ADVANCE STATEMENT ON EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, NOVEMBER, 1953.

(These data are subject to revision)

There was a contraction in industrial employment at Nov. 1, when the advance index fell by 1.2 points from Oct. 1, and was half a point lower than at Nov. 1, 1952. This is the first occasion in a lengthy period in which the monthly index has been below its level of a year earlier. Industrial disputes in the lumber industries in British Columbia, with continued losses due to strikes in metal mining, contributed to the reductions at the date under review. The payroll index declined from Oct. 1 and was also lower than at Sept. 1. With these exceptions, it was the highest in the record. The latest general figure of per capita earnings was slightly above the preceding average, establishing a new maximum.

Generally heightened industrial activity as compared with Oct. I was noted only in Prince Edward Island and Saskatchewan. The curtailment in employment indicated in the remaining areas ranged from 0.2 p.c. in Quebec to 3.8 p.c. in British Columbia, and 4.8 p.c. in Newfoundland. The substantial loss in British Columbia was partly due to labour-management disputes, mentioned above.

The advance index number of employment in manufacturing at Nov. 1 was 1.9 p.c. lower than at the beginning of October, and the amounts distributed in weekly payrolls fell by 1.5 p.c. The average weekly wages and salaries, however, rose by 28 cents, to the highest point on record. Employment in this group of industries was slightly below its level 12 months ago, but continued higher than in the autumn of earlier years. Among the non-manufacturing industries, logging and trade showed seasonal advances in employment. Mining, transportation, storage and communication, construction, and some other classes were quieter.
