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ADVANCE STATEMENT ON FMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, OCTOBER, 1953.

The level of industrial employment at Oct. 1 was practically the same as at Sept. 1, and also showed little change in the 12-month comparison, according to monthly returns on employment and payrolls received from over 25,000 establishments. The index (1949=100) was 116.7, as compared with 116.6 at Sept. 1, and 116.4 at Oct. 1, 1952, previously the highest figure on record for the time of year. Activity increased in the month in Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario and Saskatohewan. The gains, like most of the declines elsewhere indicated, were small.

The reported disbursements in payrolls were 1.0 p.c. higher than at the beginning of September, and 6.4 p.c. above the Oct. 1, 1952, level. At 158.5 on the 1949 average as 100, the latest index reached a new all-time maximum. The provincial trends in weekly wages and salaries were the same in direction as those in employment, except in British Columbia, where a loss of 0.2 p.c. in employment was accompanied by a rise of 0.1 p.c. in payrolls.

The average weekly earnings showed an advance of 49 cents from Sept.l, and of \$3.00 from Oct. 1, 1952, establishing a new high, at \$58.12. The latest per capita figures in Prince Edward Island and Manitoba were slightly lower than a month earlier. The increases indicated in the remaining provinces varied from 5 cents in New Brunswick to 74 cents in Ontario.

There was a slight decline in employment in manufacturing as compared with Sept. 1, but the payroll index rose by 1.1 p.c. The average weekly wages and salaries, at \$59.74, were the highest in the record. The employment index was 0.8 p.c. above its Oct. 1, 1952, position, while the payroll figure was 5.9 p.c. higher.
