
KENTUCKY EXPORTED \$119 MILLION TO CANADA, INCLUDING:

BILATERAL TRADE SUPPORTS INCREASED SECTOR SPECIALIZATION AND EFFICIENCIES

A central component of our bilateral trading relationship is our trade in whiskey. This drink, following the Irish naming, was called "whiskey" in the United States as opposed to the Scottish naming, "whisky", used in Canada. Kentucky's home-distilled bourbon whiskeys have achieved popularity in Canada, with bottles of Jim Beam and Wild Turkey lining the shelves of many Canadian liquor cabinets. Canada also has a history in whisky distilling and is home to such brands as Crown Royal and Canadian Club, which are enjoyed by many of Kentucky's residents. Our strong trading relationship gives consumers access to a variety of "whiskeys" or "whiskies", and provides producers in Kentucky and Canada with a steady demand for their products.

TRADE WITH CANADA = JOBS IN KENTUCKY

→ Approximately 106,000 jobs (or 1 in 18 people employed) depend on overall trade with Canada.
