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ADVANCE STATEMENT ON EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, AUGUST 1, 1953.

(These data are subject to revision).

The monthly survey of employment in the principal industrial divisions 1/showed further though slight improvement at the first of August, the general index rising by 0.4 p.c. as compared with July 1, and by 1.6 p.c. as compared with Aug. 1, 1952, previously the maximum for midsummer. The situation was affected to some extent by industrial disputes, notably in the mining and truck transportation industries.

Activity increased in all provinces except Quebec and Ontario, where there were fractional declines in the employment indexes as compared with a month earlier. The trend was generally upward in construction, transportation, storage and communications and most other non-manufacturing industries. In logging and manufacturing, however, reductions in personnel were reported.

Industrial payrolls advanced to a new peak at the beginning of August, when the Canada index was 0.6 p.c. higher than at July 1, and 8.9 p.c. above its level a year earlier. Greater expenditures on the whole were reported in both comparisons in all provinces. The payrolls disbursed in manufacturing fell by 0.9 p.c. in the month, partly due to lowered earnings during the vacation season, but were 10.5 p.c. higher than in the same week in 1952.

The average weekly wages and salaries rose in most provinces, the exceptions being Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and British Columbia. In all areas, the per capita earnings were higher in the week of Aug. 1, 1953, than in the same period in 1952 and earlier years. The small decline in the month in the general average in manufacturing was partly due to changes in industrial distribution of the workers reported and partly to lower hours and lower incentive earnings in the holiday season.
