Let's keep a good thing growing!




Connecticut exported \$50 million to Canada, including:

- → \$17M in pet feed
- → \$9M in food preparations
- → \$3M in tomato sauces
- → \$3M in protein concentrates
- \$2M in tea (including \$1M in black tea)

Connecticut imported \$147 million from Canada, including:

- → \$19M in ethanol
- → \$17M in vegetables and legumes (including \$6M in potatoes)
- → \$17M in breads and pastries
- → \$11M in alcoholic beverages (including \$6M in whiskey)
- → \$8M in corn

Connecticut's top agriculture and agri-food export markets:



A Strong Partnership in Trade:

- Since the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) came into force, agriculture and agri-food trade has more than quadrupled, leading to significant changes in trade patterns and resulting in a more integrated North American marketplace.
- The U.S., and in particular Connecticut, has benefited from this strong relationship with Canada purchasing over \$21 billion in agriculture and agri-food products from the U.S. in 2013, of which \$50 million came from Connecticut.
- The work of the Regulatory Cooperation Council and Beyond the Border initiatives is significant to our continued growth in agriculture and agri-food trade and to strengthening our industry competitiveness. For more information: www.actionplan.gc.ca/rcc
