
NORTH CAROLINA EXPORTED \$158 MILLION TO CANADA, INCLUDING:

BILATERAL TRADE SUPPORTS INCREASED SECTOR SPECIALIZATION, INTEGRATION AND EFFICIENCIES

With rich sandy soil and a perfect potato-growing climate, North Carolina is the United States' largest producer of sweet potatoes. In 2010, North Carolina exported \$17 million worth of sweet potatoes and 2 million in other fresh potatoes to Canada. The Canadian province of Prince Edward Island, Canada's largest producer of potatoes, also enjoys rich soils and a climate perfect for potato growing. In 2010, Canada exported \$4 million in fresh potatoes and \$14 million in frozen fries to North Carolina. The North Carolina-Canada bilateral trading relationship ensures that both places are provided with high quality potatoes.

TRADE WITH CANADA = JOBS IN NORTH CAROLINA

→ Approximately 244,500 jobs (or 1 in 17 people employed) depend on overall trade with Canada.
