#### Canadian Hatching Egg Producers (CHEP)

Amendment Canadian Broiler Hatching Egg Marketing Levies Order



n March 22, 2010, FPCC's Levy Committee approved two amendments to the Canadian Broiler Hatching Egg Marketing Levies Order. The first amendment pertains to the increase of the levy rate for

British Columbia, from \$0.01692 to \$0.0208 per broiler hatching egg. The second amendment is for the increase in the levy for marketing broiler hatching eggs from non-signatory to signatory provinces, from \$0.007155 to \$0.008125 per hatching egg. The effective date for both amendments is March 28, 2010 and the Order will expire on March 26, 2011.



# Working with Egg Producers to Strengthen Traceability

On May 5, 2010, Minister Ritz announced the investment of over \$800,000 in funding for Egg Farmers of Canada (EFC) to support the development of the Canadian Egg Industry Traceability System (CEITS). Canadian farmers produce premium eggs and this investment in traceability will build on that world-class reputation for safety and quality.

The CEITS will include processes and operating procedures for tracing the movement of eggs, pullets and eggs laying birds. The funds will also help establish database requirements for egg and bird traceability information required by government. This will help support the progressive approach taken by EFC in taking traceability beyond the livestock industry. EFC is the first organization of the poultry industry to move forward with the development of a traceability system.

This investment is provided through the Canadian Integrated Food Safety Initiative (CIFSI) which helps

the sector respond to growing consumer demands for improved on-farm food safety assurance and proactively manage risks. For more information, visit **www.actionplan.gc.ca**.

## New Food Safety Website

On March 10, 2010, the Government of Canada launched a new website that provides Canadians with easy access to food safety information. It gives Canadians valuable tips and tools to help reduce the risk of foodborne illness and acts as a gateway to important information during foodborne illness emergencies.



The website includes information from Canadian Food Inspection Agency, Health Canada and the Public Health Agency of Canada. The food safety website offers a broad range of food safety information on food recalls and allergy alerts, safe food handling and preparation, food labels and much more.

## Investing in Beef Research

In late March, the Government of Canada announced that it will be investing in research and innovation that will help beef producers remain on the cutting edge. Agriculture Minister Gerry Ritz announced that the Canadian Cattlemen's Association (CCA) will receive more than \$6 million to lead a research cluster of industry experts, scientists and universities.

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The Beef Cluster will pull together the scientific expertise for research that will help Canada's beef and cattle industry address challenges the sector has faced in recent years. Research will focus on key priorities the sector has identified: reducing production costs, increasing feed efficiency and decreasing the impact of animal health issues.

It will also work to increase demand for Canadian beef, both in Canada and around the world. Industry partnership is an important element of this initiative and this investment will support the CCA's contribution of nearly \$1.2 million. Provincial government partners will also contribute nearly \$464,000.

### Important Investment for the Future of **Agriculture**

The funding allocated comes from the Business Development program of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada's Growing Forward initiative – the national agricultural policy framework aimed at building a competitive and innovative sector for all farmers across the country.

safety systems on turkey farms across the country by investing more than \$50,000 for the Turkey Farmers of

Canada's (TFC) on-farm food safety program.

This investment will help the TFC update their On-Farm Food Safety Program (OFFSP), including their



training materials to ensure that farmers keep up to speed with new science and food safety practices. The OFFS program identifies potential on-farm food safety hazards and provides producers with best management practices to mitigate risks. It is a national program based on Hazard Analysis of Critical Control Points (HACCP) principles.

### How much do you know about eggs?

#### Here are a few egg trivia tidbits:

Celebrated since the dawn of time, the egg is a symbol of fertility, creation and new life. Though long considered a springtime food, it has now become an essential ingredient in all of our culinary traditions.

The ancient Persian and Celtic cultures celebrated the spring equinox with the gift of red-dyed eggs. The eggs were shared at a meal, and afterwards, the shells were carefully crushed, a ritual to drive away winter.

The ban on eating eggs during the 46 days of Lent, established in the 9th century, is what made the egg so popular at Easter. The eggs were collected and saved and, once the fasting was over, were distributed to the servants and children, who generally enjoyed them in a huge Easter omelet.

Another custom, which originated in Germany, is to hang red eggs in evergreen trees, a powerful ancient symbol of rebirth and renewal.
