### Introduction

ince its creation in 1967, the Security and Defence Forum – and its predecessor the Military and Strategic Studies Programme – has successfully promoted the development of a Canadian competence in security and defence issues by supporting Canadian scholars, researchers and graduate students.

Premised on academic liberty and overseen by an independent Selection Committee, the Forum includes three key elements:

- operating grants to Centres of Expertise and a Chair in Defence Management Studies for teaching and research in defence and strategic studies;
- promoting research and study in the area of security and defence studies through an awards programme of fellowships, scholarships, and internships; and,
- small grants for various activities, including travel and conferences by the broader academic and non-governmental community.

Increased interest over the last year in security and defence issues among Canadian university students is a major success of the Security and Defence Forum programme.

But the Forum has also helped foster informed public debate and discussion of key security and defence issues, particularly during the 2004-05 period which included the release of the *Defence Policy Statement*, the launching of the Canadian Forces' efforts towards transformation, and a number of operations abroad.



#### Highlights of the 2004-05 year include:

- An increase in the number of university-level courses with at least 50% security and defence content and growth in the number of enrolments and faculty members;
- An increase in the number of events held by SDF Centres;
- More promotion of public awareness of security and defence issues through conferences, workshops and other forums;
- Increased Canadian representation at international security and defence events and conferences;
- The further development of a security and defence-oriented student core with an increase in the number of research exercises completed by students;
- An increase in both published Op-Ed articles in national newspapers and community speaking engagements; and,
- More scholars sharing their views with parliamentary committees.

### Governance

cademic freedom and objectivity remain at the heart of the Forum's mandate. The Directorate of Public Policy manages the program on behalf of the Assistant Deputy Minister (Policy) in accordance with Treasury Board guidelines and based on the guidance and recommendations of an independent Selection Committee.

The Selection Committee, comprised of experts from across the academic and private sector, meets in Ottawa each spring to determine fellowship, scholarship, and internship recipients.

The Selection Committee also considers the budgets and annual reports of the Centres of Expertise and the Chair in Defence Management Studies in order to assess performance and ensure value for money. Annual reports follow a results-based management and accountability framework that allows Centres and the Chair to highlight their activities across a range of categories including course content, research projects, and outreach.

Members of the Selection Committee are appointed by the Minister of National Defence from Canadian academia and the defence and security community at large.

The Selection Committee's two-day meeting of April 2005 focused on three main issues: selecting winners and alternates for a total of fifteen Security and Defence Forum awards to young scholars; annual reports from the Centres of Expertise and the Chair in Defence Management Studies; and, the program as a whole including the way ahead in the next five year cycle.

#### The Forum's Business Committee

Following the Selection Committee's meeting of April, the SDF Business Committee, consisting of the directors of the Centres of Expertise and the Chair in Defence Management Studies, held its annual meeting.

Staged in Ottawa at the historic Cartier Square Drill Hall – the oldest continually used drill hall in Canada – this meeting was an opportunity for Centre Directors to be briefed on the SDF programs of the past year, the Defence Policy Statement, and operational issues.

The Centre Directors also had an opportunity to meet privately with the Deputy Minister of National Defence and the Vice Chief of the Defence Staff.

# Centres of Expertise and the Chair in Defence Management Studies

he Security and Defence Forum has at its core twelve Centres of Expertise and a Chair in Defence Management Studies.

Annual grants range from \$55,000 to \$200,000. These grants allow financial stability for the five-year period of the funding cycle, as well as the ability to leverage money from outside funding sources. Appendix A provides details on the Centres of Expertise and their 2004-05 grants.

Each centre is unique in its research and teaching interests. Many offer multi-disciplinary programs that encourage the examination of security and defence issues from a variety of perspectives including strategic studies, political science, international relations, history, economics, and law. The result is a solid foundation in security and defence studies that benefits all Canadians, whether on campus or in the communities.

#### The Military and Strategic Studies Library at the Laurier Centre for Military Strategic and Disarmament Studies


The library at the Laurier SDF Centre provides graduate students and faculty access to more than 3,000 books on military and strategic studies. The core of the library is

the result of a donation from Shirley Vogel, wife of the late Robert Vogel, a distinguished military historian and administrator at McGill University.

Naval historian Ken Macpherson donated a second large collection and other books are regularly added to the collection. All the titles in the Centre's collection are listed in the main Tri-University (Guelph-Laurier-Waterloo) library catalogue.

The Centre has also transferred hundreds of books to the main Laurier library. Other collections at the Centre include an important archive of air photos covering the area of operations of First Canadian Army in Northwest Europe in 1944-1945 (300,000+ photos), the Ronnie Shephard Military Operations Research Collection and a variety of smaller, specialized accessions.



#### Academic Contributions

Security and Defence Forum scholars are able to research and publish on a 400 variety of issues relevant to Canadian defence and foreign policy. As experts, they are often called upon to explain or 300 offer their views in the media and other public forums on complex security and defence issues.


More than 700 people were employed in SDF centres across Canada including 100 139 faculty members and 187 research associates. During fiscal year 2004-05, Forum scholars contributed or prepared over 500 publications including books, articles and chapters.


#### **Journal of Military and Strategic Studies**

This publication by *Université du Québec à Montréal* highlights peace operations led by the United Nations, NATO, and the EU, with articles written by researchers from Canada and around the world.



#### **UBC Journal of International Affairs**

Published by the International Relations Students Association, the *UBC Journal of International Affairs (JIA)* is an annual publication consisting of the top undergraduate research papers in the field of international relations.





#### **Martello Papers**

The *Martello Papers*, a monograph series published by the Queen's Centre for International Relations (QCIR), is named for the distinctive round limestone towers built in the mid-1800s as part of Kingston's waterfront defences. A striking feature of Kingston's shoreline, these towers have been adopted as emblems of the QCIR, and are especially appropriated for a series of publications devoted to matters of security and defence.

## Academic Awards

oth the academic community and the Selection Committee have recognized the importance of looking to the future.

Accordingly, the Security and Defence Forum provides a number of annual awards to young scholars with an interest in the field of security and defence. Scholarships are available at the Master's, doctoral, and post-doctoral levels, as well as an internship program for Master's degree graduates. The number of scholarships varies from year to year depending on the number of candidates and the quality of applications.

In 2004-05, the Selection Committee awarded \$295,000 in academic awards:

- two R.B. Byers Post-Doctoral fellowships (\$35,000 each);
- one Ronald Baker Doctoral scholarship (\$17,000);
- six Doctoral awards (\$16,000 each, although one candidate accepted only half of the award);
- three Master's scholarships (\$8,000 each); and
- three internships (\$32,000 each) to young scholars who conducted research on a variety of topics relevant to security and defence studies.

Security and Defence Forum internships provide recent MA graduates with relevant work experience. Interns can work for a range of organizations in the security and defence field such as think tanks, non-governmental organizations, and international organizations.

In 2004-05, the SDF provided funding for three candidates. They were placed at the Conference of Defence Associations Institute, the Canadian Institute of Strategic Studies, and the Atlantic Council of Canada.

#### Master's Scholarship

Justin Massie was awarded a Security and Defence Forum MA Scholarship for 2004-2005. He is pursuing his Master's degree in Political Science at the Université du Québec à Montréal. He is the Associate Researcher at the Canada Research Chair in Canadian Foreign and Defence Policy, as well as the Coordinator of the Centre

for International Studies and Globalization. His research interests relate to Canadian security and defence policy with a particular emphasis on processes of threat definition and means to counter them. He intends to pursue doctoral studies focusing on a comparative analysis of Canadian and American strategic cultures.

She completed her Master's degree in International Affairs at the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs and her Bachelor's degree from Queen's University in Political Studies and Economics.

At the CDAI, her research was focused on public perceptions of the Canadian military. Sarah plans to work internationally in the field of security.


## Special Projects 2004-05

he Security and Defence Forum Special Projects Fund promotes awareness of security and defence issues by funding worthwhile conferences, workshops, field research, and symposia by stakeholders in the academic community and non-governmental organizations.

In 2004-05 a total of 33 projects were funded. Grants ranged from \$700 to \$10,000. This modest financial support helps increase public awareness of defence and security issues among Canadians with the amount expended totaling \$171,511.00.

Projects – including student activities such as simulations and visits to National Defence Headquarters – were held in seven provinces.

#### **Special Project Growth 2003-2005**



To increase awareness of the Special Projects Fund, events are featured in the bi-monthly Security and Defence Forum Newsletter.

The Directorate of Public Policy also took steps to increase awareness of Special Projects by assigning policy officers to attend and report on the policy implications of Security and Defence Forum-funded events. A list of Special Projects is found at Appendix C.

#### NDHQ Briefing Tours

Based on requests from the SDF Centres at the University of Manitoba and the *Université* du Québec à Montréal, the Directorate of Public Policy, through Special Projects funding, hosted two day-long briefing tours for student delegations

visiting National Defence Headquarters. On 16 February 2005, 21 students from the University of Manitoba, in addition to a small number of students from Carleton University, Queen's University and McGill University, received briefings from various members of the Policy Group and Canadian Forces personnel.

The full-day event offered in-depth analysis on a wide range of topics such as ballistic missile defence, terrorism and Canadian Forces operations.

On 23 February, a second student delegation from *Université du Québec à Montréal* and *Université de Montréal* visited Ottawa for a similar day of briefings.

The briefing tours ended with a crisis simulation, in which the students were asked to react to a fictional international emergency requiring them to develop appropriate talking points. Feedback from the students suggested that their time in Ottawa, though brief, was well spent.

#### 4th Annual Carleton University Model NATO Summit

Carleton University hosted the 2005 Model NATO Summit from 9-12 March 2005. Over 120 students from universities across Canada participated in four days of debates, embassy briefings, simulated committee meetings, and crisis scenarios. The first Canadian conference of its kind, the Model NATO provides students with the opportunity to increase their knowledge of the

North Atlantic Treaty Organization; its structures and activities; Canadian security and defence issues; and, increase their general knowledge of international affairs. The Honourable Bill Graham, Minister of National Defence, delivered a keynote address. Student delegations representing NATO member states debated issues of topical relevance to NATO and attempted to resolve simulated crises. For the third straight year, the delegation from the University of New Brunswick won the award for the best team.



#### Université Laval: On the Refugee's Path

Students with Université Laval wanted to raise awareness in the academic community and the citizens of Quebec City of the multifaceted situation facing refugees in the world. The exercise – which received extensive media exposure – consisted of a three-day conference including information forums, picture expositions, theatre play, and a simulated refugee camp. Collaboration from non-governmental organizations, the Canadian Forces, and the SDF Program helped make the exercise a success.





## International Conference Fund


he International Conference Fund was established in 2003 to facilitate the attendance and participation of senior students and junior faculty members at major international conferences. Fiscal Year 2004-05 witnessed growth in the usage of this fund. For the second straight year, each SDF Centre was allocated up to \$10,000 for senior graduate students or junior faculty members to present papers at international scholarly meetings. In total, \$78,451.83 was spent on sending Canadian scholars to 34 international conferences, representing a 125% increase

## Public Awareness and Communication


he Security and Defence Forum is mandated to foster informed public discussion and commentary, and to enhance communication between the Department of National Defence, the Canadian Forces, and the academic community.

In 2004-2005, SDF Centres and their staff reached out to the general public by holding 394 outreach events and giving almost 1000 media interviews.

The Special Project Fund also contributed to increasing public awareness of security issues – 1000 all projects are either open to the general public or involve the broader academic community.

The Directorate of Public Policy has also taken steps to heighten public awareness of conferences by increasing the distribution and accessibility of the SDF Newsletter.

#### **Parliamentary Outreach**

Ryerson Christie, a PhD candidate from the York Centre for International and Security Studies, appeared before the Senate Standing Committee on National Security and Defence on 21 March 2005 and addressed alternate approaches to national security. His testimony was broadcast on CPAC.

Over the year, some twenty SDF-associated academics appeared before the Senate Standing Committee on National Security and Defence and the House of Commons Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs and International Trade.



#### **Red Head Battery Project**

On 18 and 19 April 2005, members of 4 Engineer Support Regiment from CFB Gagetown came to the aid of the University of New Brunswick's Military and Strategic Studies Program in clearing 100 years worth of dense brush from the Red Head Coastal Defence Battery in Saint John, New Brunswick. The coastal battery site is in immediate danger of collapse into the sea due to environmental erosion. As the growth was removed, a large, carefully constructed earthen, brick and cut-stone fortress, some 150 metres long and 40 metres wide and dating from 1862, appeared.

The work at Red Head is a key part of UNB's New Brunswick Military Heritage Project (NBMHP), which has a mandate to raise awareness of the significance of New Brunswick's role in the military history of Canada. Dr. Roger Sarty of Wilfrid Laurier University, and author of the NBMHP book Saint John Fortifications, 1630-1956, stated that "by drawing attention to what is soon to be lost at Red Head, we will hopefully alert people to the amazing military heritage sites in Saint John that can still be saved." The project at Red Head received significant national media coverage.
