#### **FPCC ACTIVITIES**

#### Summer meetings

Once again, FPCC's Chairman, Council members and staff are taking part in various national agencies summer meetings. This is a great occasion to meet with industry stakeholders and provincial commodity and supervisory boards to go over various files, as well as discuss current issues and challenges.

Mr. Pellerin will use this opportunity to update stakeholders on FPCC's continued work and strategic objectives, stressing the importance of the Minister of Agriculture's expectations regarding Cost of Production, Comparative Advantage of Production, Industrial Product Program and Agencies Annual Reporting. It will also be a chance to reiterate the benefits of the creation of Promotion and Research Agencies in the supply-managed sectors.

#### Council meeting and CPEPC Convention

The Canadian Poultry and Egg Processors Council (CPEPC) concluded its 64th Annual Convention in Toronto, Ontario. In conjunction with the Convention, FPCC held a Council meeting on June 16, 2014. During this trip, Council members and staff attended CPEPC's business meetings and social activities, and also visited the O'Connor Land and Cattle Company in Ajax, Ontario and toured the Durham College Centre for Food in Whitby, Ontario.

#### FPCC 2015-2018 Strategic Plan

Part of FPCC's mandate is to ensure that the supply management and promotion-research systems work in a flexible, transparent, accountable and efficient manner.

In this context, the FPCC is organizing a strategic planning session on October 14 and 15, to review its progress and establish its priorities and directions for the next three years (2015-2018). Council members and staff will use this session to discuss strategic directions and processes with regard to the development of FPCC's new Strategic Plan 2015-2018. In the coming weeks, the process will be further developed and will include an assessment of the existing plan, as well as a review of current and future challenges of Council.

Consultations with industry stakeholders and face-to-face meetings will be organized during the summer and fall.

#### **FPCC BUSINESS**

COUNCIL MEETING OF JUNE 16, 2014

#### **Chicken Farmers of Canada (CFC)**

The FPCC met on June 16, 2014 where consideration was given to the proposed amendments to the *Canadian Chicken Marketing Quota Regulations* for the A-125 allocation period, which runs from July 13 to September 6, 2014.

In reviewing the proposed quota regulations amendments, Council members found that they satisfied the requirements of the *Farm Products Agencies Act* and the Agency's Proclamation. As such, Council approved the total allocation of 224,736,840 kg live weight for period A-125, which comprises provincial domestic and market development allocations.

It was also noted that storage stocks have decreased over the past five months and are slightly below the Agency's established target range. Also noted, were the wholesale prices, which, except for the price for wings, have been trending upwards over the past two months.

During the June 16 meeting, the members approved the amendments to the *Canadian Chicken Licensing Regulations* going back to December 2001. One set of amendments that were submitted by CFC, but were not reviewed by the Council, were the recent amendments that incorporated *CFC's Speciality Production Policy* into the Licensing Regulations. The Council decided that at least one quota allocation period, which includes an allocation of specialty production quota, should be experienced to ensure the proposed amendments are sufficient for CFC to administer its marketing plan.



Mr. Doyle has agreed to remain an advisor to the President for the remainder of the year as DFC proceeds with the transition process in the coming months.

#### Minister Ritz and Canadian Industry Increasing Business with China

Agriculture Minister Gerry Ritz concluded his trade mission to China, where he showcased Canada's agricultural capabilities to help build a stronger, mutually-beneficial and prosperous bilateral relationship. Minister Ritz delivered a keynote speech to the World Meat Congress, where he spoke to more than 200 meat and livestock delegates from around the globe about Canada's efforts to meet the world's growing demand for protein through our sustainable production of world-class livestock, beef and pork.

Minister Ritz was pleased to witness the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Canadian Livestock and Genetics Association and the China Cattle Farming Association. The MOU supports Canada's efforts to obtain market access for live cattle and represents the next step in Canadian technical expertise and support to China's dairy industry. This MOU follows the commitment of the Chinese Government to cooperate on market access for Canadian live cattle, which industry estimates to be worth up to \$150 million.

Minister Ritz held meetings with key Chinese government officials, reinforcing the importance of stable long-term trade, as well as science and technology partnerships between the two countries. These meetings yielded major market access achievements that will benefit a wide range of Canadian agricultural sectors.

This mission which included a delegation of more than 70 people representing over 30 agricultural groups and four provinces, was led by the Minister to bolster long-standing Canada-China agriculture trade ties and to highlight Canadian capabilities to support China's agriculture industry.
