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ADVANCE STATEMENT ON EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, MAY 1, 1953.

Employment in the major industrial divisions showed an upward movement at the beginning of May, reversing the trend of preceding months. The advance index of employment, on the 1939 base, was 184.1, 1.1 p.c. higher than at Apr. 1, and 3.8 p.c. above its level at May 1, 1952, previously the maximum for the time of year. The weekly payrolls rose by 1.5 p.c. as compared with a month earlier, and were 9.9 p.c. higher than in the corresponding period in 1952. The average weekly wages and salaries advanced to a new all-time high, at \$57.54, as compared with \$57.33 a month earlier, and \$54.34 a year ago.

The improvement at the date under review was widely distributed. Geographically, New Brunswick was an exception, employment declining by 1.4 p.c. in the month, largely as a result of seasonal losses in transportation. The increases elsewhere noted ranged from 0.5 p.c. in Ontario to 1.8 p.c. in British Columbia, 5.2 p.c. in Saskatchewan, and 5.7 p.c. in Prince Edward Island. Industrially, there were quite large gains in construction, transportstion, storage and communication, with smaller additions to the working forces in manufacturing, public utility operation, trade, and the service industries for which data are available. Logging camps showed a further considerable reduction in staffs, and mining was rather quieter.

Employment in manufacturing slight y increased, the index showing its fourth successive rise. The gain was smaller than in preceding months, amounting only to 0.2 p.c. The latest index was 6.8 p.c. higher than at May 1, 1952. The index of payrolls rose by 0.3 p.c. in the month, and was 12.3 p.c. above its level 12 months earlier. The preliminary figure of per capita weekly wages and salaries of factory workers at May 1 was \$59.50, as compared with the preceding figure of \$59.44, and \$56.55 at May 1, 1952.
