AGRICULTURAL TRADE = \$2.1 BILLION IN 2014
Let's keep a good thing growing!



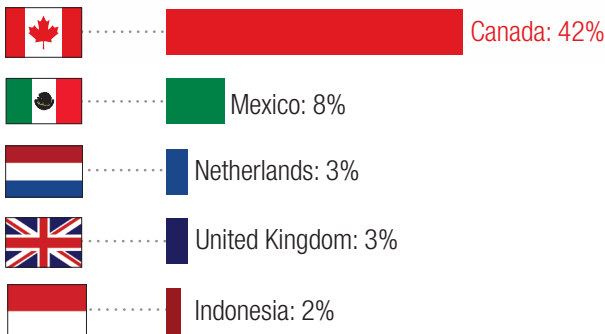
New Jersey exported \$1.1 billion to Canada, including:

- \$259M in fruit juices (including \$245M in orange juice)
- \$212M in fruits and nuts
- \$94M in chocolate and cocoa products (including \$42M in cocoa butter)
- \$81M in coffee
- \$59M in non-alcoholic beverages

New Jersey imported \$993 million from Canada, including:

- \$171M in fresh/frozen meat (including \$87M in pork)
- \$112M in fats and oils (including \$83M in canola oil)
- \$101M in baked goods
- \$82M in processed potatoes (including fries and chips)
- \$76M in vegetables

New Jersey's top agriculture and agri-food export markets:



A Strong Partnership in Trade:

- Since 2005, agriculture and agri-food trade between the U.S. and Canada has more than quadrupled, leading to significant changes in trade patterns and resulting in a more integrated North American marketplace.
- The U.S. and, in particular, New Jersey has benefited from this strong relationship - with Canada purchasing over \$26B in agriculture and agri-food products from the U.S. in 2014, of which \$1.1B came from New Jersey.
- Supply chains that cross our shared border are cost-effective and efficient because of the proximity to each other's agricultural inputs and products. For example, Canada is a major supplier of energy and fertilizers, while the U.S. equips Canada with farm machinery and crop protection technologies.
- Access to Canadian cattle, hogs, and oilseeds allows American feedlots, finishers, and crushing plants to run at capacity, supporting U.S. jobs.
