


• smaller than male

Juvenile:

- similar to adult male
- paler and smaller bill
- no casque
- white or pinkish facial skin
- pale grey eyes

NOTE: This species has a tiny, severely fragmented, remaining population and it qualifies as Critically Endangered under the IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature) Red List. You have a critical role in protecting this species!

Glossary

Casque: a piece of defensive or ornamental armour for the head

Mandible: one of the two parts of a bird's bill

Countries Targeted

Countries of Origin: Philippines

Countries of Import: Germany, Portugal, United States of America

Countries of Export: Philippines

Parts and Derivatives

Skull and tail feathers are used to make traditional costumes for ceremonies. The casque is used for ornamental carvings and the bill to make jewelry.

Please be vigilant when encountering such items.

Inspection Considerations

While proceeding with the physical inspection of live bird shipments, pay special attention to the country of origin of the birds as described on permits and invoices. Specimens might be concealed in shipments of non-CITES species.

As this species is listed under Appendix II, the shipment must be accompanied by a CITES export/re-export permit issued by the exporting/re-exporting country.
