Introduction

The purpose of this publication is to celebrate the outstanding achievements of members of Her Majesty's Canadian Armed Forces (CAF). While the granting of the honour or award itself constitutes the appropriate recognition of their actions from Crown and Country, this is only the beginning. Their stories and achievements must be communicated to other CAF members and all Canadians for the true meaning of 'honouring' to be achieved. Their service epitomizes the highest standards of devotion to duty, courage and leadership in the military profession. Beyond the presentation of their insignia, these individuals become role models and their actions inspire others to emulate their behaviour, and instil pride in our country. This publication will allow everyone to understand the array and number of honours and awards granted to CAF members in 2014 and share the amazing stories of these outstanding Canadians.

The scope of this publication is limited to the honours and awards publicly announced during the year 2014 as opposed to the date of approval or presentation of the award. The announcement date is determined either by the Rideau Hall press release, the publication of the CANFORGEN or the publication of the award in *The Canada Gazette*, whichever comes first.

The honours and awards included are only those awarded to CAF members and members of allied forces or civilians working with the CAF, that are either administered by the Department of National Defence or in which award process the Department is somehow involved. CAF members regularly receive honours from other sources, which while being authorized for wear, are not recorded here. For example, a reservist who is also a police officer may be awarded the Police Exemplary Service Medal or made a member of the Order of Merit of the Police Forces, these honours are not recorded herein.

The postnominals recorded in the lists of the recipients reflect the honours held by the person before the award being announced; this allows the reader to see the cases where a person has been promoted within an order. The rank indicated is that held by the person at the time of the nomination.

This publication does not include the full history and criteria for the honours and awards concerned but only a brief outline with the focus being on the 2014 recipients and their achievements. Details of the honours and awards themselves can be found in the references provided at the end of this publication.

The Order of Military Merit

Appointments and promotions in the Order of Military Merit recognize conspicuous merit and exceptional service by members of the CAF, both Regular and Reserve. The Order consists in three levels: Member (MMM), Officer (OMM) and Commander (CMM), the latter being the highest. The level of responsibility assumed by the individual determines the level of appointment.

The Governor General presented insignia to members at two investitures held at Rideau Hall on 20 June and the 7 November 2014. While these appointments were announced in 2013 and therefore included in last year's report, some photographs of the investitures are included in the following pages.

The 65th list was announced in CANFORGEN 211/14 on 16 December 2014 and contained the appointment or promotion of 108 distinguished CAF members into the Order including five Commanders, 22 Officers and 81 Members. These individuals will receive their insignia at investitures to be held at a later date.

The Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of It. John of Jerusalem

Appointments and promotions in the Order of St. John recognize outstanding or exceptional service with the Order, mainly through its two foundations, the St. John Eye Hospital in Jerusalem and St. John Ambulance. There are five main levels to the Order and usually one is admitted at the lowest grade and is later promoted through the grades when further distinguished service has been demonstrated. The grades are Serving Member (formerly known as Serving Brother or Sister), Officer, Commander, Knight or Dame of Justice or of Grace and Bailiff or Dame Grand Cross, the latter being the highest.

Only those appointments and promotions in the Order which have been made on the recommendation of the Department of National Defence are included hereunder. The same applies for the other awards of the Order. Several other Canadian Forces members have been honoured through the Order on the recommendation of other bodies such as St. John Ambulance. The DND appointments were announced through CANFORGEN 212/14 on 16 December 2014.

The **Decorations for Bravery** recognize people who have risked their lives to save or protect others. The **Cross of Valour** (CV) is awarded for acts of the most conspicuous courage in circumstances of extreme peril. The **Star of Courage** (SC) is awarded for acts of conspicuous courage in circumstances of great peril. The **Medal of Bravery** (MB) is awarded for acts of bravery in hazardous circumstances.

After they carried her outside, Corporal Postlethwaite re-entered the building to search for other possible victims. He was forced to retreat as the smoke and flames engulfed the house.



Meritorious Service Decorations (Military Division)

The **Meritorious Service Decorations** (Military Division) recognize individuals for outstanding professionalism and for bringing honour to the CAF. The **Meritorious Service Cross** (MSC) (Military Division) recognizes a military deed or activity that has been performed in an outstandingly professional manner, according to a rare high standard that brings considerable benefit or great honour to the CAF. The **Meritorious Service Medal** (MSM) (Military Division) recognizes a military deed or activity that has been performed in a highly professional manner or of a very high standard that brings benefit or honour to the CAF. The list below includes the four MSCs and 65 MSMs announced in 2014.

Bar to the Meritorious Service Cross (Military Division):

Major-General Dean James MILNER, OMM, MSC, CD Major-General Milner was deployed to Kabul, Afghanistan, as both the commander of the Canadian Contribution to the Training Mission and the commanding general of the NATO Training Mission from May 2013 to March 2014. His character, leadership and strategic vision contributed to the development of an autonomous and sustainable Afghan security force in the aftermath of the coalition force departure, and ensured a successful end to Canada's mission in Afghanistan. Major-General Milner was a consummate professional and an exceptional ambassador for Canada.

Captain Aaron NOBLE

On 27 October 2011, aircraft commander Captain Noble, onboard *Rescue 915*, was tasked with rescuing two hunters stranded in Foxe Basin, near Igloolik, Nunavut. The mission would require over 2,000 kilometres of travel, far exceeding the maximum aircrew day. Despite aircraft limitations, adverse weather conditions and compounding operational complexities, Captain Noble expertly planned and executed his mission, saving the lives of the two hunters, and recovering the three search and rescue technicians who had parachuted in to assist them.

Warrant Officer Joseph Claude Camille PELLETIER, CD

Warrant Officer Pelletier demonstrated leadership, professionalism, initiative and dedication during the aftermath of the devastating earthquake that struck Haiti on 12 January 2010. He provided life-saving first aid to several local nationals immediately following the earthquake, and subsequently organized the evacuation of over 4,000 Canadian citizens. He also delivered crucial assistance to Canadian embassy staff and to governmental and non-governmental aid specialists coordinating the Canadian relief effort. Warrant Officer Pelletier's decisive actions helped restore calm in Haiti.

Colonel Ian Clarence HOPE, MSC, CD

He worked relentlessly to refine the tactics, techniques and procedures related to intelligence collection and dissemination. He also enhanced threat knowledge, and enabled the identification and interdiction of insurgent networks. As replacement flight engineer following Corporal Lewis' injury, Warrant Officer Mar immediately stepped in to operate the safe hoist by placing the SAR technicians on board the raft and sailing vessel, and safely recovering five persons, all while battling gale-force winds. The crew of Rescue 908 demonstrated exemplary team work, bringing great honour to themselves and to the Canadian Armed Forces.

Honorary Colonel James MASSIE

In 2009 Honorary Colonel Massie initiated the establishment of the Operation Hero scholarship fund, which has since raised more than \$850,000, benefiting military dependants who attend Georgian College. His mentorship inspired creative collaborative projects where military and civilian personnel worked together for the betterment of their shared communities. Honorary Colonel Massie's energy, professionalism and dedication have benefited the Canadian Armed Forces as well as his local community of Barrie, Ontario.

General Denis MERCIER of the French Republic

After extensive analysis of the issues surrounding the rapidly decreasing coalition force, he focused his team's efforts on areas that would effectively move the Kabul Military Training Centre towards autonomy. Master Corporal Tyler LATTA

On 13 September 2011, Master Corporal Latta had completed a routine convoy from Camp Phoenix to International Security Assistance Force Headquarters in Kabul, Afghanistan, when insurgents unleashed a coordinated attack on several coalition positions. Under sustained rocket-propelled grenade and machine gun fire, he remained composed, took immediate control of the situation and organized the local response to the attack. During the ensuing 16-hour firefight, Master Corporal Latta's remarkable frontline leadership and outstanding combat ability were critical to repelling the attack.

2014 Flonours and Recognition Changes

Special Service Medal with EXPEDITION bar (SSM-EXP):

- An announcement was made on 22 May 2014 that the creation of the EXPEDITION bar to the Special Service Medal had been approved by the Governor General on behalf of The Queen.
- The new EXPEDITION bar fills a gap in the overseas recognition framework. It will cover service in Operations and Operational Support which does not meet the risk, threat, hardship or OP intensity requirements for other medals such as the General Service Medal or Operational Service Medal, but still warrants formal recognition given the service is performed under exceptional circumstances as per the SSM regulations and plays a critical role in fulfilling the CAF mission abroad.
- The EXPEDITION bar is awarded to CAF members for 180 cumulative days of honourable service beginning on or after 1 July 2007, performed outside Canada while deployed to participate in or provide direct support on a full-time basis to approved operations, provided the said service is not counted towards any other Canadian or foreign service medal.
- For the purpose of this bar, deployed means sent outside of Canada temporarily, without family and effects, for the specific purpose of serving in or supporting approved operations.
 Postings to permanent positions outside of Canada are excluded from eligibility.



- There is no multiplying factor associated with this bar.
- The CDS approves the elements of eligibility for the bar in consultation with Armed Forces Council on the recommendation of the Canadian Forces Honours Policy Committee.
- Thus far the following elements have been approved as eligible for the new SSM-EXPEDITION (SSM-EXP):
 - service of CAF personnel in Comalapa, El Salvador, Curacao, and the Liaison Officer in Key West, Florida, in direct support (ground support to RCAF Auroras) to the US-LED Joint Task Force – South Mission since 1 July 2007 (OP CARIBBE). Aircrew flying into the defined theatre of operations for OP CARIBBE credit those days for the OSM-EXP and shall not count those days for the SSM-EXP
 - service of CAF personnel as a staff member at the Third Location Decompression Site, Cyprus, since 1 August 2007
 - service of CAF personnel with the Integrated Undersea Surveillance Towed Array Sensor System (IUSS-SURTASS) while deployed on USN Ships performing surveillance in the South China, East China and Yellow Seas as well as part of the Sea of Japan (from the Paracel Islands to Vladivostok) since
 December 2007
 - service of CAF personnel with the Casualty Support Team, Landstuhl Regional Medical Centre, Germany, from11 February 2008 to 29 March 2014

- service of CAF personnel with the US Navy Central (NAVCENT), Naval Support Activity (NSA), Manamah, Bahrain, including but not limited to:
 - (1) Combined Maritime Force (CMF) HQ, since 21 April 2010
 - (2) 5th Fleet HQ, since 31 July 2012
 - (3) Coalition Intelligence Fusion Centre, since 21 May 2014. Personnel who were in position on 20 May 2014 remain eligible for award of the GSM-SWA for the remainder of that deployment only. Personnel arriving in position after this date shall count their time towards the SSM-EXP
 - (4) NAVCENT Liaison Officer (previously listed as Naval Liaison Officer), since 21 May 2014. Personnel who were in position on 20 May 2014 remain eligible for award of the GSM-SWA for the remainder of that deployment only. Personnel arriving in position after this date shall count their time towards the SSM-EXP
- service of CAF personnel at the Strategic Lines of Communications (SLOC) Detachments in Germany since 1 October 2010, in Cyprus since 21 October 2010, and in Kuwait since 2 June 2011
- service of CAF personnel with the US Forces in Kuwait in direct support of the Iraq transition (US OP NEW DAWN) to provide advice, to assist with transition from Department of Defence to State Department and to assist with the retrograde of US Forces out of Iraq, from 1 February to 31 December 2011

- service of CAF personnel with Task Force Jamaica within the political boundaries, territorial waters and airspace of Jamaica, in support to the Jamaica Defence Force (JDF) to provide SAR and MEDEVAC capabilities and to stand by for possible hurricanes, from 12 August to 15 November 2011 (OP JAGUAR)
- service of CAF personnel with Air Task Force (ATF)
 Mali in support of the French-led OP SERVAL from
 the Istres-Le Tube Air Base in France from 15 January
 to 3 April 2013. ATF aircrew counts each day flown
 into Bamako, Mali, for the OSM-EXP and shall not
 count those days towards the SSM-EXP
- service of CAF personnel with USCENTCOM forward – Jordan (CF-J), King Abdullah Special Operations Training Centre (KASOTC), Amman, Jordan, since 23 May 2013

South-West Asia – Theatre Honours

An announcement was made on 29 April 2014 that, in keeping with Canadian military tradition, Battle Honours are to be awarded for unit participation in the operations in Afghanistan and the Arabian Sea. At this time, Theatre Honours have been defined and allocated as described in the Unit Award Section (refer to pages 65–66). In addition, His Excellency the Right Honourable David Johnston, acting in his capacity as Commander-in-Chief of Canada, has authorized the Conflict Nomenclature (not an honour itself) as "South-West Asia". He has also authorized the creation of two Theatre Honours: "Arabian Sea" and "Afghanistan".

 service of Defence Team members who deployed to Iloilo, Panay Island and to Manila, Philippines following the super typhoon Haiyan (OP RENAISSANCE), from 8 November 2013 to 23 January 2014, as part of the humanitarian mission including members of the Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART)



Operational Service Medal with EXPEDITION ribbon (OSM-EXP):

- service with Joint Task Force Horn of Africa (JTF-HOA), Camp Lemonnier, Djibouti, since 31 July 2012
- service in Mali under OP ENCLAVE from 16 January 2013 to
 15 December 2013. Aircrew with Air Task Force Mali (OP SERVAL) count all time spent in Bamako, from 15 January to
 3 April 2013. Aircrew flying into the theatre accumulate one day of service for the first sortie flown on any day, additional sorties flown on the same day receive no further credit

Special Service Medal – EXPEDITION (SSM-EXP):

- service of CAF personnel in Sigonella and Trapani, Italy, providing direct support to the Canadian efforts in Libya with aircrew flying into Libya, from 1 November 2011 (OP LOBE)
- service of CAF personnel deployed to Task Force Solomon Islands led by the Australian Defence Force Combined Joint Task Force 663
 (CJTF 663) to clear unexploded explosive ordnance (UXO) contaminating jungles and shorelines of countries in the South Pacific plagued by explosive remnants of war from the Second World War, in the Central Province of the Solomon Islands, the Islands of Guadalcanal and the Russell Islands (Op RENDER SAFE 13) from 5 November 2013 to 5 December 2013



Canadian Forces' Decoration (CD) – Eligibility of Annuitant Breaks

An announcement was made on 7 March 2014 that the calculation of time toward the CD will include the annuitant breaks if the reserve member was not part of the Supplementary Reserve during these breaks. Annuitant breaks taken while employed on the Supplementary Reserve remain ineligible for the CD. This decision is effective immediately and is deemed to apply from 15 December 1949, the institution date of the CD. Affected serving members may have their CD eligibility adjusted by their Orderly Room to conform with this decision. Affected retired members may make application directly to DH&R using the form DND-2396-E which is available at http://www.cmp-cpm.forces.gc.ca/dhr-ddhr/chc-tdh/ af-fd/index-eng.asp.

Command Commendations

On 7 July 2014, the Chief of the Defence Staff has granted the Commander of the newly created Canadian Forces Intelligence



Command (CFINTCOM) the authority to award Command Commendations and directed that in future, only commanders of an official command reporting to the CDS shall be granted this authority.

Addendum

Despite efforts to provide an accurate and error-free manuscript, some mistakes still happen which are sincerely regretted.

Page 105 of the 2013 edition – Unfortunately, the notice published on page 3004 of the December 28, 2013, issue of the *Canada Gazette*, Part I, contained an error. An amendment was published on January 25, 2014 in Volume 148, No.4 so that the related entry for Captain Marc-André La Haye should have read that the President of the French Republic conferred the "National Defence Medal, Bronze Echelon" rather than the "National Defence Medal, Silver Echelon".

Page 123 of the 2013 edition – In the Index, the name "AUCHTERLOINE" was misspelled and should have read "AUCHTERLONIE" instead.
