

1 RIDEAU CANAL

You are standing at the entrance to the Rideau Canal. After the War of 1812, there was still considerable fear among Canadians of a possible U.S. invasion. The canal was built as a route to transport goods at a safe distance from the American border.

It took over 2,000 labourers a year, working for six years, to carve the canal out of rock and swamp.

In 2007, this engineering marvel was designated a UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) World Heritage Site. In winter, it becomes the world's largest skating rink, as recognized by Guinness World RecordsTM.

2 OTTAWA RIVER — LOOKOUT

Today, the National War Memorial honours all Canadians who have served their country in armed conflict. It was originally designed to reflect Canadians' answer to the call of the First World War.

Some 660,000 Canadians enlisted in the First World War. More than 66,000 of them did not come home. Look up at the faces of the figures depicted on the memorial, as they "go to war." What do you think they are feeling?

4 WOMEN ARE PERSONS!

You are looking at five women from Alberta (known as "The Famous Five") celebrating an important victory.

In 1929, they won their fight to have women legally recognized as "persons" under the *British North America Act*, making women eligible for appointment to the Canadian Senate. Canadian women have since served as prime minister, governor general and chief justice of the Supreme Court.
