ADVANCE STATEMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND WEEKLY EARNINGS, AUGUST 1, 1954.

The monthly survey of employment in the principal industrial divisions showed further though slight improvement at the first of August, the general index rising by 0.4 pool as compared with July 1. In the 12-month comparison, there was a decline of 3.0 p.c. Activity mounted from the July 1 level in all previnces except Ontario, where there was a reduction of 0.9 p.c., largely due to curtailment of operations in manufacturing. The provincial index of employment in that group of industries fell by 1.8 p.c. On the whole, the greatest advances in the industries surveyed were reported in the Western Provinces, the gain of 4.5 p.c. in Alberta being most noteworthy. The improvement in Quebec was slight.

Preliminary figures for Canada indicate a loss of 0.8 p.c. in employment in manufacturing, and small reductions in forestry and trade. There was considerable expansion in construction. The remaining non-manufacturing industries showed a moderately upward movement.

The weekly wages and salaries paid by the comperating establishments rose by 0.7 p.c. in the month. Although this increase was a little larger than that recorded at Aug. 1, 1953, the payroll index then was fractionally above its position at the date under review. With that exception, it was the highest in the record for midsummer. The disbursements in the major industrial groups as a whole exceeded those reported in the preceding survey in all provinces except Ontario, where the index dropped by 0.6 p.c. The average weekly earnings were rather lower than a month earlier in the Maritime Provinces and British Columbia, and higher in Newfoundland, the Central and Prairie Provinces. Except in Newfoundland, the provincial averages were also higher than at Aug. 1, 1953.
