
OREGON EXPORTED \$265 MILLION TO CANADA, INCLUDING:

BILATERAL TRADE SUPPORTS INCREASED SECTOR SPECIALIZATION AND EFFICIENCIES

Oregon's greenhouse and nursery industry makes up the largest portion of the state's agriculture sector and is an important source of plants and seeds for Canada. The state exported more than \$40 million in trees and plants and over \$20 million in seeds to Canada in 2010. One key export is the nationally symbolic maple tree, the leaf of which is featured on the Canadian flag. Oregon exported \$4 million worth of maple trees to Canada in 2010 alone. Maple syrup produced from the tree is popular in Canadian cuisine and is celebrated through a variety of local festivals and events in both Oregon and Canada.

TRADE WITH CANADA = JOBS IN OREGON

→ Approximately 101,000 jobs (or 1 in 17 people employed) depend on overall trade with Canada.
