AUVGNCE STATEMENT ON EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS MAY 1, 1951.

(These data are subject to revision),
A preliminary tabulation of the results of the monthly survey of industrial dapleyment shows further improvement in the situation at May 1 , continuing the tavourable movement indicated a month previously. The advance index number of employment, ( $1939=100$ ), stood at 175.2, as compared with 173.3 at Apr. 1, 1951, and 159.7 at May 1 in both 1950 and 1949. Marked seasonal curtailment wes noted in Sogging operations in the Eastern and Central Provinces, but the trend in many othor zncistities, notably construction, wes upward at the beginning of May.

The rise of 1.1 p.c. in employment reported at May 1 was accompanied by a stin of 2.6 p.c. in the advance index number of payrolls. The latest figure for Canada was the highest in the record, although the employment figure was seasonally lower then during the final quarter of 1950. The per capita weekly earnings of msn and women on the staffs of the larger firms in the principal industriel groups reached a new high at $\$ 49.17$ at May 1 , as compared with $\$ 48.43$ at Apr. 1 , and $\$ 44.88$ \&亡 May 1, 1950.

Greater activity as compared with Apr. 1 was indicated in all provinces except Nove Scotia and New Brunswick, where the index numbers of employment fell by $0.2 p_{0} c_{\text {e and }} 3.0$ p.c., respectively. Seasonal declines in transpartation seriously affested the situation in both provinces, while important losses, also seasonal, took place in logging in New Brunswick. Among the remaining provinces, the general gains ranged from 0.4 p.c. in Ontario and 1.4 p.c. in Manitoba, to 3.0 p.c. in British Columbia, 3.4 p.c. in Alberta and 6.4 p.c. in Prince Edward Island. On the whole, the general trend of payrolls was upward in all provinces except New 3 runswick.

The advance index number of employment in manufacturing, at 189.5, was 0.4 poc. higher than at Apr. 1, 1951, and 9.9 p.c. above its level at hay 1, 1950. The index of payrolls showed a rise of 2.1 p.c. in the month, and wes 21.5 p.c. higher than a yoar oarlier. The preliminary figure of per capita weekly salaries and wages of persons employed in leading manufacturing establishments at May 1 was $\$ 50.89$, as compared with $\$ 50.03$ at Apr. 1, 1951, and $\$ 46.03$ at May 1, 1950 .
