
## **AGRICULTURAL TRADE = \$2.9 BILLION IN 2012** Let's keep a good thing growing!

## A Strong Partnership in Trade:

Canada purchased \$21 billion in U.S. agriculture and agri-food products in 2012. Illinois benefitted from this strong relationship in 2012 by exporting \$1.2 billion in agriculture and agri-food products to Canada. To help reduce barriers to trade, lower costs and create economic opportunities, the Regulatory Cooperation Council and Beyond the Border Action Plans were released in December 2011. Increased regulatory cooperation will support U.S.-Canada trade in agriculture and agri-food products, contribute to job creation, and provide a greater variety of safe, highquality food products for consumers.
