A preliminary tabulation of the results of the monthly survey of employment in leading establishments in the eifht major industrial divisions ${ }^{1 /}$ shows moderate improvement in the situntion at Myy 1 , reversing the downard movement indicated in immediately precedine months. The advance index number of employment, based on 1926 as 100 , stood at 188.6 , as compnred with 197.6 at Apr. 1, 1949, and 186.5 at May 1, 194ヶ, previously the meximum for that date in the record of 29 years. Marked seasonal curtrilment was noted in logrine operations in the Eastern and Central Provinces, but the trend in numerous other industries was favournble at the herinnine of Noy.

The rise of $0.5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. In the ndvance index number of erployment at May 1 was nccompanied by a gain of $0.1 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. In the advance index number of payrolls. The per capita weekly earnings of the employees reported in the eight principal industries stood at $\$ 43.16$ at May 1, as compared with $\$ 43.35$ at Apr. 1, and $\$ 39.70$ at May 1, 1948. The most recent nverace is the highest in the record for the time of year.

Greater nctivity as compared with Apr. 1 was indicated in Quebec and the four Western provinces. The gains ranced $\hat{\text { from }} 0.7 \mathrm{p} \cdot \mathrm{c}$. In Quebec, to 3.7 p.c. In British Columbia and 4.1 p.c. in Saskatchewnn. The losses in the remaining provinces variod from 0.1 p.c. in Ontario to 4.4 p.c. in Nova Scotin. The trend of payrolls was eqenerally downward in all nrovinces except Manitoba, Snskatchewan and British Columbin. Reduced workine tino in scme industries was n. factor contributing to the decline in the disbursements in salaries and wages.

The advance index number of employment in manufacturinf, at 203.2, wns insignificantly higher than that of 223 .n nt Apr. 1. 1949, and nlso ulightly exceeded the May 1, 1948, figure of 201.8. The index of parrolls, however, showed a inss of $0.1 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. In the month, but was $9.8 \mathrm{p} \cdot \mathrm{c}$. higher than at May 1 of last yoar. The preliminary fifgure of per capita weekly salaries and wages of persons employed in leading manufacturing establishments at May 1 wns $\$ 44.45$, as compared with $\$ 44.54$ at Apr. 1, 1949, and $\$ 40.78$ at May 1, 1948, previously the maximum for that dide in the recoza, going back to 1941 .
