# Amalgamation of Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) and Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade (DFAIT)

On June 26, 2013, the *Budget Implementation Act* (Bill C-60) received Royal Assent, creating the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD). The new department, the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development Canada (DFATD), will continue to serve the same functions as those of previously served by DFAIT and CIDA.

Since this report covers a period prior to the amalgamation (2012–2013), the former Canadian International Development Agency and the former Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade are represented as two separate entities. Starting next fiscal year, 2013–2014, all of DFATD's expenditures will be represented as one entity.

#### **About this report**

This is an annual Statistical Report on International Assistance prepared by the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD) on behalf of the Government of Canada. This report presents a comprehensive and detailed account of Canadian International Assistance in 2012–2013, published in accordance with the *Official Development Assistance Accountability Act* (ODAAA or the Act).

Under the Act, the Minister of International Development is required to issue two key reports on behalf of the government: a summary-level report six months after the end of each fiscal year, and an annual statistical report one year after the end of each fiscal year. In addition to meeting the second reporting requirement under the Act, this report provides a single source for international assistance expenditure statistics, including official development assistance (ODA) and other official assistance, for Canada as a whole.

The report is presented on an expenditures basis consistent with other government department reporting. Expenditures are counted when the payment is recorded in the accounting systems, with the understanding that organizations receiving Canadian funding would utilize it over the length of the project. Repayments of loans previously extended to developing countries are shown as information items in this report. The breakdown presented in the various tables is based on the most up-to-date information available at the time of compilation and reflects the information provided to DFATD by other government departments and other levels of government (provincial and municipal).

The report uses international standards that facilitate historical comparison as well as comparison with reports from other international assistance donors. For example, some costs such as refugee resettlement are calculated based on agreed-upon international standards. Such standards are regularly revised in forums such as the Development Assistance Committee of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD-DAC) to improve reporting and better capture the evolution of international assistance.

#### **Understanding this report**

The terms and definitions used in this report are consistent, where possible, with international reporting standards such as those agreed upon by the Development Assistance Committee of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD-DAC). For more information, please refer to the Glossary in Annex 5.

The term "**international assistance**" refers to any financial resource provided by Canadian governments (federal, provincial, or municipal) in favour of development assistance. <u>It is important to note that not all international assistance is considered official development assistance (ODA).</u>

Canada is subject to two definitions of ODA: one defined by the Development Assistance Committee (DAC) of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, and the other defined by the ODA Accountability Act (ODAAA).

- The vast majority (97 percent) of Canada's international assistance is considered ODA, as defined by the
  OECD-DAC (denoted as ODA). ODA represents "those flows to countries and territories on the DAC List of
  ODA Recipients and to multilateral institutions which are:
  - i. provided by official agencies, including state and local governments, or by their executive agencies; and
  - ii. each transaction of which:
    - a) is administered with the promotion of the economic development and welfare of developing countries as its main objective; and
    - b) is *concessional in character* and conveys a grant element of at least 25 percent (calculated at a rate of discount of 10 percent)."
- ODA in the federal context, as defined by Canada's Official Development Assistance Accountability Act
  (denoted as ODAAA), is compatible with the definition above, and must meet the three criteria set out in section
  4.1 of the Act: contribute to poverty reduction; take into account the perspectives of the poor; and be consistent
  with international human rights standards. By its nature, ODA in the federal context excludes international
  assistance provided by provinces, territories, and municipalities.
- The International Assistance Envelope (IAE) is a dedicated pool of resources that enables the Government of Canada to deploy its international assistance nimbly and responsively. The IAE funds 88 percent of Canada's international assistance. The envelope is used to fund the majority of Canada's ODAAA-related activities, and other specific activities that do not meet the definition of ODA, such as certain peace and security efforts and nonconcessional loans for international climate change initiatives.

#### Other technical notes on reporting

**Timing of payments:** the report presents figures on an expenditures basis whereas the IAE budget is set on an issuance basis. This is relevant because the majority of international assistance projects span multiple years, and amounts allocated to a project's budget are not necessarily spent in the same fiscal year.

The terms "bilateral" and "multilateral" in this report refer to internationally accepted definitions (see Glossary in Annex 5). For multilateral assistance, the purpose (sector) in Table B1 and the destination (recipient) in Table D3 are estimates based on reports prepared by multilateral organizations on their spending in the previous year. These estimates are prepared according to international standards and provide a breakdown of Canadian multilateral assistance (See "multilateral assistance" in the Glossary for the complete explanation).

Consistent with international standards, payments are reported in the year the government makes them, rather than when they are used by the ultimate recipient<sup>1</sup>. For example, spending to developing countries through multilateral long-term institutional support is estimated based on when the payment to the organization is recorded and may not necessarily reflect the actual use of funds. In addition, many trust funds that aim to catalyze additional funding from other investors and donors typically need to reach a certain funding threshold before disbursements begin.

**Rounding errors** (also known as round-off errors) are common occurrences in financial/statistical reporting that result from rounding approximations when truncating decimal places. As such, details presented in this report's tables may not add up to exact totals due to rounding.

#### **Government of Canada's Commitment to Aid Transparency**

This statistical report is part of the Government of Canada's commitment to transparency. To further enhance the efficiency and accountability of Canada's international assistance, DFATD does the following:

- provides all parliamentary reports as required (such as the Departmental Performance Report);
- tables annual summary reports to Parliament on behalf of the Government of Canada on preliminary official development assistance expenditures;
- publishes a periodic report, Development for Results;
- publicly discloses on its website, on a quarterly basis, all contract awards over \$10,000 and all grants and contribution awards over \$25,000;
- outlines the country development plan for each country of focus, including country program disbursements and the objectives being supported, on the development page of the DFATD website;
- maintains the International Development Project Browser, which contains up-to-date profiles for projects funded by the former CIDA and DFATD;
- maintains the OpenData Web portal, a single online source for all DFATD international development statistical data:
- makes its evaluations, audit reports, and strategic environmental assessment (SEA) statements available to the public on the DFATD website;
- reports to the Development Assistance Committee (DAC) on Canadian international assistance through its renowned "DAC.Stats" database populated with statistics from most donor countries and major multilateral organizations.

In addition, former CIDA joined the International Aid Transparency Initiative (IATI) in November 2011, underscoring its commitment to being more transparent. As of January 31, 2014, DFATD had published its sixth set of quarterly data.

Similarly, the International Development Research Centre (IDRC) provides open, online access to information of all IDRC's projects since 1970, including details on project location, objectives, funding, recipients, and evaluations via idris.idrc.ca.

<sup>\*\*</sup> Note: the "ODA: OECD-DAC" figures presented in this table are shown on a fiscal year basis, in Canadian dollars, in order to compare and contrast reporting under the ODA Accountability Act versus the ODA reported to the OECD. When Canada reports to the OECD-DAC, figures are reported on a calendar-year basis in US dollars. Their depiction in this table is for illustrative purposes only. In addition, loan repayments are excluded from this table to enable the comparison of the various columns. The ODA Accountability Act requires departments to report on their gross disbursements whereas the OECD reports on both gross and net basis. Loan repayments are disclosed in Table A as an information item.

#### Fiscal year 2012-2013 in review

In fiscal year 2012–2013, the volume of Canada's international assistance from all sources (federal, provincial, and municipal levels of government) reached \$5.48 billion. The breakdown below summarizes the distribution by source of funding:

CIDA provided 63 percent (\$3,446.32 million).


Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade (**DFAIT**) provided 8 percent (\$431.35 million).

International Development Research Centre (IDRC) provided 5 percent (\$254.59 million).

The **Department of Finance** provided 11 percent (\$604.85).



# Geographic distribution of international assistance



**Africa** received the largest portion of Canadian international assistance in fiscal year 2012–2013, with \$2.45 billion, or 45 percent, up from \$2.39 billion in 2011–2012.

Asia received \$1.12 billion, or 20 percent of total international assistance.

Americas received \$714 million, or 13 percent.


**Eastern Europe** received 2 percent with \$130 million.

Middle East received 3 percent with \$153 million, up from \$122 million in 2011–2012.

Unallocable refers to costs that are global in nature and do not relate to a particular recipient or region (e.g. costs of refugees in Canada. See Glossary for more information). The share of unallocable expenditures equalled to 17 percent of the total in 2012–2013. For more details, please refer to Table D1 in this report.

#### Top 20 country recipients of Canadian international assistance

Detailed below are the top 20 country recipients of Canadian international assistance. The top 3 country recipients in fiscal year 2012–2013 were Tanzania, \$188.99 million, Ethiopia, \$181.14 million, and the Democratic Republic of Congo, \$157.09 million. Top 20 Recipients of Canada's international assistance

The East African country of **Tanzania** demonstrated strong progress on economic and development goals, although poverty continues to afflict about 30 percent of the population (ranking 152 out of 186 countries as per the Human Development Index). CIDA's programming in Tanzania focused on securing the future of children and youth, stimulating sustainable economic growth, and promoting more accountable and inclusive governance. In October of 2012, Canada announced six new initiatives to further development in Tanzania, including Maternal, Newborn, and Child Health (MNCH), initiatives supporting public financial management, and increasing transparency in extractive industries. The initiatives under MNCH are contributing to making progress in child survival and maternal health. Examples of results achieved in 2012–2013 include the increase in the use of insecticide-treated bed nets to combat malaria by pregnant women and children, and an increase in the number of health facilities providing reproductive and child health services. Canada's strategic and early support of the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI) in Tanzania is contributing to greater accountability in government and extractive industries.

Ethiopia continues to have one of the world's highest levels of poverty (ranking 173 out of 186 countries as per the Human Development Index). Food insecurity is one of the greatest challenges Ethiopia faces. DFATD's programming in this country addresses the structural causes of food insecurity with a focus on helping farmers increase their agricultural production, and assisting private sector businesses involved in agriculture to become more productive. In 2012–2013, CIDA provided 6.9 million people in Ethiopia with food through the provision of a food- and cash-for-work programs. This allowed those in need to meet their basic food requirements without having to trade or sell their livestock. CIDA's programs helped develop methods to increase the value of crops, link smallholder farmer groups to markets, and introduce new technologies to rice farmers, which has increased farmer's incomes by an average of 32 percent.


The Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) has suffered from prolonged conflict particularly in the eastern region of the country. Despite sustained economic growth and vast natural resources, extreme poverty has persisted throughout the country: fifty-nine percent of the population lives on less than US\$1.25 a day and the country continues to lag in terms of development (ranking 186 out of 187 countries on the human development index). The capacity of the Congolese government to provide its citizens with health, education, water, and sanitation services remains limited. Sexual and gender-based violence, particularly against women and girls, continues with relative impunity. Humanitarian needs grew in 2012 and 2013, particularly in North Kivu and Katanga provinces. Between January 2012 and March 2013, entrenched conflict in three territories of Katanga province, the country's wealthiest, led to the displacement of 300,000 people. This figure is part of the 2.6 million people displaced in DRC as of March 2013 and in need of humanitarian assistance to meet their basic daily needs. Following a regional peace, security and cooperation framework signed by DRC and neighbouring countries in February 2013, the United Nations Security Council authorized an Intervention Brigade to help neutralize armed groups.

In 2012–2013, the Government of Canada provided debt relief of \$63.83 million. CIDA programmed \$51.31 million in bilateral aid which included strengthening the capacity of the DRC's health system, supporting victims of sexual violence, building institutions, and humanitarian assistance. During the Francophonie Summit, held in Kinshasa in September 2012, the Prime Minister announced an \$18.5M initiative to continue to support survivors of sexual violence, and prevent and fight impunity for perpetrators of such crimes. Canada also provides support to Canadian organizations working in DRC, and to regional and multilateral initiatives in the areas of peace, good governance, health, sustainable natural resource management and the protection of human rights.

Canada and **Côte d'Ivoire** have close and cordial bilateral relations. A substantial debt burden has constrained Côte d'Ivoire from investing in basic social infrastructure. The Government of Canada announced in August 2012 that it would be forgiving the \$133.60 million debt owed by Côte d'Ivoire as part of the Heavily Indebted Poor Countries Initiative (HIPC). The amounts forgiven will allow the government to increase investments towards health and sanitation.

#### Canadian humanitarian assistance in 2012–2013

Canada provided \$528 million in humanitarian assistance in 2012–2013 and responded to complex humanitarian crises in 37 countries, including South Sudan, Somalia, Syria, Democratic Republic of Congo, and Pakistan, and responded to 32 natural disasters. Approximately 80 percent of this support was provided in response to specific crises<sup>2</sup>, with the remainder provided as long-term institutional support to multilateral humanitarian organizations and to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank.



Top 15 recipients of Canadian bilateral humanitarian assistance in 2012-2013

July 2013 marked two years since the independence of the Republic of **South Sudan**. Despite initial optimism, the humanitarian situation in the country remained fragile during 2012–2013. Increased border violence, internal insecurity, underlying vulnerability and rising food security concerns continued to generate high humanitarian needs throughout the year. Poor harvests, soaring food and fuel prices, conflict and displacement led to rising hunger and malnutrition across the country. More than half of the country's 10 million people were food insecure. In addition, the country continued to host over 200,000 refugees. In response to those needs, Canada, through its humanitarian partners, provided emergency food assistance, water and sanitation, healthcare and emergency nutritional support, shelter, and protection to vulnerable people throughout South Sudan.

Although the catastrophic drought that devastated the Horn of Africa in 2011 had largely abated by early 2012, its effects lingered well into the following year. Several million people in **Somalia**, Kenya, Ethiopia, Eritrea, and Djibouti remained in crisis, facing food insecurity and malnutrition, and one million Somalis continued to live as refugees in neighbouring countries. In response, Canada continued to provide substantial humanitarian support to the region through its multilateral and global programs. Through its partners, Canada provided emergency food assistance, water and sanitation, healthcare and emergency nutritional support, shelter, and protection to those in need. Meanwhile, countries of the Sahel region suffered a food and nutrition crisis. Canada was one of the key providers of humanitarian assistance in the Sahel region, and one of the first to respond to the crisis by taking action to prevent a famine and a severe humanitarian crisis in western Africa.

Syria's turmoil began in March of 2011 and continues to this day. The estimated death toll as of February 2014 exceeds 140,000, and millions of Syrians have sought sanctuary in neighbouring countries. According to the United Nations, 9.3 million people inside Syria require humanitarian assistance, of which 6.5 million are internally displaced. The Syrian crisis is one of the most significant humanitarian catastrophes of the 21st century, and Canada's support will ensure that emergency health services, shelter, food, water, and protection are provided to people affected by the conflict both inside Syria and in neighbouring countries. Humanitarian access continues to be a significant obstacle to getting assistance to people in need. The escalating conflict in Syria remains a challenge and humanitarian needs continue to be high in Syria and neighbouring countries. Canada provided its humanitarian assistance through experienced partners and, despite the challenges, achieved significant results by providing life-saving assistance, reducing the suffering, and working to maintain the dignity of people affected by the conflict in Syria.

Canada has committed over \$630 million in humanitarian, development, and security assistance since the start of the conflict in March 2011. This assistance includes \$353.5 million to international humanitarian assistance efforts in Syria and neighbouring countries, \$210.6 million to support development projects in the region to strengthen government services and infrastructure, and \$67.6 million in security-related assistance to address the impact of the Syrian crisis.

#### Delivering on Canada's international assistance commitments

Fiscal year 2012–2013 marked an important year for some of Canada's **leading international commitments**. For example, Canada delivered its largest-ever contribution to address climate change, disbursing a total of \$432 million in 2012–2013 and meeting the objective of \$1.2 billion in **Fast-Start Climate Change Financing**. Canada also met its \$220 million **humanitarian and recovery assistance** commitment to **Haiti** in the aftermath of the January 2010 earthquake.


Some key international assistance commitments include:


#### Maternal, Newborn, and Child Health (MNCH)

Canada remains a global leader on improving maternal, newborn and child health in developing countries. In 2010, Canada used its Presidency of the G8 to launch the **Muskoka Initiative**, which aims to accelerate progress on women's, children's and newborn's health in developing countries. G8 and non-G8 partners committed a total of US\$7.3 billion in new and additional funding over five years (2010–2015). Canada pledged \$1.1 billion in new funding over the same five-year period as well as committed to maintain existing funding levels of \$1.75 billion, bringing Canada's total five-year commitment to \$2.85 billion.

Canada's approach focuses on delivering integrated and comprehensive health services for mothers and children, which is achieved through programming that strengthens health systems, reduces the burden of disease, and improves nutrition.

At the end of 2012–2013, Canada had disbursed \$1.86 billion, including \$635 million in new funding towards meeting its pledged commitments of \$2.85 billion by 2015.






# Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria

Canada's support to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria is a critical component of the \$2.85 billion Muskoka Initiative. Canada has been a significant supporter of the Global Fund since its inception in 2002 and it continues to play a leadership role in saving the lives of mothers, children, and newborns that are particularly vulnerable to diseases such as malaria, tuberculosis, and HIV/AIDS. The Global Fund invests in large-scale prevention, treatment, and care programs, and supports national health systems. Through contributions from Canada and other international donors, an estimated 8.7 million lives, including some 100,000 lives per month in recent years, have been saved so far, Canada disbursed \$160 million to the Global Fund in 2012–2013 and reached its commitment of \$540 million in 2013-2014. In December 2013, the Government of Canada made a new commitment to the Global Fund of \$650 million over the next three years (2014-2016). This new pledge brings Canada's total commitment to more than \$2.1 billion since the inception of the Global Fund in 2002.

# Increasing Food Security and Improving Nutrition

In October 2011, the Minister of International Cooperation announced Canada's continued support to the UN's World Food Programme (WFP) and the Canadian Foodgrains Bank by committing \$350 million: \$125 million (over five years) to support WFP's overall objectives, \$100 million (over four years) for WFP's school feeding programs, and \$125 million (over five years) to support CFGB's operations. In total for 2012-2013, Canada provided roughly \$340 million to the World Food Programme, which includes the commitment mentioned above, in addition to other country-specific development programming and crisisspecific humanitarian programming, making Canada its third largest donor. The World Food Programme and the Canadian Foodgrains Bank are important allies in the fight against hunger.

Canada's work to improve access to sufficient quantities of nutritious food, and enhance the quality and effectiveness of its delivery, remains a strong government priority. In May of 2012, Canada pledged \$219 million over three years in support of the implementation of the G8 New Alliance for Food and Nutrition Security, to obtain long-lasting benefits for those who need help in breaking out of poverty and meeting basic needs. In 2012–2013, Canada disbursed \$133 million which contributed to collective efforts towards the New Alliance for Food and Nutrition Security in Ghana and Ethiopia in order to enhance agricultural productivity, improve nutritional status and unlock economic growth in Africa. In 2013–2014, Canada officially launched the cooperation framework with Senegal. This will enable the funding of investments in food security and nutrition totalling \$299 million over five years.

The Government of Canada ratified the new Food Assistance Convention that came into force on January 1, 2013. The objectives of the Food Assistance Convention are to save lives, reduce hunger, improve food security, and improve the nutritional status of the most vulnerable. Canada pledged a minimum annual commitment of \$250 million to meet the needs of the world's hungry.

## A administrative costs (see also operations and management)

In 1979, OECD-DAC members agreed that ODA figures should include the administrative costs of extending assistance. This inclusion of administrative cost data was intended to improve the comparability of total ODA figures among donor countries.

In the present report, the term "administrative costs" represents funds provided by a government department to an executing agency specifically earmarked to cover part of the latter's operations and management costs. See also "operations and management"

# bilateral assistance (as opposed to multilateral assistance)

Bilateral assistance is the disbursement of funds where the donor earmarks or controls the funds by specifying the recipient and/or other aspects of the initiative. Bilateral assistance can be undertaken:

- by a donor country directly with a developing country;
- with national and international non-governmental organizations (NGOs) active in development and other internal development-related transactions such as interest subsidies, spending on promotion of development awareness, debt reorganization and administrative costs; or
- with a multilateral organization when the donor effectively controls the disposal of the funds by specifying the recipient or other aspects of the disbursement.

Table A shows the breakdown of Canada's bilateral and multilateral assistance by source and by channel.

Table D-2 shows the breakdown of Canada's bilateral assistance by recipient.

## Canada Fund for Local Initiatives (CFLI)

The CFLI complements bilateral programs by supporting small projects in the technical, economic, educational, cultural, or social development of local communities. The funds are administered through the Canadian missions abroad. Prior to amalgamation, the program was managed by DFAIT. The program is now managed by the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD).

#### channel

In the context of this report and international development statistics, the term "channel" is used to distinguish between bilateral and multilateral assistance (see definitions for bilateral assistance and multilateral assistance).

civil society
(as opposed to
government
institutions or private

In this report, civil society includes:

- Canadian not-for-profit organizations that have a legal personality in Canada, including NGOs, international NGOs, volunteer cooperation agencies, cooperatives, unions and federations, faith-based organizations, professional associations, educational and policy research institutes;
- regional, national, and local institutions, not-for-profit organizations and agencies from developing countries and territories that have a legal personality; or
- international not-for-profit organizations that have a legal personality in the country in which their headquarters are located.

To be considered international, an organization must have an international membership and management, and its governing body must be elected regularly on an international basis.

See Table C-1.

#### Communications Branch

Amounts related to this branch of DFATD represent assistance program expenditures to promote development. The program supports the efforts of Canadians through mass media and educational initiatives.

#### cost of refugees

Refers to costs for refugees during their first year in a donor country. It includes the estimated expenditures to bring refugees to a donor country and the costs associated with food, shelter, and training. The methodology used is consistent with the OECD-DAC directives and available at:

Note that only the costs covered by the federal government are considered ODA under the *Official Development Assistance Accountability Act*. See "About this report" at the beginning of this document.

country programs (as opposed to regional programs) Country programs are presented in Table D-1 and Table D-2, and cover a broad range of activities. These include programs carried out directly with government organizations, including direct budget support. Funds are also managed through an executing agent, or local or international NGOs or institutions, depending on program delivery, and the specific conditions and agreements reached with the recipient country.

Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade (former DFAIT) Prior to amalgamation with CIDA, international assistance programs managed by DFAIT were also reported to Parliament through the main estimates of that department. These programs encompassed a wide range of activities, including some expenditures that are considered official development assistance. Also included were security and stability programming, assessed contributions, services rendered abroad, democracy, children and youth, environment, climate change and Francophonie programs.

Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development (DFATD)

On June 26, 2013, the Budget Implementation Act (Bill C-60) received royal assent, creating a new Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade, and Development.

Under this new Department, Canada continues to advance its priorities abroad by undertaking diplomacy and programming in support of international peace and security, democracy, human rights and the rule of law. The development side of DFATD remains dedicated to deliver tangible results for those most in need in the developing world and the Department continues to provide whole-of-government coordination in response to international crises and natural disasters.

## developmental food assistance

The term refers to the supply of edible human food under national or international programs, including transportation costs, cash payments made for food supplies, project food assistance, and food assistance for market sales, excluding emergency food assistance. See definition of "emergency food assistance."

An example of developmental food assistance is the World Food Programme's School Feeding Program. School meals encourage hungry children to attend school and help them concentrate on their studies.

## disaster prevention and preparedness

Refers to a specific set of humanitarian assistance activities that support disaster risk reduction (e.g. developing knowledge, natural risks cartography, legal norms for construction); early warning systems; and emergency contingency stocks and contingency planning, including preparations for forced displacement.

## emergency food assistance

This refers to a specific set of humanitarian assistance activities, including general free distribution or special supplementary feeding programs providing short-term relief to targeted population groups affected by emergency situations. The term excludes non-emergency food security assistance programs/food assistance. See "developmental food assistance."

encashment of notes, or cash basis (as opposed to issuance of notes) A note encashment is a disbursement against a note that has been issued.

#### expenditures

The term "expenditures" refers to either:

- an amount spent (e.g. transfer payment in the form of a grant or contribution);
- a capital subscription or advance to an international financial institution in the form of a note issuance; or
- an estimated ODA-eligible cost (e.g. a cost for refugees in Canada).

## Export Development Canada (EDC)

Canada reports as ODA concessional credits that it grants through the Export Development Corporation under Section 23 of the *Export Development Canada Act*. These concessional credits, meeting approved development criteria, are not, however, considered part of the regular assistance program budget (International Assistance Envelope).

Starting in 2012-2013, EDC reports contributions to the HIPC debt initiative. These were previously reported by Finance Canada.

<u>Note:</u> The 2012-2013 Statistical Report is prepared on an expenditures basis and the loan repayments for previous ODA loans are no longer netted out of the totals. These loans are presented in Table A for information only. Annex 2 provides a detailed breakdown of EDC and former CIDA loan repayments by country.

## Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM)

Any ODA expenditures are reported by the FCM on behalf of its members. Members of the FCM include Canada's largest cities, small urban and rural communities, and 17 major provincial and territorial municipal associations.

#### **Finance Canada**

This refers to ODA flows reported by the Department of Finance Canada, which is responsible for delivering a major portion of Canada's ODA including Official Debt Relief, that is, debt reorganisation that relieves the overall burden of debt in partner countries. Finance Canada also takes the lead in managing Canada's relationship with the World Bank Group. The funding to the World Bank's International Development Association and to the International Monetary Fund is reported to Parliament through the Main Estimates of the Department of Finance.

<u>Note:</u> Department of Finance Canada no longer reports contributions to the HIPC debt initiative. These are now reported by Export Development Canada.

#### fiscal year

This report is prepared on the fiscal-year basis adopted by the Government of Canada. The 2012–2013 fiscal year began April 1, 2012, and ended March 31, 2013.

## general budget support

This refers to a particular category defined by the OECD-DAC as unearmarked contributions to the government budget, support for the implementation of macroeconomic reforms (structural adjustment programs, poverty reduction strategies), and general program assistance (when not allocable by sector).

### Geographic Programs Branch

The Geographic Programs Branch within the former CIDA delivered the majority of CIDA's bilateral assistance through programs for a given country (see definition for "country programs") or through regional programs (see definition of "regional programs")

#### Health Canada

This refers to assistance expenditures incurred by the Department of Health Canada in support of the Pan-American Health Organization. Through PAHO, Canada advances multilateral and bilateral relations in health, and provides technical cooperation and capacity building (see Table A).

## imputed foreign student costs

This refers to the cost of educating foreign students from ODA-eligible countries in Canada. It excludes tuition fees paid by foreign students or their sponsors. See definition of "ODA-eligible imputed costs."

## international assistance

Canada's international assistance is composed of any financial resource provided by Canadian governments (federal, provincial, or municipal) in favour of development assistance. It is important to note that not all international assistance is considered official development assistance (ODA).

See section "Understanding this report" for more information

#### International Assistance Envelope (IAE)

The International Assistance Envelope (IAE) is a dedicated pool of resources that enables the Government of Canada to deploy its international assistance nimbly and responsively. The envelope is used to fund the majority of Canada's ODAAA-related activities, and other specific activities that do not meet the definition of ODA such as select peace and security efforts and non-concessional loans for international climate change initiatives.

## International Development Association (IDA)

The IDA is the part of the World Bank that helps the world's poorest countries. The IDA is funded largely by contributions from the governments of its developed member countries. The IDA lends money (known as credits) on concessional terms. This means that IDA credits have no interest charge, and repayments are stretched out over 35–40 years, including a 10-year grace period. The IDA also provides grants to countries at risk of debt distress.

Canadian funding to IDA is managed by the Department of Finance Canada, and is represented in the form of note encashments.

#### International Development Research Centre (IDRC)

Refers to ODA spent by the IDRC. The IDRC is a Canadian Crown corporation funded through the IAE working in close collaboration with researchers from developing countries in their search for the means to build healthier, more equitable, and more prosperous societies.

#### international financial institution (IFI)

IFIs are financial institutions that have been established (or chartered) by more than one country, and are therefore subject to international law. Their owners or shareholders are generally national governments, although other international institutions and other organizations occasionally figure as shareholders. The most prominent IFIs are creations of multiple nations, although some bilateral financial institutions (created by two countries) exist and are technically IFIs. Many of these are multilateral development banks. The best-known IFIs are the World Bank, the IMF, and regional development banks.

#### international humanitarian assistance (IHA)

IHA is defined as assistance designed to save lives, alleviate suffering, and maintain and protect human dignity during emergencies and in their aftermath. Humanitarian assistance is delivered in a manner that is consistent with the principles of humanity, impartiality, neutrality, and independence.

Humanitarian assistance includes:

- disaster prevention and preparedness;
- the provision of shelter, food, water, sanitation, and health services, and other items of assistance for the benefit of the affected people, and to facilitate the return to normal lives and livelihoods; measures to promote and protect the safety, welfare, and dignity of civilians and those no longer taking part in hostilities; and

rehabilitation, reconstruction, and transition assistance while the emergency situation persists.

#### International Humanitarian Assistance Directorate

This DFATD directorate provides support to humanitarian activities in response to funding requests from multilateral organizations such as the United Nations, World Food Programme, UNICEF, and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, and other experienced humanitarian partners, including the Red Cross Movement, and Canadian NGOs.

#### loan repayments

In this report, loan repayments are the repayments to Canada of development-related loans by developing countries, whether the loans were issued by former CIDA or other departments. A detailed breakdown by country/organization is available in Annex 2.

bilateral loans – Refers to repayments of loans granted by former CIDA to developing countries prior to 1986.

multilateral loans – Refers to repayments of loans granted by former CIDA to the Andean Development Corporation, the African Development Bank and Inter-American Development Bank.

## long-term institutional support

Long-term institutional support, also known as core funding, is the business delivery model that allows the government of Canada to provide financial support to entities (organizations, institutions, or recipient countries) whose actions achieve development results that reflect Canadian government goals and objectives.

In the *Statistical Report on International Assistance*, in accordance with international standards, long-term institutional support to multilateral organizations is counted as multilateral assistance, while long-term institutional support to NGOs is counted as bilateral assistance.

## material relief assistance and services

In **Table B-2**, this refers to a specific set of humanitarian assistance activities:

- the provision of shelter, water, sanitation, and health services; supply of medicines; and other non-food relief items; and
- assistance to refugees and internally displaced people in developing countries other than for food or protection.

Multilateral assistance is funding provided to a multilateral institution that:

- conducts all or part of its activities in favour of development;
- is an international agency, institution, or organization whose members are governments, or a fund managed autonomously by such an agency; and
- pools contributions so that they become an integral part of the financial assets.

In this report, the term "multilateral assistance" includes both ODA and non-ODA elements.

In an effort to estimate/impute the portion of assistance going through those organizations to developing countries, the OECD has developed a series of coefficients based on flow of resources (on a calendar-year basis) disbursed by the organizations in the developing countries. This set of coefficients is used, in part, to estimate the disbursements shown in **Table D-3.** 

It is important to note that any methodology for imputing multilateral flows will always be an approximation. Multilateral flows in a given year are not exactly imputable to donors' contributions in that year, no matter what methodology is used. Among the reasons for this are:

General approximations and timing. The estimated country and sector amounts are counted when the government makes the payment to the organization and based on the totality of the programme, rather than when the payment is used by the ultimate recipient. Donors' contributions to multilateral institutions are reportable in the year they are paid. Many trust funds aim to catalyze additional funding from other investors and donors. Such funds typically need to reach a certain funding threshold before disbursements begin, sometime after Canada's contribution.

**Limits of data on multilateral outflows.** While a number of multilateral agencies report to the OECD on the use of their funding (by country, by sector, etc.) some do not. Therefore, the country and sector breakdowns of those organisations are estimated using others sources, such as annual reports.

**Grants to lending institutions.** Some institutions lend rather than grant funds. Their lending in any one year may be much greater than donors' contributions, since it also draws on reflows of principal, interest receipts, and transfers of funds within the institution.

#### Multilateral and Global Programs Branch

This former CIDA branch managed the development aspects of Canada's relations with multilateral organizations, provided financial support for these organizations, and helped determine their policies and programs throughout the world.

Multilateral and Global Programs Branch delivered bilateral and multilateral assistance. See related definitions of "bilateral assistance" and "multilateral assistance."

## multilateral organizations

The OECD-DAC defines multilateral organizations as international institutions with governmental membership that conduct all, or a significant part, of their activities in favour of development and assistance recipient countries. They include multilateral development banks (e.g. the World Bank and regional development banks), United Nations agencies, international public-private partnerships (PPPs), and regional groupings (e.g. certain European Union and Arab agencies).

Former CIDA, as well as former DFAIT, Health Canada, Public Health Agency of Canada, Environment Canada, Industry Canada, and the Canada Post Corporation made contributions toward regular budgets of certain multilateral organizations (also called long-term institutional support or core funding). These contributions can be considered as ODA

either in whole or in part. The percentage value for each organization is provided by the OECD-DAC. See **Table C-2**.

#### National Defence and Canadian Armed Forces (DND)

This refers to ODA-eligible contributions on behalf of the National Defence and Canadian Armed Forces , such as the provision of humanitarian relief supplies. Military type interventions (for example, bilateral peacekeeping missions) and other activities that are not development focused are not included in this report.

## ODA-eligible imputed

This describes a cost category that is eligible for ODA status under the OECD-DAC guidelines, but with no actual expenditure data readily available. Instead, an estimate is produced based on a statistical model and/or professional judgement. This includes the cost of refugees (first year), imputed foreign student costs, services provided without charge by other government departments and imputed interest on advance payments, for which definitions can be found in this glossary. The new Policy on Transfer Payments no longer requires departments to report the imputed interest costs on advance payments and therefore these costs no longer appear in the Statistical Report.

### official bilateral debt relief

Official bilateral debt relief refers to debt-service relief negotiated through multilateral forums such as the Paris Club. The transfer of funds, administered by the Department of Finance Canada, is considered ODA-eligible. Starting in 2012-2013, EDC reports contributions to the HIPC debt initiative. These were previously reported by Finance Canada.

## official development assistance (ODA)

In Canada, "official development assistance" may refer to:

- the international definition created by the Development Assistance Committee of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD-DAC); or
- the definition established in the Official Development Assistance Accountability Act (ODAAA).

Unless otherwise specified, "official development assistance," as used in this statistical report, refers to the definition in the ODAAA. ODA represents the vast majority of Canada's international assistance. For more information, look in the section "Understanding this report" at the beginning of this document.

# Operations and management (see also administrative costs)

In this report this term represents the operations and management costs directly incurred by the donor agency to cover the day-to-day costs of extending international assistance. See also "administrative costs"

#### other official assistance (also known as non-ODA)

This refers to activities that do not meet the conditions for eligibility as Official Development Assistance because they are not primarily aimed at development (e.g. counter-terrorism capacity building, military observers). On the other hand, incremental costs incurred for the use of the donor's military equipment to deliver humanitarian assistance or perform development services are ODA-eligible (for example, emergency assistance by the Disaster Assistance Response Team). Activities outside the IAE that are not ODA eligible are considered out-of-scope of this report and hence not reported (e.g., military-related training, supply of military equipment and services to peacekeeping missions, and the forgiveness of debts incurred for military purposes).

#### Partnerships With Canadians Branch (PWCB)

This Branch of the former CIDA contributed to international cooperation initiatives designed and delivered by Canadian private- and voluntary-sector organizations, including non-governmental organizations, educational institutions, professional memberships and associations, cooperatives, youth organizations, and companies.

#### Payables at Year-End

The recording against the current fiscal year of liabilities incurred but which have not been paid by the end of the accounting period.

#### program assistance

This term refers to international assistance spending by DFATD's assistance programs, excluding operations and management costs, and changes in the value of investments in IFIs.

## provincial governments

This refers to international assistance programs of the provinces of Quebec, Manitoba and Alberta. For example, the Government of Quebec provides long-term institutional support to certain multilateral institutions such as the Organisation internationale de la Francophonie (OIF), and undertakes bilateral projects in a number of countries. The Official Development Assistance Accountability Act does not apply to these programs.

## Public Health Agency of Canada

This refers to assistance expenditures incurred by the Public Health Agency of Canada in support of the Pan-American Health Organization (see Table A).

## regional development banks

These are International Financial Institutions (IFIs) that are owned and operated by member nations. They are designed to extend development loans and provide other assistance to member nations. The world's five regional development banks are the African Development Bank Group, Asian Development Bank, European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, Caribbean Development Bank, and Inter-American Development Bank.

#### regional programs

Refers to regional programs managed by DFATD's Geographic Programs Branch (see definition) that address the regional issues countries face together. In **Table D-1** and **Table D-2**, these programs are reported separately from country programs. See definition of "country programs."

#### Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP)

This refers to ODA disbursements made by the RCMP for bilateral programs aimed at post-conflict peacebuilding and security system management and reform.

#### sector codes (Table B-1)

Sector codes are used to describe the purpose of assistance. The list of sectors is compiled by the OECD-DAC. From time to time, modifications are made with the approval of donor countries. The OECD-DAC sector classification contains the following broad categories:

- social infrastructure and services covering the sectors of education, health, population, water, government, and civil society;
- economic infrastructure and services covering transport, communications, energy, banking and finance, and business services;
- production covering agriculture, forestry, fishing, industry, mining, construction, trade, and tourism; and
- multi-sector covering, for example, general environmental protection; other
  multi-sector assistance, including urban and rural development; and non-sector
  allocable assistance for contributions not susceptible to allocation by sector, such
  as general budget support, actions relating to debt, humanitarian assistance, and
  internal transactions in the donor country.

The sector of destination of a contribution provides the specific area of the recipient's economic or social structure the transfer is intended to foster. The sector classification does not refer to the type of goods or services provided.

Due to differences in timing and methodology, the figures reported in **Table B-1** will vary significantly from those reported in "Table 5: Official Bilateral Commitments by Sector of Destination" of the OECD-DAC's questionnaire on ODA.

There are three main reasons for these discrepancies:


- **fiscal year vs. calendar year** The *Statistical Report on Official Development Assistance* is based on the Government of Canada's fiscal year; however, the DAC questionnaire is based on the calendar year.
- commitments vs. disbursements The DAC's Table 5 is prepared on a commitment basis rather than when funds are actually disbursed.
- proportionate coding DFATD's systems permit coding many sectors against any
  given contribution; however, the OECD's reporting allows only for a single
  purpose code for each assistance project/program.

## services provided without charge by other departments

This refers to costs incurred by other departments for accommodation, legal, and chequeissuing services rendered to DFATD. See definition of ODA-eligible imputed costs.

#### Strategic Policy and Performance Branch

This represents ODA-eligible international assistance expenditures made by the former CIDA's Strategic Policy Branch for representing Canada at international forums on development and ensuring that international commitments are reflected in Canadian development policies.



When assistance disbursements cannot be assigned by country or sector, (e.g. costs of refugees in Canada) the disbursement is referred to as unallocable or non-allocable.
