
## VERMONT EXPORTED \$64 MILLION TO CANADA, INCLUDING:

- \$26M in chocolate products
- \$8M in sugar confectionery
- \$4M in milk and cream
- \$4M in food preparations
- \$3M in malt extract

## VERMONT IMPORTED \$402 MILLION FROM CANADA, INCLUDING:

- \$228M in chocolate products
- \$27M in maple syrup and maple sugar
- \$17M in corn
- \$13M in animal feed
- \$12M in food preparations

## BILATERAL TRADE SUPPORTS INCREASED SECTOR SPECIALIZATION AND EFFICIENCIES

Canada and the United States are the only two major producers of pure maple syrup in the world. Vermont is the largest producer of pure maple syrup in the United States producing an estimated 920,000 gallons a year, while Quebec is Canada's major producer providing the majority of Canada's 5.9 million gallons. Maple syrup producers in both Vermont and Canada work hard to provide enough pure maple syrup to meet the demands of Americans, who are the world's largest consumers of maple syrup. Vermont imported \$27 million worth of maple syrup from Canada to help meet America's growing demand for maple syrup.

## TRADE WITH CANADA = JOBS IN VERMONT

- Approximately 19,300 jobs (or 1 in 17 people employed) depend on overall trade with Canada.
