
### South Carolina exported \$138 million to Canada, including:

- → \$35M in animal feed (including \$28M in dog and cat food)
- → \$15M in food preparations\*
- → \$15M in prepared meat (including \$5M in pork)
- → \$15M in live chickens
- → \$9M in mixes, doughs, and malt extract

### South Carolina imported \$134 million from Canada, including:

- → \$23M in processed potatoes (including fries and chips)
- → \$15M in baked goods
- → \$13M in wheat
- \$11M in food preparations\*
- → \$10M in cigarettes

#### A Strong Partnership in Trade:

SOUTH CAROLINA

- Since 2005, agriculture and agri-food trade between the U.S. and Canada has more than quadrupled, leading to significant changes in trade patterns and resulting in a more integrated North American marketplace.
- The U.S. and, in particular, South Carolina has benefited from this strong relationship - with Canada purchasing over \$26B in agriculture and agri-food products from the U.S. in 2014, of which \$138M came from South Carolina.
- Supply chains that cross our shared border are cost-effective and efficient because of the proximity to each other's agricultural inputs and products. For example, Canada is a major supplier of energy and fertilizers, while the U.S. equips Canada with farm machinery and crop protection technologies.
- Access to Canadian cattle, hogs, and oilseeds allows American feedlots, finishers, and crushing plants to run at capacity, supporting U.S. jobs.
