

AGRICULTURAL TRADE = \$2.5 BILLION IN 2014

Let's keep a good thing growing!




New York exported \$983 million to Canada, including:

- → \$117M in beverages (including \$80M in non-alcoholic beverages)
- → \$107M in coffee
- → \$69M in baked goods
- → \$54M in sauces and condiments (including \$35M in tomato sauces)
- → \$43M in fruit juices

New York imported \$1.5 billion from Canada, including:

- → \$287M in fresh/frozen meat (including \$118M in pork)
- → \$164M in animal feed (including \$75M in canola meal)
- → \$156M in vegetables
- → \$92M in baked goods
- → \$59M in chocolate products

A Strong Partnership in Trade:

- Since 2005, agriculture and agri-food trade between the U.S. and Canada has more than quadrupled, leading to significant changes in trade patterns and resulting in a more integrated North American marketplace.
- The U.S. and, in particular, New York has benefited from this strong relationship

 with Canada purchasing over \$26B in agriculture and agri-food products from
 the U.S. in 2014, of which \$983M came from New York.
- Supply chains that cross our shared border are cost-effective and efficient because
 of the proximity to each other's agricultural inputs and products. For example, Canada
 is a major supplier of energy and fertilizers, while the U.S. equips Canada with farm
 machinery and crop protection technologies.
- Access to Canadian cattle, hogs, and oilseeds allows American feedlots, finishers, and crushing plants to run at capacity, supporting U.S. jobs.
