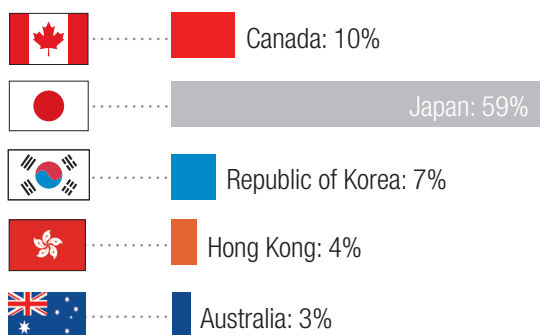
HAWAII EXPORTED \$16 MILLION TO CANADA, INCLUDING:

- \$3M in pineapples
- \$3M in papayas
- \$2M in coffee
- \$2M in coffee extracts
- \$2M in queen bees

HAWAII IMPORTED \$11 MILLION FROM CANADA, INCLUDING:

- \$5M in non-durum wheat
- \$1M in beer
- \$1M in ice cream
- \$1M in wheat and meslin flour
- \$0.7M in animal feed

BILATERAL TRADE SUPPORTS INCREASED SECTOR SPECIALIZATION AND EFFICIENCIES

Canada imported around \$2 million worth of queen bees or approximately 100,000 queen bees from Hawaii in 2010. The Hawaii queen bees are one to two months old when they are mated and sent away from their place of birth. The queens are an important part of the health and production of Canadian agricultural crops as they play a critical role in pollination. Canada has been experiencing high rates of queen bee mortality for several years; thus, imported queen bees from Hawaii are critical to replenishing stock. Furthermore, complementary climatic conditions contribute to the strength of the trading relationship between Hawaii and Canada. Canada imported papayas, pineapples, and coffee from Hawaii while Hawaii residents cooled off with Canadian ice cream and cold Canadian beer.

TRADE WITH CANADA = JOBS IN HAWAII

- Approximately 40,000 jobs (or 1 in 18 people employed) depend on overall trade with Canada.
