Alabama imported \$90 million from Canada, including:

- → \$52M in fats and oils (including \$37M in canola oil)
- → \$11M in baked goods
- → \$9M in wheat
- \$3M in food preparations*
- → \$3M in beverages (including) \$2M in whiskies)

Alabama's top agriculture and agri-food export markets:

Alabama exported \$84 million to

→ \$25M in fresh/frozen chicken meat


→ \$16M in animal feed (including \$10M in dog and cat food)

→ \$13M in prepared chicken meat

→ \$8M in meat extracts and juices

\$5M in peanuts

* The category "food preparations" includes products such as tea substitutes, vegetable preparations, flavoring extracts, powders and essences, milk or cream substitutes, jelly powders, and juices from concentrate.

A Strong Partnership in Trade:

- Since 2005, agriculture and agri-food trade between the U.S. and Canada has more than quadrupled, leading to significant changes in trade patterns and resulting in a more integrated North American marketplace.
- The U.S. and, in particular, Alabama has benefited from this strong relationship - with Canada purchasing over \$26B in agriculture and agri-food products from the U.S. in 2014, of which \$84M came from Alabama.
- Supply chains that cross our shared border are cost-effective and efficient because of the proximity to each other's agricultural inputs and products. For example, Canada is a major supplier of energy and fertilizers, while the U.S. equips Canada with farm machinery and crop protection technologies.
- Access to Canadian cattle, hogs, and oilseeds allows American feedlots, finishers, and crushing plants to run at capacity, supporting U.S. jobs.
