Canadian Forces participation in operations. On March 31, 2010, through the New York Commitment, Canada pledged an additional \$400 million in support of the


Action Plan for National Recovery and Development in Haiti, of which \$178 million was disbursed in 2011–2012. The Government of Canada also created the Haiti Earthquake Relief Fund to match, dollar for dollar, the generous contributions of individual Canadians. In 2011–2012, Canada disbursed \$67 million as part of its total commitment of \$220 million allocated for the matching fund<sup>3</sup>.

Tanzania's young but stable democracy and has one of Africa's stronger governance and human rights records. However, the global economic downturn affected Tanzania's revenues due to lower prices and diminished demand for tourism and for major exports. Canada's assistance to Tanzania focused on economic growth, maternal and newborn health care and education for children and youth. In 2011–2012, CIDA supported greater transparency and accountability in the mining industry with the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative by ensuring that mining companies publicly report all taxes and royalties and the Government of Tanzania discloses what it receives from companies. Through the Financial Sector Deepening Trust, Canada helped increase the number of women and youth accessing financial services by 18 percent, from 449,000 in 2010 to 532,000 in 2011. As part of Canada's initiatives in health, CIDA improved vaccination coverage from 83 percent in 2011 to 90 percent in 2012, protecting more children against preventable diseases such as measles and tetanus. As well, CIDA helped train 4,900 teachers to assist youth in preventing and coping with HIV/AIDS infection. Canada also supports multilateral initiatives in Tanzania by the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria and the World Health Organization's Stop TB Partnership that have helped millions receive bed nets to prevent malaria and improve early detection of Tuberculosis.

## Canadian humanitarian assistance in 2011–2012

The Government of Canada provided \$599 million in humanitarian assistance in 2011–2012. Approximately 90% of this support was provided as responsive funding<sup>4</sup>, with the remainder provided as long-term institutional support to multilateral humanitarian organizations.

**Top 15 recipients of Canadian bilateral humanitarian assistance in 2011–2012**



The formerly unified country of Sudan was the highest recipient of Canadian humanitarian assistance in 2011–2012. The Comprehensive Peace Agreement of 2005 officially ended the north-south conflict, and after a successful referendum in 2011, South Sudan became an independent country in July 2011. However, despite the progress made,

the situation remains fragile. Outbreaks of violence continue to occur in both countries, particularly in the border regions and in Darfur, where 2.7 million people were displaced in 2011–2012 by internal conflict.

Canada's assistance to Sudan follows a whole-of-government strategy to address humanitarian challenges, reduce security threats, enhance stability, and support efforts for long-term sustained economic growth. In 2011–2012 CIDA disbursed \$58.76 million to help create the conditions for long-term peace, stability, and prosperity.

In 2010-2011, a severe drought affected the East Africa region (Somalia, Kenya, Ethiopia, Eritrea, and Djibouti). The drought, said to be the worst in 60 years, caused a severe food crisis and threatened the livelihoods of an estimated 13 million people. Canada responded by providing funding for humanitarian efforts and establishing the East Africa Drought Relief Fund, which raised over \$70 million from Canadians. In total, CIDA contributed \$155 million to the humanitarian response between December 2010 and March 2012<sup>5</sup>. Because of Canadian humanitarian and international efforts, widespread famine across the region was averted and the famine-affected population in Somalia was able to cope and recover more quickly.





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
### Canadian Historical Development Assistance (ODA)

### Glossary

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<b>A</b>	<b>administrative costs (operations and management)</b>	In 1979, OECD-DAC members agreed that ODA figures should include the administrative costs of extending assistance. This inclusion of administrative cost data was intended to improve the comparability of total ODA figures among donor countries.
<b>B</b>	<b>bilateral aid (as opposed to multilateral aid)</b>	<p>Bilateral aid is the disbursement of funds where the donor earmarks or controls the funds by specifying the recipient and/or other aspects of the initiative. Bilateral aid can be undertaken:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• by a donor country directly with a developing country;</li><li>• with national and international non-governmental organizations (NGOs) active in development and other internal development-related transactions such as interest subsidies, spending on promotion of development awareness, debt reorganization and administrative costs; or</li><li>• with a multilateral organization when the donor effectively controls the disposal of the funds by specifying the recipient or other aspects of the disbursement.</li></ul>

**civil society  
(as opposed to

In this report, civil society includes:

- Canadian not-for-profit organizations that have a legal personality in Canada, including NGOs, international NGOs, volunteer cooperation agencies, cooperatives, unions and federations, faith-based organizations, professional associations, educational and policy research institutes;
- regional, national, and local institutions, not-for-profit organizations and agencies from developing countries and territories that have a legal personality; or
- international not-for-profit organizations that have a legal personality in the country in which their headquarters are located.

To be considered international, an organization must have an international membership and management, and its governing body must be elected regularly on an international basis.

**Communications Branch**

Amounts related to this branch of CIDA represent aid program expenditures for the Development Information Program. The program recognizes and promotes the efforts of Canadians through mass media and educational initiatives.

**cost of refugees**

Refers to costs for refugees during their first year in a donor country. It includes the estimated expenditures to bring refugees to a donor country and the costs associated with food, shelter, and training.

Note that only the costs covered by the federal government are considered ODA under the *Official Development Assistance Accountability Act*. See “About this report” at the beginning of this document.

**country programs  
(as opposed to regional  
programs)**

Country programs are presented in Table D-1 and Table D-2, and cover a broad range of activities. These include programs carried out directly with government organizations, including direct budget support. Funds are also managed through an executing agent, or local or international NGOs or institutions, depending on program delivery, and the specific conditions and agreements reached with the recipient country.

International assistance programs managed by DFAIT are also reported to Parliament through the main estimates of that department. DFAIT’s international assistance programs encompass a wide range of activities, including some expenditures that are considered official development assistance. DFAIT’s international assistance expenditures include security and stability programming, assessed contributions, services rendered abroad, democracy, children and youth, environment, climate change and Francophonie programs.

**developmental food aid**

The term refers to the supply of edible human food under national or international programs, including transportation costs, cash payments made for food supplies, project food aid, and food aid for market sales, excluding emergency food aid. See definition of “emergency food aid.”

	An example of developmental food aid is the World Food Programme's School Feeding Program. School meals encourage hungry children to attend school and help them concentrate on their studies.
<b>disaster prevention and preparedness</b>	Refers to a specific set of humanitarian assistance activities that support disaster risk reduction (e.g. developing knowledge, natural risks cartography, legal norms for construction); early warning systems; and emergency contingency stocks and contingency planning, including preparations for forced displacement.
<b>E</b> <b>emergency food aid</b>	This refers to a specific set of humanitarian assistance activities, including general free distribution or special supplementary feeding programs providing short-term relief to targeted population groups affected by emergency situations. The term excludes non-emergency food security assistance programs/food aid. See "developmental food aid."
<b>encashment of notes, or cash basis (as opposed to issuance of notes)</b>	A note encashment is a disbursement against a note that has been issued.
<b>expenditures</b>	The term "expenditures" refers to either: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• an amount spent (e.g. transfer payment in the form of a grant or contribution);</li> <li>• a capital subscription or advance to an international financial institution in the form of a note issuance; or</li> <li>• an estimated ODA-eligible cost (e.g. a cost for refugees in Canada).</li> </ul>
<b>Export Development Canada (EDC)</b>	Canada reports as ODA concessional credits that it grants through the Export Development Corporation under Section 23 of the <i>Export Development Canada Act</i> . These concessional credits, meeting approved development criteria, are not, however, considered part of the regular aid program budget (International Assistance Envelope). <p><b>Note:</b> The 2011-2012 Statistical Report is prepared on an expenditures basis and the loan repayments for previous ODA loans are no longer netted out of the totals. These loans are presented in Table A for information only. Annex 2 provides a detailed breakdown of EDC and CIDA loan repayments by country.</p>
<b>F</b> <b>Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM)</b>	Any ODA expenditures are reported by the FCM on behalf of its members. Members of the FCM include Canada's largest cities, small urban and rural communities, and 17 major provincial and territorial municipal associations.
<b>Finance Canada</b>	This refers to ODA flows reported by the Department of Finance Canada, which is responsible for delivering a major portion of Canada's ODA. It manages the transfer of funds for Canada's Official Bilateral Debt Relief negotiated through multilateral forums such as the Paris Club. It also takes the lead in managing Canada's relationship with the World Bank Group. The funding to the World Bank's International Development Association and to the International Monetary Fund is reported to Parliament through the Main Estimates of the Department of Finance.
<b>fiscal year</b>	This report is prepared on the fiscal-year basis adopted by the Government of Canada. The 2011–2012 fiscal year began April 1, 2011, and ended March 31, 2012.

<b>G</b>	<b>general budget support</b>	This refers to a particular sector defined by the OECD-DAC as unearmarked contributions to the government budget, support for the implementation of macroeconomic reforms (structural adjustment programs, poverty reduction strategies), and general program assistance (when not allocable by sector).
<b>H</b>	<b>Geographic Programs Branch</b>	Geographic Programs Branch refers to four entities within CIDA's organizational structure: Africa Branch; Americas Branch; Asia Branch; and Europe, Middle East and Maghreb Branch. These branches deliver the majority of CIDA's bilateral aid through programs for a given country (see definition for country programs) or through regional programs. See definition of "regional programs." In this report, the term also includes the Afghanistan and Pakistan Task Force.
<b>I</b>	<b>Health Canada</b>	This refers to aid expenditures incurred by the Department of Health Canada in support of the Pan-American Health Organization. Through PAHO, Canada advances multilateral and bilateral relations in health, and provides technical cooperation and capacity building (see Table A).
	<b>imputed foreign student costs</b>	This refers to the cost of educating foreign students from ODA-eligible countries in Canada. It excludes tuition fees paid by foreign students or their sponsors. See definition of "ODA-eligible imputed costs."
	<b>imputed interest on advance payments</b>	In 1988-89 CIDA's spending levels were reduced permanently by \$4.5 million, the amount was set following a request for exemption to allow issuing advance payments. The new Policy on Transfer Payments no longer requires departments to report the imputed interest costs, and as such, these costs are no longer included in the Statistical Report.
	<b>international assistance</b>	Canada's international assistance is composed of any financial resources provided by any level of the Canadian government (federal, provincial, municipal) in favour of development. These expenditures may or may not qualify as official development assistance.
	<b>International Assistance Envelope (IAE)</b>	Within the context of fiscal planning, the IAE is Canada's main planning instrument for coordinating its international assistance, including, but not limited to, ODA. The IAE funds CIDA's programs and international assistance components of other government departments.
	<b>International Development Association (IDA)</b>	The IDA is the part of the World Bank that helps the world's poorest countries. The IDA is funded largely by contributions from the governments of its developed member countries. The IDA lends money (known as credits) on concessional terms. This means that IDA credits have no interest charge, and repayments are stretched out over 35–40 years, including a 10-year grace period. The IDA also provides grants to countries at risk of debt distress.
		Canadian funding to IDA is managed by the Department of Finance Canada, and is represented in the form of note encashments.
	<b>International Development Research Centre (IDRC)</b>	Refers to ODA spent by the IDRC. The IDRC is a Canadian Crown corporation funded through the IAE working in close collaboration with researchers from developing countries in their search for the means to build healthier, more equitable, and more prosperous societies.
	<b>international financial institution (IFI)</b>	IFIs are financial institutions that have been established (or chartered) by more than one country, and are therefore subject to international law. Their owners or shareholders are generally national governments, although other international institutions and other organizations occasionally figure as shareholders. The most prominent IFIs are creations of multiple nations, although some bilateral financial

	<p>institutions (created by two countries) exist and are technically IFIs. Many of these are multilateral development banks. The best-known IFIs are the World Bank, the IMF, and regional development banks.</p>
<b>international humanitarian assistance (IHA)</b>	<p>IHA is defined as assistance designed to save lives, alleviate suffering, and maintain and protect human dignity during emergencies and in their aftermath. - pools contributions so that they become an integral part of the financial assets.

In this report, the term “multilateral aid” includes both ODA and non-ODA elements.

In an effort to estimate/impute the portion of assistance going through those organizations to developing countries, the OECD has developed a series of coefficients based on flow of resources (on a calendar-year basis) disbursed by the organizations in the developing countries. This set of coefficients is used, in part, to estimate the disbursements shown in **Table D-3**.

It is important to note that any methodology for imputing multilateral flows will always be an approximation. Multilateral flows in a given year are not exactly imputable to donors’ contributions in that year, no matter what methodology is used. Among the reasons for this are:

**General approximations and timing.** The estimated country and sectors amounts are counted when the government makes the payment to the organization and based on the totality of the programme, rather than when the payment is used by the ultimate recipient. Donors’ contributions to multilateral institutions are reportable in the year they are paid. Many trust funds aim to catalyze additional funding from other investors and donors. Such funds typically need to reach a certain funding threshold before disbursements begin, sometime after Canada’s contribution.

**Limits of data on multilateral outflows.** While a number of multilateral agencies report to the OECD on the use of their funding (by country, by sector, etc.) some do not. Therefore, the country and sector breakdowns of those organisations are estimated using others sources, such as annual reports.

**Grants to lending institutions.** Some institutions lend rather than grant funds. Their lending in any one year may be much greater than donors’ contributions, since it also draws on reflows of principal, interest receipts, and transfers of funds within the institution.

**Multilateral and Global Programs Branch** This CIDA branch manages the development aspects of Canada’s relations with multilateral organizations, provides financial support for these organizations, and helps determine their policies and programs throughout the world.

Multilateral and Global Programs Branch delivers bilateral and multilateral aid. See related definitions of “bilateral aid” and “multilateral aid.”

**multilateral organizations** The OECD-DAC defines multilateral organizations as international institutions with governmental membership that conduct all, or a significant part, of their activities in favour of development and aid recipient countries. They include multilateral development banks (e.g. the World Bank and regional development banks), United Nations agencies, international public-private partnerships (PPPs), and regional groupings (e.g. certain European Union and Arab agencies).

CIDA, as well as DFAIT, Health Canada, Environment Canada, Industry Canada, and the Canada Post Corporation make contributions toward regular budgets of certain multilateral organizations (also called long-term institutional support or core funding). These contributions can be considered as ODA either in whole or in part. The percentage value for each organization is provided by the OECD-DAC. See **Table C-2**.

<b>N</b>	<b>National Defence and Canadian Forces (DND)</b>	This refers to ODA-eligible contributions on behalf of the Department of National Defence, such as the provision of humanitarian relief supplies. Military type interventions (for example, bilateral peacekeeping missions) and other activities that are not development focused are not included in this report.
<b>O</b>	<b>ODA-eligible imputed costs</b>	This describes a cost category that is eligible for ODA status under the OECD-DAC guidelines, but with no actual expenditure data readily available. Instead, an estimate is produced based on a statistical model and/or professional judgement. This includes the cost of refugees (first year), imputed foreign student costs, services provided without charge by other government departments and imputed interest on advance payments, for which definitions can be found in this glossary. The new Policy on Transfer Payments no longer requires departments to report the imputed interest costs on advance payments and therefore these costs no longer appear in the Statistical Report.
	<b>Office for Democratic Governance</b>	Launched under the name Canada Corps in December 2004, the Office for Democratic Governance was an initiative of the Government of Canada to engage more Canadians in international development, and to harness their expertise and experience to deliver international assistance in the area of governance.
	<b>official bilateral debt relief</b>	Official bilateral debt relief refers to debt-service relief negotiated through multilateral forums such as the Paris Club. The transfer of funds, administered by the Department of Finance Canada, is considered ODA-eligible.
	<b>official development assistance (ODA)</b>	<p>In Canada, “official development assistance” may refer to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li data-bbox="621 1079 1339 1167">1. the international definition created by the Development Assistance Committee of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD-DAC); or</li> <li data-bbox="621 1167 1307 1220">2. the definition established in the <i>Official Development Assistance Accountability Act</i> (ODAAA).</li> </ol>
		Unless otherwise specified, “official development assistance,” as used in this statistical report, refers to the definition in the ODAAA. ODA represents the vast majority of Canada’s international assistance. For more information, look in the section “About this report” at the beginning of this document.
	<b>other official assistance (also known as non-ODA)</b>	This refers to activities that do not meet the conditions for eligibility as Official Development Assistance because they are not primarily aimed at development (e.g. counter-terrorism capacity building, military observers). On the other hand, incremental costs incurred for the use of the donor’s military equipment to deliver humanitarian aid or perform development services are ODA-eligible (for example, emergency assistance by the Disaster Assistance Response Team). Activities outside the IAE that are not ODA eligible are considered out-of-scope of this report and hence not reported (e.g., military-related training, supply of military equipment and services to peacekeeping missions, and the forgiveness of debts incurred for military purposes).
<b>P</b>	<b>Partnerships With Canadians Branch (PWCB)</b>	This branch of CIDA contributes to international cooperation initiatives designed and delivered by Canadian private- and voluntary-sector organizations, including non-governmental organizations, educational institutions, professional memberships and associations, cooperatives, youth organizations, and companies.

	<b>Payables at Year-End</b>	The recording against the current fiscal year of liabilities incurred but which have not been paid by the end of the accounting period.
	<b>program aid</b>	This term refers to international assistance spending by CIDA's aid programs, excluding operations and management costs, and changes in the value of investments in IFIs.
	<b>provincial governments</b>	This refers to international assistance programs of the provinces of Quebec, Manitoba and Alberta. For example, the Government of Quebec provides long-term institutional support to certain multilateral institutions such as the Organisation internationale de la Francophonie (OIF), and undertakes bilateral projects in a number of countries. The <i>Official Development Assistance Accountability Act</i> does not apply to these programs.
<b>R</b>	<b>regional development banks</b>	These are International Financial Institutions (IFIs) that are owned and operated by member nations. They are designed to extend development loans and provide other assistance to member nations. The world's five regional development banks are the African Development Bank Group, Asian Development Bank, European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, Caribbean Development Bank, and Inter-American Development Bank.
	<b>regional programs</b>	Refers to regional programs managed by CIDA's Geographic Programs Branch (see definition) that address the regional issues countries face together. In <b>Table D-1</b> and <b>Table D-2</b> , these programs are reported separately from country programs. See definition of "country programs."
	<b>Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP)</b>	This refers to ODA disbursements made by the RCMP for bilateral programs aimed at post-conflict peacebuilding and security system management and reform.
<b>S</b>	<b>sector codes (Table B-1)</b>	<p>Sector codes are used to describe the purpose of aid. The list of sectors is compiled by the OECD-DAC. From time to time, modifications are made with the approval of donor countries. The OECD-DAC sector classification contains the following broad categories:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>social infrastructure and services</b> – covering the sectors of education, health, population, water, government, and civil society;</li> <li>• <b>economic infrastructure and services</b> – covering transport, communications, energy, banking and finance, and business services;</li> <li>• <b>production</b> – covering agriculture, forestry, fishing, industry, mining, construction, trade, and tourism; and</li> <li>• <b>multi-sector</b> – covering, for example, general environmental protection; other multi-sector aid, including urban and rural development; and non-sector allocable aid for contributions not susceptible to allocation by sector, such as general budget support, actions relating to debt, humanitarian aid, and internal transactions in the donor country.</li> </ul> <p>The sector of destination of a contribution provides the specific area of the recipient's economic or social structure the transfer is intended to foster. The sector classification does not refer to the type of goods or services provided.</p> <p>Due to differences in timing and methodology, the figures reported in <b>Table B-1</b> will vary significantly from those reported in "Table 5: Official Bilateral Commitments by Sector of Destination" of the OECD-DAC's questionnaire on ODA.</p>

There are three main reasons for these discrepancies:

- **fiscal year vs. calendar year** – The *Statistical Report on Official Development Assistance* is based on the Government of Canada's fiscal year; however, the DAC questionnaire is based on the calendar year.
- **commitments vs. disbursements** – The DAC's Table 5 is prepared on a commitment basis rather than when funds are actually disbursed.
- **proportionate coding** – CIDA's systems permit coding many sectors against any given contribution; however, the OECD's reporting allows only for a single purpose code for each aid project/program.

<b>services provided without charge by other departments</b>	This refers to costs incurred by other departments for accommodation, legal, and cheque-issuing services rendered to CIDA. See definition of ODA-eligible imputed costs.
<b>Strategic Policy and Performance Branch</b>	This represents ODA-eligible international assistance programs of CIDA's Strategic Policy and Performance Branch for representing Canada at international forums on development and ensuring that international commitments are reflected in Canadian development policies.
<b>Unallocable or non-allocable aid (as opposed to allocable aid)</b>	When aid disbursements cannot be assigned by country or sector, (e.g. costs of refugees in Canada) the disbursement is referred to as unallocable or non-allocable.

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
