



#### Introduction

This publication constitutes the final version of the 1986 Census Products and Services. It replaces the preliminary version released in March 1987. Information on products available from the 100% data base and the 20% data base is provided as well as information on how to order these products.

#### The 1986 Census

The 1986 Census was the first mid-decade census in Canada's history to undertake detailed enumeration. Data were collected on demographic, social and economic characteristics, and on dwellings, with the information being recorded in a 100% data base and a 20% sample data base.

The 100% data base includes general demographic and dwelling and household data (for example: age, sex, marital status, mother tongue and structural type of dwelling) from the entire population.

The 20% sample data base includes general demographic data plus detailed socioeconomic data (for example: ethnic origin, labour force activity, schooling, income and dwelling characteristics) collected from one-fifth of the population. It excludes the institutional residents.

All data compiled by Statistics Canada are subject to confidentiality procedures, under the provisions of the Statistics Act that prohibit disclosure of information that could identify an individual.

#### How to Use This Publication

#### Structure

Unlike the preliminary edition, this publication is divided into two parts, the census products and the census services. Each part is then subdivided into sections according to product or service offered. A "product" is defined as a publication, a machine-readable

table and profile, a map or a computerized file which is already predetermined and can be available, without delay, as soon as a user requests it. A "service" permits the user to obtain, on request only, a product specially designed to meet the client's needs.

#### Content

- This publication begins with a general table of contents, and also features a specific table of contents at the beginning of each part, three appendices and an index.
- A description of each product and service is provided and the table titles found on machine-readable tables and data publications are listed.
- A list of publications showing the catalogue numbers, the prices and the release dates, as well as a list of geographical maps series and a sample of each one, are included.
- The names of depository libraries, regional reference centres and different Statistics Canada services are listed. An order form and a comments card are also provided.

#### POPULATION AND DWELLING COUNTS

The Population and Dwelling Counts publications provide basic 1986 counts for all standard geographic areas. Measures of change since 1981 are frequently given as well.

A total of 20 publications are available in two series:

- Population
- · Place Name Reference Lists

#### POPULATION SERIES

These 17 publications provide final, unrounded population and dwelling counts. Five of these publications (one per each type of selected standard geographic area) provide the counts for Canada, e.g., one publication contains data on all FEDs in Canada. The remaining 12, one publication per province or territory, present counts according to various standard geographic levels within the province or territory.

#### 92-101 Census Divisions and Subdivisions

This publication presents 1986 population counts along with the national rank and provincial rank of each CD and CSD. For example, a CSD in Newfoundland is ranked by population size with other Newfoundland CSDs, and all CSDs in Canada. Tables list the data either alphabetically by CD and CSD or by decreasing population size.

#### THE NATION SERIES

These 19 publications indicate the scope and depth of census information. Considerable detail for selected variables is given and cross-tabulation of variables illustrate the analytical potential of the data.

The series provides national coverage. Most tables include provincial and territorial data, but no subprovincial data. Some tables include comparisons to 1981 data, and a few show data from earlier censuses. Four of the publications contain only data collected from all households (100% data); the remainder provide data collected from a 20% sample.

#### 93-156 Census Metropolitan Areas

This publication provides data covering a wide range of census variables for the 25 census metropolitan areas. The tables contain more detailed distributions and cross-classifications than can be obtained from the "Profiles" series. Information is provided on demographic, social, cultural, mobility, economic, family, household and dwelling characteristics. In addition, some tables include data from the 1981 Census to add a historical perspective. The 1981 boundaries have been adjusted to compare with the CMA boundaries established for 1986.

The publication is divided into two main sections which present 100% data and 20% sample data.

## 93-157 Canadians and Their Occupations: A Profile

This publication presents data for approximately 200 selected detailed occupations by sex showing a range of demographic, economic and socio-cultural characteristics for Canada. The occupation data are presented according to the 1980 Standard Occupational Classification.

#### PROFILE SERIES

This series is a statistical overview of geographic areas. A wide range of census variables are covered in limited detail. Variables include:

- demography

Typically, the variables are not cross-tabulated and a limited number of indicators such as percentages and rates are shown. Separate profiles will be published for the 100% data and the 20% sample data.

A total of 105 publications is proposed for this series.

Appendix A is an example of a profile (100% data) for census divisions and census subdivisions.

For the 1986 Profile Series, information on the population 65 years of age and over has been added. Other variable categories such as mother tongue, home language and ethnic origin have been expanded. In addition, incidence reporting - the listing of those categories that have the highest counts within selected variables - has been introduced.

Incidence reporting will be based on the following:

- Total provincial or territorial counts for census division and census subdivision profiles. For example, mother tongue data will include the five non-official languages in each province that have the highest counts.
- Highest counts of each individual census-tracted centre for profiles of census tracts and component census subdivisions.

## 98-120 Canada's Population from Ocean to Ocean

This study provides a historical overview of population changes and regional distributions with an analysis of changes in the more recent period. Special attention has been paid to the belt along the border with the United States. The report also covers changes in population distributions of subregions such as census metropolitan areas and census subdivisions.

This study reviews the growth in the size of the elderly population and its changing composition by sex, marital status, etc., during the period 1976 to 1986. In addition, the rapid growth among the "oldest" old and some of its implications are analysed. The study also examines patterns of population aging in Canada and in other selected countries including Japan, the United States, the United Kingdom, Sweden, etc.

#### 98-122 Canada's North, A Profile

This study presents a demographic and socio-economic profile of the population living in the northern regions of Canada. The analysis highlights selected aspects such as linguistic diversity, education levels, labour and income characteristics, housing conditions, etc.



## 98-123 The Inner City in Transition

This study examines the popular belief that the inner city has changed from an area of low value housing stock and a low income population to an area of increased value housing stock (through restoration and renovation) with a relatively well off population. To this end, changes in the demographic, socio-cultural and economic characteristics of the population in the inner cities of selected metropolitan areas are examined using data from the 1986 and earlier censuses.

## 98-124 Canada's Youth

This study describes recent demographic trends and their role in creating a diversity of families in Canada. The analysis takes into account living arrangements, family structure, presence and age of children and labour force participation of family members.

#### 98-128 Family Income

This study concentrates on an examination of changes in family income between 1980 and 1985 in terms of constant (1985) dollars by selected characteristics such as family structure, life cycle, work activity and major source of income. The composition of various income classes and the sources of total income are briefly analysed. The study highlights the relative position of various regions.

#### 98-129 Employment Income

This study highlights the major differences in the employment income of various population groups. Classified by sex, average employment income is examined by age, marital status, education, work activity and occupation. Provincial differences are presented briefly. The study also includes a short analysis of changes in employment income between 1980 and 1985.

#### 98-130 Affordability of Housing in Canada

This study focuses on how much Canadians spend on housing in relation to their income. Trends in dwelling types, housing prices, costs and household incomes are presented and regional differences discussed. The study will examine the characteristics of those households whose shelter costs to income ratios are significantly below or above average.

## 98-131 Canada - A Linguistic Profile

This study analyses three aspects of this topic in Canada. First, the evolution of the diversity of languages is presented. Secondly, the strength of the English language to attract and assimilate other languages is examined. Finally, the progress towards a bilingual society, with English and French as the two official languages, is investigated.

#### 98-132 Ethnic Diversity in Canada

This study reviews the changing ethnic profile of Canada and the distribution of major ethnic groups. It examines the applicability of cultural mosaic and melting pot concepts to the Canadian situation. Special attention is focussed on the population reporting multiple ethnicity. The role played by immigration is incorporated into the analysis.

## 98-133 Canada's Farm Population

This study presents a brief historical review of the changes in farm population over the past decades and analyses differences between farm and non-farm populations in respect of such characteristics as age, marital status, labour force activity, income, etc. The study also examines the socio-economic characteristics of farm operators.

#### 98-134 Educational Attainment of Canadians

This study highlights the changes in the educational stock in Canada over the last quarter of a century. The 1986 Census collected information on the major field of study of all postsecondary graduates. Special attention is devoted to an analysis of broad groups of major field of study by socio-demographic and economic characteristics.

#### 98-135 Trends in Occupation and Industry

This study presents an industry-occupation employment structure as revealed by the 1986 Census and includes trend analysis between 1971 and 1986. The study also examines changes in the distribution of the experienced labour force among occupations and industries between 1971 and 1986.

#### MACHINE-READABLE TABLES

## Description

The Basic Summary Table series is made up of 43 cross-classifications, each of which features two or three variables and deals with one of the following topics: demography, mobility, ethno-cultural characteristics, language, schooling, labour force characteristics, income, families, households and dwellings.

The tables are produced for the following three geographic levels: (i) enumeration areas (EAs) and federal electoral districts (FEDs), (ii) census subdivisions (CSDs) and census divisions (CDs), (iii) census tracts (CTs), census metropolitan areas (CMAs), tracted census agglomerations (CAs) and provincial census tracts (PCTs). Because the tables are prepared for small geographic areas, only the main categories of variables will enter into their composition.

#### List

A list of all the basic summary tables follows. Each table is identified by a number.

For example: DM86A01

The first two characters ("DM") identify the subject area, "86" is the census year, "A" or "B" identifies the data base (that is, "A" means 100% of households and "B" means 20% of households) and the last two digits are the table number within each subject area.

The number of categories presented, including totals and subtotals, is shown in brackets for each variable. For example "sex (3)" means that there are 3 categories - "males", "females", and "total". Another example, "age (8)" and "age (8A)" would indicate that there are two different breakdowns of eight categories for the variable "age". Further details on these breakdowns are available on request.

## **Availability**

Basic summary tables based on 100% data will be available in the fourth quarter of 1987 and in the first quarter of 1988, while the tables based on the 20% sample data should be released during the last three quarters of 1988. Announcement of availability of each table will be carried in the Statistics Canada Daily.

#### MACHINE-READABLE PROFILES

#### Description

The concept of profiles is discussed on page 29 and a description of the content is featured on pages 29 and 30. The machine-readable profiles will generally contain exactly the same univariate distributions of data as found in the publications. Two profiles are available, the first presenting data collected for 100% of the population, and the second presenting data collected from a 20% sample.

Machine-readable profiles are available on magnetic tape, and on diskette in certain cases, for the following geographic areas:

- census divisions and subdivisions
- federal electoral districts
- census-tracted centres (CTs and component subdivisions)
- census metropolitan areas and census agglomerations
- enumeration areas

Profiles for Labour Force Survey Economic Regions and urban and rural areas can be obtained in machine-readable form upon request.

#### Price

#### MAPS

Most of the standard census geographic areas are presented on maps in publications: in some cases as separate map bulletins and in other cases included with the data publications. However, in addition to the small scale reference maps in the publications, larger, more detailed maps described below are available by contacting your nearest Statistics Canada Regional Reference Centre.

These maps enable users to locate and identify census geographic areas and relate statistical data to the corresponding geographic area.

## INDIVIDUAL MAPS, "G86" SERIES

Eight series of reference maps, at various levels of detail, are available for all census geostatistical areas of the 1986 Census. Most maps are available in the following media:

Ozalid paper

- blueprint, whiteprint or diazo paper

- used to make positive line prints from translucent originals

Intermediate film - used to generate ozalid paper hard copy and for use as a second original (to protect original from excessive handling)

Ozapaque film

- a matte surface film coated on a white opaque polyester base

- replaces ozalid cloth

- ideal for prints which will undergo rough treatment

# PRE-PRINTED STATISTICAL MAPS

Statistical maps are produced for popular themes such as population change and population density and are available as custom copies or in pre-printed form. Maps are produced in black and white or colour, in a variety of sizes. A sample of these maps is also shown in Appendix C.

#### COMPUTERIZED GEOGRAPHIC FILES

These products allow computer manipulation of geographic data both in batch and interactively. They consist of data linkage files such as the Geography Tape File and geographic files such as the Area Master File.

# Geography Tape File

This file assigns to each 1986 Census enumeration area (the basic geographic unit of census data collection) all higher geographic levels by codes and names. It includes all standard geographic codes, and also locates each enumeration area centroid according to Universal Transverse Mercator (UTM) coordinates and Lambert coordinates, as well as by latitude and longitude. The final 1986 population counts and occupied private dwelling counts for all enumeration areas are also presented.

#### Place Name Master File

The 1986 Place Name Master File lists census divisions, census subdivisions and all unincorporated places for which 1986 population was reported. (Unincorporated place refers to any cluster of five or more permanently occupied dwellings, in rural areas, locally known by a specific name but not having a local government or legal limits.) Information given includes Standard Geographical Classification codes, census codes, type of place, location in latitude and longitude, census map number and population. For unincorporated places, a breakdown of population by enumeration areas is also given.

#### Postal Code Geographic Conversion File

This file matches six-character postal codes to geographic codes used by the census, and also locates each postal code according to Universal Transverse Mercator (UTM) coordinates and latitude/longitude coordinates. The file contains one or more records for each postal code.

Information for standard geographic areas can be supplied on tape, and for smaller files also on diskette or paper copy.

#### Area Master File

An Area Master File (AMF) contains a logical representation of all city streets and other features (such as railroad tracks, rivers and municipal boundaries) in machine-readable form. An AMF geographically references every street, address range, block-face and centroid coordinate in the coverage area. AMFs are available for most urban centres with a population of 50,000 or more.

Detailed maps can be produced from the AMFs to show the street pattern as well as the other features contained in the AMFs. Node maps are available showing the street pattern, names and node numbers (where streets and other features intersect). These maps can be used to identify user-defined areas. Maps can also be produced to show address or centroid data.

For details on AMF coverage and map availability, users should contact the Information Services Unit of the Geography Division.

### Attribute File

This file contains the name of every geographic area along with its Standard Geographical Classification code or census code, as applicable, its 1981 population adjusted to 1986 boundaries, its 1986 final population, its 1986 land area, and the National Topographic System (NTS) map number.

# Block-face Data Linkage File

The Block-face Data Linkage File (BFDLF) is a file relating each block-face to the Standard Geographical Classification structure and showing the population and dwelling counts. A block-face refers to one side of a city street between consecutive intersections with streets or similar physical features, for which census data are coded and stored.

# **Boundary Files**

Generic boundary files are available for selected geographic areas, e.g., census metropolitan areas/census agglomerations, provincial census tracts and urban areas. These files consist of basic area identification and lists of coordinates to create a polygon representing the particular geographical area.

More detailed Cartographic Boundary Files, called CARTLIBs, are also available.

### CUSTOM DATA PRODUCTS SERVICE

The Census Custom Data Products Service provides products aimed at meeting users' needs as effectively as possible. Clients can obtain custom tabulations designed to meet their exact requirements. They themselves define the content, geographic level and medium for the product.

Production costs and delivery time vary with the type of product requested. The more customized the product is in terms of geography, variables, target populations or format, the longer the delivery time and the higher the production costs will be.

These products and services are constantly changing to meet new data and technology needs. Consequently, it is not possible to provide a detailed and up-to-date list of them in this publication. Rather, an overview of the services is provided. For precise details on the content and price of the products, contact Statistics Canada's Regional Reference Centres.

The Census Custom Data Products Service provides two types of products - semicustom and custom. The former are less flexible than the latter in terms of content, geography and medium, and hence are available at lower cost and faster.

#### SEMI-CUSTOM PRODUCTS

The semi-custom products lie between the basic summary and the fully custom products in terms of the amount of flexibility available. They have been developed to meet the needs of users who require basic tabulations of data, but for specialized geographic areas or output media. By re-using many times the predetermined retrieval programs, and varying only the geographic level and output medium, costs and delivery times are reduced from those of fully custom products.

There are two main components of the Semi-custom Service: (a) cross-tabulations and (b) profiles.

#### CROSS-TABULATIONS

The cross-tabulation service offers to the data user a list of tables which present cross-classifications of two and three census variables. Tables selected from the list are produced for the geographic areas specified by the user, and provided on the desired medium.

The list of cross-tabulations was developed based on 1981 Census data usage and ongoing consultation with users. It includes all of the Basic Summary Cross-tabulations, any published tables which are suitable for production at small geographic levels, plus other tables specially designed for the cross-tabulation service. The list will continue to evolve throughout the census output process as new data needs and issues are identified.

#### Content

The cross-tabulations cover all of the census subject areas plus themes of interest, as listed below. Tables are limited, in most cases, to two or three variables in order that they may be produced for small geographic areas.

# Census subject areas:

- demography;
- mobility;
- ethno-cultural characteristics;
- language;
- schooling;
- labour force characteristics;
- income:
- families:
- households; and
- dwellings.

### Examples of themes of interest:

- labour market;
- the elderly;
- (other themes could be added).

# Geographic Level

Semi-custom cross-tabulations will be available, within the limits imposed by the protection of confidentiality, for any geographic region specified by the user. The geographic level may be defined in terms of any of the following types of areas:

- Standard census geographic areas

Standard census areas include both political and statistical regions, such as:

- provinces and territories;
- census metropolitan areas (CMAs) and census agglomerations (CAs);
- primary census metropolitan areas (PCMAs) and primary census agglomerations (PCAs);
- census divisions (CDs);
- census subdivisions (CSDs);
- census consolidated subdivisions (CCSs);
- federal electoral districts (FEDs);
- census tracts (CTs);
- provincial census tracts (PCTs);
- urban areas (UAs);
- enumeration areas (EAs).

Standard census areas can also be added or subtracted to form special user-defined regions. For example, census tracts could be aggregated to form city planning districts, or census subdivisions aggregated to form market areas.

- Geocoded regions

Data can be retrieved for any area which can be marked on a map and geocoded. Possible formats include circles around points, grids, or other simple polygons. Examples of applications of geocoding include city wards which are defined as polygons on a map, and marketing target areas defined as circles of a specified diameter around central points.

### Output Medium

Semi-custom cross-tabulations will be available on a variety of output media, including:

- computer print-out;
- magnetic tape; and
- microfiche.

Each client will specify the output medium on which the selected product is to be produced. Specialized formats, required for compatibility with computer systems or publication programs, can be provided in most cases.

# **Price**

The prices of semi-custom cross-tabulations are dependent on the total population being counted and the number of geographic areas for which data are presented. They range from \$250 for a small city to \$2,000 for the approximately 6,000 census subdivisions in Canada.

# Delivery

Tables presenting basic demographic data collected for 100% of the population are now available; detailed socio-economic data collected from a 20% sample of the population will begin to become available in the spring of 1988. A special listing of tabulations available from this service will be compiled and updated as required.

Further details on these products may be obtained from the Advisory Services staff at the nearest Statistics Canada Regional Reference Centre or from the Census Custom Products Service in Ottawa. Users are encouraged to order the products well in advance of the release dates, particularly if specialized geographic areas must be created.

#### SEMI-CUSTOM PROFILES

Profiles provide an overview of a selected geographic region. Through the presentation of univariate distributions, they summarize many categories of data available from the census, in a format which is compact and easy to use.

Data are presented in terms of counts, rates and averages, providing indicators which can be easily compared across geographic areas. The profiles are valuable reference tools for users requiring quick summaries of the characteristics of the selected areas. They are particularly suited to entry into systems for basic data analysis, including comparisons, graphing and mapping.

#### Content

The profiles provide overviews of user-specified geographic areas similar to those in the published profiles. (See Appendix A for an example of a published profile.)

The presentation of the data, also similar to that of the published profiles, is set in advance. Thus, the selected geographic regions are indicated as column headers across the top of the page, with the distributions of the variables following one another down the page.

Two profiles are available, one presenting the basic data collected for 100% of the population, and the other presenting the detailed socio-economic data collected from a 20% sample.

# Geographic Level

Semi-custom data profiles will be available, within the limits imposed by the protection of confidentiality, for any geographic region specified by the user. The geographic level may be defined in terms of any of the following types of areas:

- Standard census geographic areas

Standard census areas include both political and statistical regions, such as:

- provinces and territories:
- census metropolitan areas (CMAs) and census agglomerations (CAs);
- primary census metropolitan areas (PCMAs) and primary census agglomerations (PCAs);
- census divisions (CDs);
- census subdivisions (CSDs);
- census consolidated subdivisions (CCSs);
- federal electoral districts (FEDs);
- census tracts (CTs);
- provincial census tracts (PCTs);
- urban areas (UAs);
- enumeration areas (EAs).

Standard census areas can also be added or subtracted to form special user-defined regions. For example, census tracts could be aggregated to form city planning districts, or census subdivisions aggregated to form market areas.

Geocoded regions

Data can be retrieved for any area which can be marked on a map and geocoded. Possible formats include circles around points, grids, or other simple polygons. Examples of applications of geocoding include city wards which are defined as polygons on a map, and marketing target areas defined as circles of a specified diameter around central points.

### **Output Medium**

Semi-custom data profiles can be produced on paper output and magnetic tape.

The desired output medium will be specified by each client on ordering the product.

### Price

The prices of semi-custom profiles are dependent on the total population being counted and the number of geographic areas for which data are presented. The prices for profiles of 100% data range from \$1,500 for a small number of geographic areas in an area of less than 500,000 to \$3,300 for up to 199 geographic areas covering all of Canada. Prices for profiles of 20% sample data range from \$3,000 to \$6,600.

# Delivery

Semi-custom profiles presenting the basic data collected for 100% of the population are now available; profiles presenting detailed socio-economic data collected from a 20% sample will be available at the same time as the published version. (See List of Publications, page 36.) Further details on the semi-custom data profiles may be obtained through the Advisory Services at the nearest Statistics Canada Regional Reference Centre or from the Census Custom Products Service in Ottawa. Users are encouraged to order the products well in advance of the release dates, particularly if specialized geographic areas must be created.

# **CUSTOM PRODUCTS**

Within the constraints imposed by the protection of confidentiality, custom products can be produced from the 1971, 1976, 1981 and 1986 Census micro-data bases. Products are developed to meet the needs of individual clients, according to their exact requirements in terms of content, geography, format and output medium.

Statistics Canada consultants assist clients in developing specifications for custom products which meet as far as possible the data requirements, while keeping within budget and other constraints.

#### Content

A custom product may be any tabulation of census micro-data not available through other products or services. Examples of specialized content needs include:

- a new combination or cross-classification of variables;
- the presentation of a different distribution for an existing variable;
- the creation of a new variable derived from existing ones.

Census Dictionaries of terms are available for each of the census micro-data bases to assist clients in identifying the required variables and distributions. Documentation on historical comparability of concepts is also available for users interested in making comparisons across census years.

### Geographic Level

As for the semi-custom products, custom products can be produced, within the limits imposed by the protection of confidentiality, for any geographic area which can be marked on a map. The geographic level may be defined in terms of any of the following types of areas:

- Standard census geographic areas

Standard census areas include both political and statistical regions, such as:

- provinces and territories;
- census metropolitan areas (CMAs) and census agglomerations (CAs);
- primary census metropolitan areas (PCMAs) and primary census agglomerations (PCAs);
- census divisions (CDs);
- census subdivisions (CSDs);
- census consolidated subdivisions (CCSs):
- federal electoral districts (FEDs);
- census tracts (CTs);
- provincial census tracts (PCTs);
- urban areas (UAs);
- enumeration areas (EAs).

# Geographic Level - Concluded

Standard census areas can be added or subtracted to form special user-defined regions. For example, census tracts could be aggregated to form city planning districts, or census subdivisions aggregated to form market areas.

# - Geocoded regions

Data can be retrieved for any area which can be marked on a map and geocoded. Possible formats include circles around points, grids, or other simple polygons. Examples of applications of geocoding include city wards which are defined as polygons on a map, and marketing target areas defined as circles of a specified diameter around central points.

# Output Medium

Custom products can be prepared to the specifications of the client on a variety of output media, including:

- computer print-out;
- magnetic tape; and
- microfiche.

Specialized formats, required for compatibility with computer systems or publication programs, can be provided in most cases.

#### **Price**

Custom products are prepared on a cost-recovery basis, including all personnel, computer and other costs incurred in developing and producing the tabulation. Factors influencing the cost and delivery time include the number of data cells in the table and its complexity, the size and number of geographic areas to be presented, and the output medium.

### Delivery

The cost and delivery time is determined individually for each custom product, and approved by the client before development begins.

Further details on custom products are available from the Census Custom Products Service in Ottawa or the nearest Statistics Canada Regional Reference Centre.

### GEOGRAPHY INFORMATION SERVICES

The Geography Division of Statistics Canada offers a variety of services. These services give the client flexibility in selecting their geographic base. Special requirements can be discussed with knowledgeable personnel in the division.

# Geocoding

The Geographically Referenced Data Storage and Retrieval System (GRDSR), or Geocoding System, is used to geographically code and store census data. It assigns geographic coordinates (centroids) at the population centres of every enumeration area in Canada and at the geographic centre of each block-face in most large urban areas. This system permits the retrieval of census data for user-defined areas.

# **Special Population Compilations**

Population compilations are available from the current census and previous censuses. Counts are based on compilations from census collection documents.

# Special Analysis/User Consultation and Systems Development

We develop products and systems to meet special needs and offer advice on making better use of available products and services.

# Map Library

The Geography Division's Map Library contains all maps used by census collection personnel (Commissioners, Census Representatives) from the 1971 Census onward, and has the capacity of reproducing these maps at the same size or as enlargements or reductions.

# **Customized Street Index File**

A cross-referenced street index file of address ranges by user-specified areas can be produced from the Area Master File.

# Node Maps/AMF Street Network

These maps, available for existing AMF coverage, show the street pattern in detail, including names, as well as other features such as railroad tracks, rivers, municipal boundaries and all nodes (where streets and other features intersect).

#### GEOCARTOGRAPHICS SERVICES

The Geocartographics Services involve the application of computerized techniques to geography, cartography and graphics. A wide range of clients, both inside and outside the federal government, are serviced on a cost-recovery basis. The services offered include customized maps, atlases, machine-readable files and consultation. Prices are based on specific client requirements.

# Customized Maps and Atlases

Customized maps and atlases for national, regional, provincial and urban areas can be produced on paper, mylar, film, transparency or slide for standard census areas, postal codes or client-supplied areas. A sample is shown in Appendix C.

# Customized Cartographic Files

A range of files for standard and non-standard census geographic areas are available in user-specified coordinate systems and formats suitable for use with various mapping systems (including SAS/GRAPH, ATLAS, GIMMS, STATMAP and ARC/INFO). Included are census subdivisions, census consolidated subdivisions, census divisions, provinces, federal electoral districts, census tracts and forward sortation areas. Data are available on tape or diskette.

# Cartographic Consultation and Training

Consultation and training are offered concerning automated mapping packages, geographic information systems, geographic data bases, and micro-based statistical mapping. Standard courses are available on geographic information systems, census cartography, the GIMMS mapping package, and the TELL-A-GRAF graphics package.

#### OTHER CENSUS-RELATED SERVICES

Users can obtain assistance from Statistics Canada services other than the Census Custom Products Service, Geography Information Services, Geocartographics Sub-Division and Electronic Data Dissemination Division, which were mentioned on previous pages. An explanation of the products and services provided by these other services follows.

#### CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

The User Services Unit of the Census of Agriculture provides data users with special tabulations that cannot be met from regular publications or special tabulation packages available from the Statistics Canada Regional Offices. Users should contact the User Services Unit if they require cross-classified data, have non-standard geographic area requests, or require new distributions for displaying sums and counts. Custom requests can be filled for each of the 1971, 1976, 1981 and 1986 Censuses. Historically linked data go back to the 1966 Census. The User Services Unit also serves needs for socio-economic data concerning the farmer and his/her family from the 1971, 1981 and 1986 Agriculture-Population Linkages.

Users are cautioned that confidentiality constraints are imposed on the data prior to release. All user-specified requests are cost recoverable. Cost estimates and completion dates are supplied to the user before work commences.

#### HEALTH AND ACTIVITY LIMITATION SURVEY

The Health and Activity Limitation Survey (HALS) is a follow-up survey to the 1986 Census of Population. It includes a sample of approximately 120,000 individuals who completed the detailed questionnaire in the 1986 Census of Population. The survey provides, in addition to the data from the census, information on the nature and severity of the disabilities, and the barriers encountered by disabled persons.

Data from the survey will be released in March 1988. The proposed output includes a number of publications and a micro-data file. The HALS program team will respond to special requests during 1988.




## G86-13 MAP OF CENSUS TRACTS/ENUMERATION AREAS




#### **G86-14 MAP OF SELECTED CENSUS SUBDIVISIONS**





C'est pourquoi la Division de la diffusion informatique des données de Statistique Canada stocke actuellement cette série sur bandes et sur disquettes.

Vous pouvez ainsi obtenir des profils portant sur 37 grands centres urbains, de St. John's à Victoria; ceux-ci présentent de l'information au niveau des secteurs de recensement et des municipalités les composant. Vous pouvez aussi vous procurer des profils des divisions et subdivisions de recensement. Il ne vous restera plus ensuite qu'à les analyser avec votre propre système informatique.

Vous vous apercevrez également que les données des secteurs de recensement de 1986 sont plus complètes que jamais. Entre autres, il y a davantage de données détaillées sur la langue maternelle et sur les personnes ágées de 65 ans et plus ainsi que des profils des secteurs de recensement de Lethbridge (Alberta).

Quelle que soit la forme sous laquelle vous les désirez, les données portant sur les centres urbains du Canada n'attendent que vous. Pour en savoir plus long, il vous suffit de communiquer avec le centre de consultation de Statistique Canada de votre région.
