# AGRICULTURAL TRADE = \$1.3 BILLION IN 2014 Let's keep a good thing growing! 

Florida exported \$783 million to Canada, including:
$\rightarrow \$ 73 \mathrm{M}$ in fruit juices (including $\$ 58 \mathrm{M}$ in orange juice)
$\rightarrow$ \$67M in melons
$\rightarrow$ \$65M in tomatoes
$\rightarrow$ \$47M in strawberries
$\rightarrow$ \$42M in coffee

Florida imported \$467 million from Canada, including:
$\rightarrow$ \$68M in baked goods
$\rightarrow$ \$26M in berries (including cranberries and blueberries)
$\rightarrow$ \$25M in alcoholic beverages (including \$17M in whiskies)
$\rightarrow$ \$24M in fresh/frozen beef
$\rightarrow$ \$20M in mixes, doughs, and malt extracts

## A Strong Partnership in Trade:

- Since 2005, agriculture and agri-food trade between the U.S. and Canada has more than quadrupled, leading to significant changes in trade patterns and resulting in a more integrated North American marketplace.
- The U.S. and, in particular, Florida has benefited from this strong relationship - with Canada purchasing over \$26B in agriculture and agri-food products from the U.S. in 2014, of which \$783M came from Florida.
- Supply chains that cross our shared border are cost-effective and efficient because of the proximity to each other's agricultural inputs and products. For example, Canada is a major supplier of energy and fertilizers, while the U.S. equips Canada with farm machinery and crop protection technologies.
- Access to Canadian cattle, hogs, and oilseeds allows American feedlots, finishers, and crushing plants to run at capacity, supporting U.S. jobs.
