
## Maine exported \$115 million to Canada, including:

- → \$27M in prepared chicken meat
- → \$22M in cranberries and blueberries
- → \$11M in processed potatoes (including fries and chips)
- → \$7M in maple syrup
- → \$5M in potatoes

## Maine imported \$166 million from Canada, including:

- → \$33M in processed potatoes (including fries and chips)
- → \$29M in fruits and nuts
- → \$29M in animal feed
- → \$18M in live plants
- → \$14M in margarine

#### A Strong Partnership in Trade:

- Since 2005, agriculture and agri-food trade between the U.S. and Canada has more than quadrupled, leading to significant changes in trade patterns and resulting in a more integrated North American marketplace.
- The U.S. and, in particular, Maine has benefited from this strong relationship

   with Canada purchasing over \$26B in agriculture and agri-food products from
   the U.S. in 2014, of which \$115M came from Maine.
- Supply chains that cross our shared border are cost-effective and efficient because
  of the proximity to each other's agricultural inputs and products. For example, Canada
  is a major supplier of energy and fertilizers, while the U.S. equips Canada with farm
  machinery and crop protection technologies.
- Access to Canadian cattle, hogs, and oilseeds allows American feedlots, finishers, and crushing plants to run at capacity, supporting U.S. jobs.
